SPRING CONCERT IS CLIMAX OF SEASON

ford, Ill., and returned to Chicago for New Year's Day. On the way back the clubs stopped to give a concert in Schenectady, and arrived in Boston the next day. This is the third extended trip taken by the clubs, and the second to Chicago, having gone west in the winter of 1916-1917.

The first concert of the second term was given at the Simmons Refectory on January 13. The next concert was the annual Winter Concert, the largest concert held so far this year. Six hundred attended this affair held in the Copley Plaza Hotel on January 27. This was followed five days later by a concert at Framingham Normal School.

A decided hit was made at the Sargent School on February 18, and the clubs were strongly urged to come back for another concert later in the year. It is doubtful if this will be possible, for the schedule of the clubs is so full for the third term that probably no time can be found.

A concert of very high calibre was held in the Colonial Hall, Lowell, February 25. Elaborate arrangements had been made by the Lowell management, and the men stayed over night in Lowell. Another very successful concert was held in Haverhill, March 3, the men staying over night there.

The joint concert in Somerville High School, March 11, was an experiment but rather a disappointment, as a success had been anticipated. At the close of the second term plans were well under way for the Spring Concert, the biggest concert of the year.

Twelve concerts are booked for the third term. The next concert, the first of the term will be held in the Newton High School on Friday, March 24. From then on the clubs will be busy, for concert will follow concert but a few days apart. The schedule for the term follows:

The University of Michigan plans to build a campus theatre to cost approximately \$400,000. It is the intention of the theater committee to have a building to house all campus productions and give Michigan predominance in educational dramatic work. Michigan will be the first university in the country to have a large modern theater of this kind.

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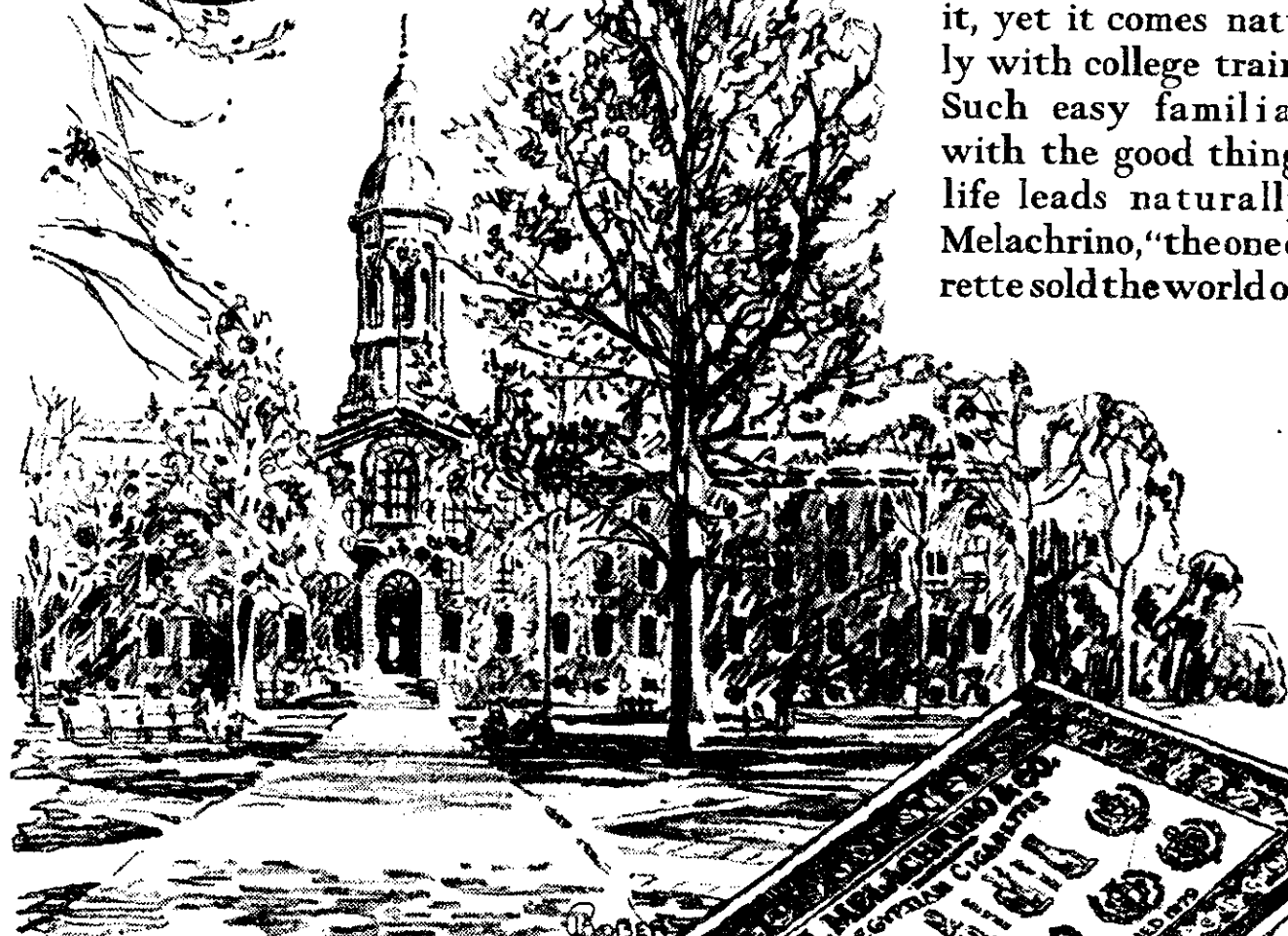
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
