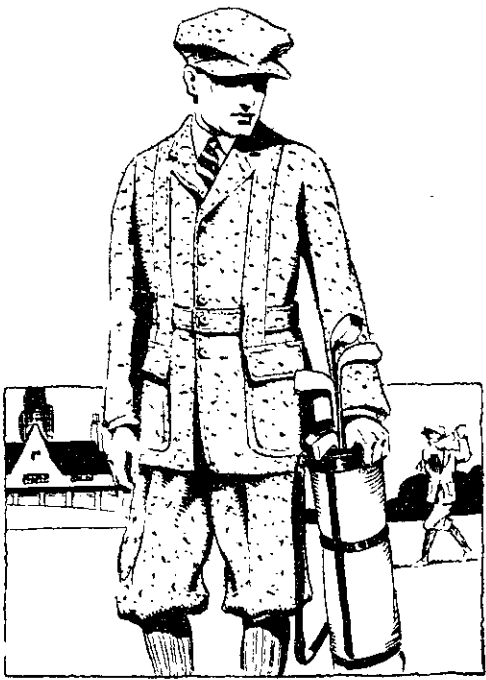

WRESTLERS COUNT ON HARD FIGHT AT YALE

Technology Team Faces Eli Grapplers in Meet Saturday

With the final elimination wrestling bouts completed, the resulting Technology wrestling team to meet Yale tomorrow at Yale has been decided upon. Conditions in the collegiate wrestling game this year are by no means similar to those of last season, when the Institute wrestlers overwhelmed the Elis with a 26-3 score. Watts Humphrey contributed to a third of that 26 by winning both his bouts. Harry Bruner, who previously covered the 125-pound class for the Institute, has been displaced by Francis Hazeltime, who held the position for Technology last season. Bruner, however, will wrestle in the 115-pound berth, having defeated Tommy Barnard in the recent elimination bouts of this week. There have been no other candidates for the 135-pound position, V. J. Weatherly covering the place excellently so far this season. He will represent the Beaver squad in the 135-pound capacity at the Yale meet this Saturday.

Buttler Upholds Position

George Buttler, captain of the Institute team, will be out for honors in the 145-pound bout. T. O. Richards, who wrestled in the 135-pound class last year for the Engineers, has gained weight and is eligible for the 145-pound place. He wrestled captain Buttler for the berth this week and lost by a scissors and head chancery in almost 8 minutes.

F. R. Hereford, who has proxied for Briggs, since the latter injured his shoulder at the Y meet, will wrestle in the 158-pound class. Kennett, recently wrestled Thomas for the 175-pound place in a nine minute overtime bout, which Kennett finally won by decision. Kennett will represent the Institute at Yale. S. D. Heath, who has been wrestling in the unlimited class for Technology in the past meets, has been displaced by Tyson Nimick, who fought Heath in a fast overtime bout. Brooklyn Polytech, who took a bad defeat from the Engineers last year on their return trip from Princeton, is on the Institute cards for Saturday night at Brooklyn.

crease its lead, nor were the Engineers able to cut it down. Both sides scored several times more, but only after much effort. The half ended with Technology in possession of the ball, but with Williams leading in the scoring, 15-9.

Engineers Come Back

With the opening of the second half, the Engineers started out with a vim to cut down the Williams lead. Davidson, whose shooting was wild in the first period, played up to form and tallied several. Things were made easier when Kellogg, who had been playing a stellar game for Williams at forward, sprained his knee and was replaced by Wyghtman. At about the same time, Bretting, who had gone in Coleman's place, was put out on personals and Coleman went back in at center.

Both sides played a fast brand of basketball and the game was one of the best to watch of the season, but the Engineers gradually cut down the Williams lead until, with six minutes left to play, Davidson netted a basket after some pretty passing and tied the score, 18-18.

Williams Outclassed at End

After that the Institute score mounted rapidly, Coleman tallying two and Tonon one. The Williams squad had by no means given up the game but the Engineers had at last found themselves. Their passing and their team work was the best that they have put across this season. Although the shooting was wild at times, it was enough to make Williams hump and then some.

GYM SEASON OPENS WITH HARVARD MEET

Haverford Withdraws from Triangular Match—Now Dual Affair

BROTHER MEETS BROTHER

The Technology Gym team will prove very emphatically and decisively that all Technology men are not "undernourished" in the dual meet with Harvard at the Walker gym this Friday at 7:30. This is the first meet this season as the meet with Princeton scheduled for last week fell through. However, Manager Lloyd Porter deserves the credit for arranging an exhibition to fill the date. This exhibition was given at the Cambridge "Y" last Saturday and the performance was very well received, judging from the applause coming from a large feminine audience.

The excitement over the Haverford-Harvard-Technology triangular meet has been very high as each team rates as the strongest and best-balanced in many years, also each boasts of veterans and individual stars. This high pitch has been further increased by the fact that Haverford has withdrawn, sending a telegram stating, "due to unforeseen circumstances we are unable to join in meet, also cancelling all other meets this year." This leaves Coach Titchoff's charges to show individually against Harvard. Last year the result of the Harvard-Princeton-Technology triangular meet was the score of 6-24-24, and the Harvard-Yale-Technology meet was 17½-13-23½.

Baileys Face Each Other

The Bailey family will be the cynosure of admiring eyes, also figuring prominently in the outcome, and "brother meets brother" when Captain Bailey of Harvard will attempt to outshine his younger brother, our own Way Bailey, a very capable performer and point-getter. Other features of the meet are Captain Thompson—Maltese Cross, flying lever and flying hand-stand, Ralph Wood—back-flips and twister-tumbling. Folinsbee—giant swings and shoulder-stand, Ray Brink—free circles on horse, McCoy—fly-away on rings and Joe Keenan—intricate designs weaved in the air with clubs.
