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SWIMMERS LOSE AS BROWN WINS TITLE

Oxnard just nosed out S. N. Williams of Wesleyan after being led for all but the last yard or two of the race. The Brown star again came through in the 100 yard swim. Stew Damon, who had qualified in the preliminaries, withdrew to save himself for the relay, so Jones was but little worried by his opponents. Taylor of Dartmouth trailed by about a yard, while Jones' teammate, S. P. Metzger, finished three yards behind.

In the plunge, R. P. Bird of Dartmouth outfloated the rest of the field. Southwick of Wesleyan and Gorman of Brown each managed to do 70 feet and split the points for second and third. The Engineer plunger, John Henninger, failed to show up, so Technology had no entries in these events.

Breast Stroke Is Fast
 With Jerry Nauman and Bill Stewart both qualifying in the 100 yard breast stroke, the Engineers pinned

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their hopes on a cleanup in that event. Bill Stewart led till the last lap of the race when Rogers of Dartmouth pulled up and broke into the lead, winning in the fast time of 1 minute, 20 seconds. Reynolds of Brown outfought Stewart for the last ten yards and led him by a matter of inches at the finish. Jerry Nauman dropped a bit behind at the beginning of the race, but fought his way within three yards of the winner on the last lap.

Only four colleges were entered in the relay, Wesleyan not sending down a quartet. At the end of the first leg, Dartmouth, Amherst and Brown were all practically even, with Technology a little over a yard behind. In the next relay Amherst forged a little into the lead, then Brown, Dartmouth and Technology, the last two yards behind. In the third relay Nip Marsh swam like a flash and closed up all but a yard of his disadvantage. Earl Palmer was able to gain on Taylor of Dartmouth but could not quite overtake him for a scoring position. Both Jones of Brown and Damon of Amherst increased their leads over the other two, Jones securing Brown eight points with a win by inches over Damon.
