The Tech Circus will be held in Walker Memorial on the evening of Wednesday, March 1. The various committees charged with arranging for the affair are now working on definite plans for the evening's entertainment.

Ranking as the largest Technology gathering of the term, the Circus is designed to act as a general mixing pot for all members of the Institute: Faculty, Alumni and undergraduates. The flavoring to be added will be that of general good fellowship.

Will Make Use of Home Talent

To set any particular feature as the *piece de resistance* would be will nigh impossible, suffice it to say that the very best talent that the Institute can provide will comprise the casts of the various vaudeville stunts, and the personnel of the side shows. The various sports and activities are supporting the project, each doing what it can to add to the diversity of the entertainment to be presented.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in choosing a date upon which all of Walker Memorial would be available, and at the same time, one which would not be so close to the examination period as to preclude the likelihood of a large attendance. The California Club, when the subject was broached, went so far as to consent to cancel the dance which it had scheduled for February 24, for, at first, this seemed to be the logical date for the Circus. However, rather than cause the club this unnecessary inconvenience, the later date was decided upon.

## New Publication Aiming to Deal in Scandal Appears at Technology

Last Thursday morning, a red-lettered publication with blazing headlines called The Filter Paper, being the product of a non-descript organization known as The Filter Press, appeared at the Institute.

It claimed to bare the hitherto concealed scandals of Technology Faculty and Undergraduates, under the slogans, "Only the Pure Get Thru," "But Who Wants to Be so Insignificant?" and "Them We Don't Razz Ain't Worth It."

Starting on the front page with libelous attack on the President of the T. C. A., it asserted the Military Science Department's advocacy of cribbing, and ran a cut of the New Technology bridge, alleged to be the product of a Harvard engineer.

Assistant Dean H. E. Lobdell was accused of "guzzling vitamins" at the expense of the starving students and co-eds, Professor Tyler was ridiculed as a mountain climber, and in at least two places Professor Shugrue's super-protruberent vest was made to bear the brunt of intended jest and these features were by no means the only ones.

The paper went on sale in the corridors as soon as the men began to arrive for nine o'clock classes and obtained a varying sale throughout the morning. Quite a bit of comment was aroused as to the origin of this amateur production. Several individuals even tried to connect the publications activities with that of THE TECH, proving thereby that they were thoroughly misinformed.
