At a meeting of the T. C. A. officers with the Advisory Board, it was settled that the work of the rooming bureau be placed in the hands of the T. C. A. In addition report was made of the Undergraduate Employment Bureau stating that by broadcasting job applications they hoped to be able to supply summer work for Institute students who have applied for it.

At this meeting, which was held last Wednesday night, there were present three members of the T. C. A. Advisory Board, P. R. Ziegler '00, chairman; H. S. Ford, Treasurer, and Dean H. P. Talbot '85; the officers of the T. C. A., A. L. Johnson '22, president; G. W. Potter '22, vice-president; G. P. Schumacher, Jr., '22, treasurer; W. M. Ross, general secretary, and H. C. Gayley '22, in charge of the division of room registry; together with the undergraduate committee who made a report on the dormitory situation under Mr. Winward Prescott last term in E33, the course in Report Writing, Hall Kirkham '23, nominally in charge of the committee; C. A. Brantingham '23, who made a survey of rooming conditions for this committee, and D. F. Carpenter '22, chairman of the Institute Committee.

His musicians scored a distinct hit at the Yale Prom this year, playing a battle of music with Ed Wittstein's orchestra.

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THIRD TERM R. O. T. C. OUTLINE IS ARRANGED

**Subjects of Instruction for All
Units Printed**

The instruction for the third term in the various R. O. T. C. units has been given out by the Military Science Department. The freshmen will receive the customary spring drill in the manual of arms. Uniforms must be worn at all drills by the freshmen. In the sophomore sections the course will be on map reading and sketching for the first four weeks. The last six weeks will be taken up in the study of heavy and field artillery, including the 155 mm. G. P. F. guns and the 8-inch howitzers, and also motor transport. The men in the signal and air service are to be instructed in telegraphy.

Advanced Courses Varied

The junior advanced R. O. T. C. courses will be as follows. In the coast artillery the instruction will be on fire control instruments with occasional Saturday trips down the harbor to the forts. The engineer unit will study topographical surveying and army organization. Instruction in telephones, both in construction and operation, will be given the signal corps. In the latter part of the term the work will be the study of the use of codes and in the care of horses. In the air service, aerial photography, aerial machine guns and bombardment equipment, will be studied.

The senior advanced students will study according to the schedule; coast artillery, the tactical principles involving the employment of artillery. The engineers will study staff duties and civil construction work; signal corps, electrical engineering under instruction of Mr. Walker; air service, aeronautical engineering under instruction of Professor Warner; ordnance, instruction under regular mechanical engineering course.

**Advisory Council Amends
Institute Athletic
Regulations**

REPORT ON CREW SCHEDULE

It was decided, at a meeting of the Advisory Council on Athletics, Tuesday night at the Engineers' Club, that the money for the purchase of the ten record cups would be raised from Alumni funds, as the award of the cups has been held up since the war, and would constitute an unusual expense. The record-holders are: T. H. Guething '15, the 440 in 1914; Garvin Bawdan '22, the 880 in 1921; R. G. Brown '16, the mile in 1915; A. B. Curtis '15, high hurdles in 1915; A. C. Dandrow '22, the hammer throw in 1920; J. W. Kellar '22, the discus in 1920; W. D. Pinkham '22, the discus in 1921; C. S. Reed '16, broad jump in 1916, and J. D. Nagel '19, pole vault in 1919.

A report from the crew management was read. Work with nearly 100 candidates is going forward in the gym and on the track, and five meets with large colleges have been arranged for this season. There are also a number of second crew races and freshmen races. There was some discussion of the system now in vogue at Yale and Harvard by which the minor crews are sent on trips at their own expense, and entertained by the opposing home team, and the opinion of the Council was that it was just such co-operation that Technology needed to develop its sports.

Change Athletic Rules

Several changes were made in the rules applying to the award of letters and the election of captains. It was decided that instead of awarding Ts to the first 10 per cent in the N. E. I. A. A. cross country run and the first 15 per cent of the I. C. A. A. A. meet, the letters would be given to men in the first 15 and 20 per cent, respectively. Similarly for the award of ATA the limits were raised from 20 and 30 per cent to 30 and 40 per cent, respectively. Details of the elections were so changed as to permit all men who had received a letter to vote. Hitherto there has been some question, when

OPEN REGISTRATION FOR R. O. T. C CAMPS

**Location of Advanced and
Basic Summer Camps
Announced**

LARGE NUMBER SIGNED UP

Students are now signing up for the Reserve Officers Training Corps basic and advanced summer camps. These camps are to be held in different places throughout the eastern United States for the various R. O. T. C. units. This year the camps will open on June 15 and close July 27. One of the latest acts of the government is the establishment of the basic camps. These camps are for those students who have not had instruction in any particular line of the R. O. T. C. work, such as freshmen and Sophomores in the colleges. At these camps the student get training along the same lines as in the advanced camp, only more fundamental.

Advanced Camps Prove Popular

The advanced camps are for those men enrolled in the junior and senior courses of the R. O. T. C. Sophomores who for scholastic reasons cannot go to camp between their junior or senior years may go to the advanced camp. The government pays the expenses of the men and also a compensation of one dollar a day to the advanced students. The men going to the basic camps are paid only their expenses and receive no compensation while at the camp. During the past few years the camps have proved very popular with Technology men for over 200 have attended each year.

The engineers camp will be at Camp Humphreys, in Maryland, this year and is not far from Washington. The signal corps camp will be at Camp Vail in New Jersey, not a great distance from New York. The men in the air service of the R. O. T. C. will be at Mitchell Field, on Long Island, this summer. The ordnance camp will be at Aberdeen Testing Grounds in Maryland and near Baltimore. The coast artillery is assigned to go to Fortress Munroe, on Old Point Comfort, in Virginia, at the entrance to Chesapeake Bay. The basic camps

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SYRACUSE RACE PROVED WORTH OF INSTITUTE FOUR

**Oppose Seven College Teams
in Championships at
New York**

**PRINCETON IS MOST
DANGEROUS OPPONENT**

**Cornell and Syracuse Also
Threaten Technology
Runners' Chances**

The mile relay team will wind up its indoor season with a race against the nation's best in the intercollegiate tomorrow night. Princeton has shown her strength, defeating Yard Chittick's flying quartet by a narrow margin in the Johns Hopkins games. Syracuse was decisively defeated in the Knights of Columbus games and is not considered a factor. Cornell is in the middle of a slump, but Coach Moakley's men have a habit of coming through and the squad of Ithicans will bear watching. Technology's chances were dimmed when they drew seventh lane. Johnny Poole has an exceptionally getaway, however, and will go far towards making this up.

Beavers' Record Good

The Engineer team's record for the season is as good as that of any team it will meet for the championship with the possible exception of the Princeton quartet which can claim a win over the Institute flyers. The close defeat by Syracuse in the Millrose games has been wiped out by a decisive victory over the identical team that won the first race. Harvard was swamped in the B. A. A. games but Princeton emerged a victor from the contest in the Johns Hopkins meet two weeks ago. In each of these races, however, Technology's relay ran mighty well and the contest in which they figured has each time been the fastest one in the meet.

It seems that Cornell and Princeton are the ones Captain Yard's relay has to fear as the Beavers feel sure of their ability to beat Syracuse again. Cornell has not been living up to its great reputation during the last part of the season, however, and unless it is merely a slump in Moakley's team they will be unable to better Syracuse's performance against the Institute.

Tigers Most Dangerous

With Princeton it is a different story. The New Jersey runners are confident they can trim Technology because of their earlier win by the margin of five yards. Moreover, Stevenson, 440-yard national champion, who did not run on that occasion, will be on hand to fill the anchor position
