The Navy plunger, Penquet, is credited with doing 60 feet in 2 seconds which is better than we have done, but the Annapolis tank is faster than the one in the Boston "Y."

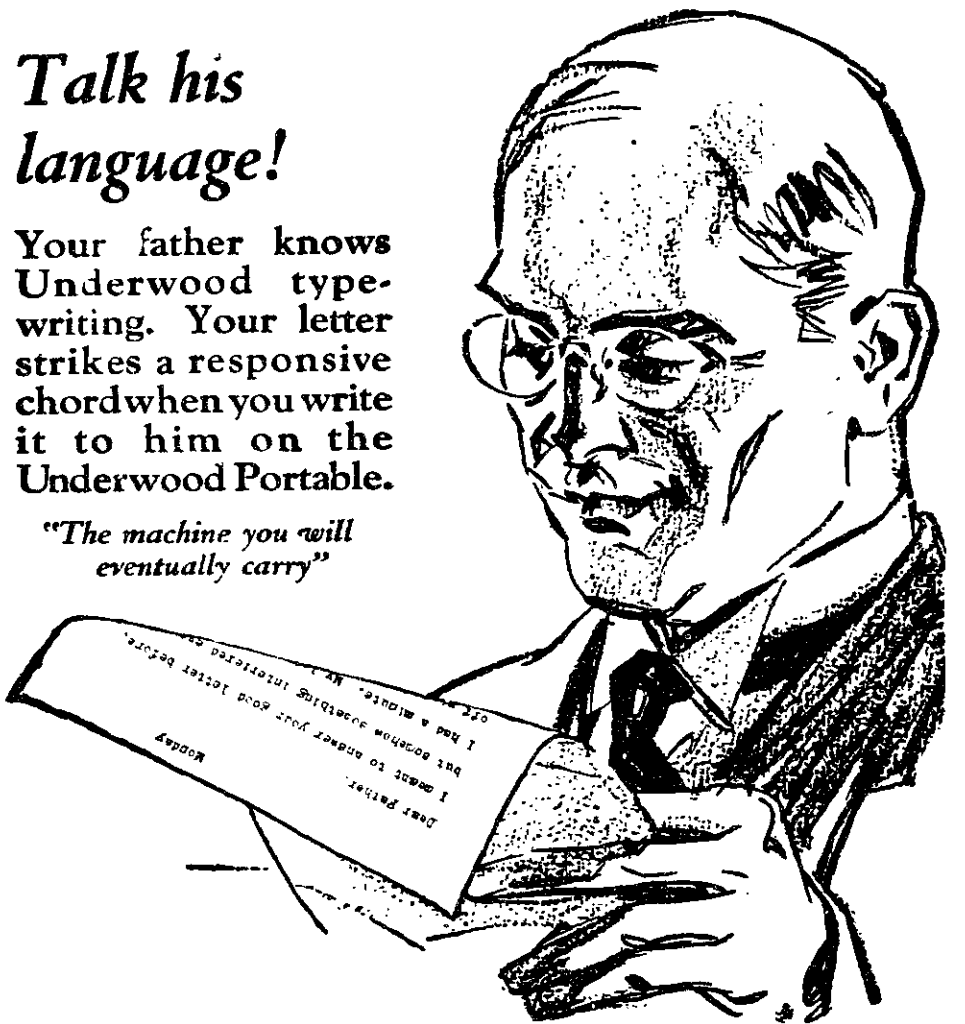
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
