The sign-up sale for the prom will be held Thursday in the main lobby from 12 until 2 o'clock, the number to be sold to one man being limited to five. Bert Lowe and his first string orchestra has been secured to play from 9 until 4 o'clock in the main ball room of the Copley on the evening of April 18, for this dance.

Favors in Nature of Surprise
The members of the committee refuse to divulge the secret of the two favors that they are going to distribute to those who attend the prom. They say that they have ordered favors for both the young ladies and gentlemen, but are reticent about telling what the two of them are.

In selecting these memoirs of the occasion, the committee say that they have tried to procure something that will be a possession rather than a mere memoir.

Number of Sign-ups Restricted
There will be no exceptions to the rule that only five sign-ups will be given one man. This rule was made in order that all might be treated with equal justice. This applies to those organizations and parties which desire more than the allotted five per person, that they must have a man in line for every five or fraction thereof. If a party is to be composed of eight couples, and the sign-ups are to be purchased, there must be two men in line to purchase this number.

The price of the tickets will be \$11.50 of which is to be paid at the time the sign-ups are procured, and the remainder at the redemption of these sign-ups. Preliminary dance orders will be given out with the sign-ups.

Names of Men Must Be Submitted
In purchasing signups the men in line must present the names of the men for whom he is purchasing them. In addition, the men who are purchasing sign-ups for men in an organization who desire to sit together are to submit the names of five men in the organization, and the name of the organization, fraternity or club.

Engraved invitations to the Prom will be distributed at the time of the sign-up sale Thursday, or very soon thereafter. Those men who desire them are required to show their sign-ups to obtain them.

Bert Lowe's orchestra, consisting of a selection of his best fifteen pieces, has been secured to play for the Prom on that night. His musicians are well known as regards their ability to handle their respective instrument, having furnished music for sundry Institute affairs.

Extensive Successful Season

THIRD TERM PROGRAM LONG

The Combined Musical Clubs of Technology are in the midst of one of the most successful seasons in their history. During the Christmas vacation they took an extended trip through the middle west, traveling a total of 2500 miles and giving concerts in six cities. During the season seventeen concerts have been given so far, and there are twelve more scheduled for the coming term.

First Concert Successful

The annual Franklin Square Concert was the first of the season, and was a huge success. This took place November 8, and the next concert was not held until December 8. The latter was the trip concert held in Walker Memorial. Three days later the clubs journeyed to Lynn to give their annual Lynn Concert, which was as great a success as usual. There are a great many Technology Alumni in Lynn, and the concert there always is very well supported. On December 9 the Dorchester Concert was given. This was the last local concert before the Winter Trip. There was little activity on the local concerts, as all attention was being focused on the Winter Trip.

Large Attendance at Rochester

Forty men assembled in Rochester, N. Y., December 26, and the next day the clubs gave a concert at the Seneca Hotel which was attended by more than 700 people. The Club's Jazz Band played for the dancing which followed the concert. The same night the clubs special car carried them to Nela Park, where the men inspected the works of the General Electric Company during the morning, and that night the clubs played in Cleveland, and again the Club's Jazz Band entertained the 600 persons who danced after the concert. The next morning the men went through the works of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company at the invitation of Mr. M. C. Brand, who had charge of the concert held the same night in Akron.

Most Distant Concert at Chicago

Friday night the biggest concert of the trip was held in Chicago, the turning point of the trip. The concert was held in the Blackstone Hotel, and was managed by D. Tomlinson '12, secretary of the local club. The next night the clubs played in Rock-

COLONEL CHRISTIAN RETURNS FROM TRIP

Visited Panama Canal Zone and
Porto Rico During Two
Month Trip

After having had a very pleasant trip in the Panama Canal Zone for a month, Colonel J. B. Christian has returned to the Institute to resume his duties as head of the Department of Military Science. Besides visiting the canal zone, Colonel Christian spent several days in Porto Rico visiting the military establishments there with General Bullard, commanding officer of the second corps area, which includes Porto Rico and Panama. As his visit was fortunately in the dry season of the year, he was able to tour the entire zone under the most favorable weather conditions.

Colonel Christian sailed on January 16 from the army base in Brooklyn, New York, aboard the U. S. Army Transport St. Mihiel, which had been scheduled to sail on the eleventh, but had been at sea for several days on an emergency call for aid. On arriving at Porto Rico he was the guest of General Bullard for a few days. During these days, he toured the island by automobile and was present at a reception held for General Bullard in San Juan.

Spends Month in Canal Zone

He arrived at Colon, the entrance to the canal from the Atlantic Ocean, on January 26 and visited the points of interest there for three days. Then going aboard a mine planter, he went through the canal to the Pacific entrance and on the way inspected the locks. Most of his time was spent at Fort Amador where his son-in-law, Captain C. E. Brand, is stationed. He participated in a deer hunt while at the fort and a deer, wild turkey, bear, and wild pig were killed. One of the dogs scared up a mountain lion which unfortunately got away before he could be shot.

Several alligators were shot on an alligator hunt organized during his stay there. The dry season made the golfing extremely fine as the links were in the best condition. He was present at a bull fight held in honor of a noted Spaniard who happened to be touring the country at that time. The fight was not up to the standard usually thought of, as only three bulls were killed out of fourteen led into the ring, the other eleven refusing to fight. One of the unusual sights which Colonel Christian saw, was the hundreds of dead trees which stood half submerged in the flooded area of the Chagres River. He sailed back upon the same vessel as he had made the trip down on, arriving at Brooklyn, New York, on March 10.

Dartmouth Defeated 28-26
When Brown Wins a First
in Last Event

TECHNOLOGY TIES WITH

Jones Features with Double

The swimming of Davy Jones as the Brown anchor man in one of the closest relays ever witnessed in the Boston "Y" was the feature of the New England's, Saturday night. Stew Damon, the New England title holder in the 50 yard dash, was handed a lead of about a foot over Jones, but the Brown star managed to make it all up and forge a few inches ahead at the finish. Dartmouth was over two feet behind, while Technology trailed the Green by a foot.

Considerable trouble was had with the gun in the opening event, the 50 yard dash. Stew Damon won the event with over a foot to spare over Earl Palmer, the Technology star, who nosed out H. F. Taylor of Dartmouth by a like amount. The three, with S. N. Williams of Wesleyan, all took the turn simultaneously, but Damon was there with a stronger finish.

Eiche Wins 220

In the 220 yard swim, Eiche of Dartmouth established an early lead of about five yards. Netzger of Brown closed in rapidly at the finish and was less than a yard behind for second place. Bert Weber put up a good fight, but finished a yard behind Pilat of Wesleyan who was five yards behind the leaders.

Weed of Dartmouth and Morgan of Wesleyan upset all calculations when they secured first and second in the fancy dive. Dawson, the Brown captain, secured third. His teammate, Adams, of whom much had been expected, did not place.
