

ENGINEERS HAVE STIFF MEET WITH GREEN RUNNERS

First Time in Two Years That
Institute Men Have
Met Dartmouth

1921 BATTLE RESULTED IN ONE POINT VICTORY

Penn Defeated Green by Same
Score as Harvard Handed
Technology

After a lapse of two years in track relations, Technology and Dartmouth met on the Hanover track again this afternoon for what is confidently predicted to develop into the hardest and closest fought battle the Institute track men will have on their hands this season.

The results of last Saturday's collegiate track meets, when Dartmouth was defeated by Penn under a score almost identical with that by which Harvard won from Frank Kanaly's charges, indicates that the two contenders for the favor of Dartmouth's Junior Week guests will start from scratch when it comes to gathering points and that they will be close together when the last races are over.

The victory which Billy McMahon's cohorts were able to pin on Dartmouth two years ago has never been forgotten by the Green, and it is certain that with the added inducement of a Junior Week meet, the Hanover athletes will go the limit to turn the tables on Captain Art Smith's men. On the other hand the Engineers will put forth every effort to repeat their victory of the other year, in addition Coach Kanaly's men are still keeping in mind the many heart breaking finishes of last Saturday with the Crimson team, so all indications point to a meet of hotly contested finishes in all events.

Teams Evenly Matched

Dartmouth was forced to bow to Penn by the score of 88-47 at the same time the Engineers were making Harvard go to the limit for a 81-54 victory. Although the scores indicate how closely the two teams are matched, it is even more clearly seen in the way the two teams pushed their opponents in most of the events.

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OPINIONS DIFFER ON HONOR SYSTEM

Opposed. While Chemicals
Favor Adoption

There has recently been proposed the idea that the Institute Committee take up the subject of an Honor System. This plan was seconded by F. P. Knight '23, President of the Combined Professional Societies. When interviewed on the subject, E. W. Bruggmann '24, recently elected head of the Chemical Society said that he would like to see the Institute Committee take up the idea. In case they did not see fit to act or, rejected the idea, he said that he would like to see the various courses take it up by means of their societies.

He said further that he took this stand because he felt that the experiment in an Honor System by the men in Course X had been a great success and he would like to see the other parts of the Institute enjoy such a system. The feeling of the men in Corporation XV is very different as expressed at a meeting some time ago. At that time there was little action taken and there seemed to be the feeling that they were not in favor of the scheme. One of the members of the Corporation said that in his opinion, the feeling of the society was that the conditions were not right here for such a move. If, however, the Institute Committee should decide to accept such a measure, he felt sure that the men of the Corporation would stick by the decision.

Kingsley resented what were considered the most serious of the faults uncovered at the probe committee meeting on Tuesday afternoon, and he received strong support from R. P. Shaw '23, president of the Senior Class, who spoke from the chair. The investigation follows a demand by Shaw last Saturday afternoon that the paper either print half of the front page and a five column flyer on the Senior endowment story Monday morning, or be investigated. Aero Society Prize Dropping from Plane Carried Over River

Corbett of Atlantic Airway Corporation Addresses Society Meeting

Yesterday afternoon at 5:10 o'clock, Pres. V. G. Weaver, of the Aero Society, flew over the Institute and released from his plane a parachute with a letter entitling the finder to a free airplane ride and membership to the Aero Society for next year.

The high wind that was blowing at the time took the parachute over the Charles River to the Boston side. Many men made a run for the other side in automobiles, motorcycles and on foot but none were successful. It passed over the Common at an elevation of about 200 feet and is thought to have landed somewhere in the vicinity of Boylston and Washington streets. At the meeting of the society held last evening no one showed up with the letter carried by the parachute so that it is practically certain that no Institute man found it last night.

It was expected that the president of the Sky Writing Company of America would be present at the meeting to tell of the work his company is doing in writing advertisements in letters half a mile high on the sky. He has done this several times over Boston with considerable success.

The principle speaker was Maj. Corbett, President of the Atlantic Airways Corporation, who discussed the offer of training made to Institute men some time ago.

G. L. Mead of the Wright Aeronautical Corporation of Paterson, N. J., also spoke. President Weaver of the society later told of the plans of various members to build gliders and enter the International Gliding Competition that is to be held in Oakland, California this August.

RESULTS IN TWO LOWER CLASSES FOUND STRAIGHT

'23 Conduct Wordy Battle
Before Action

At a two and a half hour meeting of the Institute Committee yesterday afternoon the elections of the Classes of 1925 and 1926 were ratified, while a motion to ratify the election of the Class of 1924 was tabled pending the results of a referendum to the class which the committee had passed by a vote of 24 to 9 earlier in the meeting.

The real fight of the afternoon centered around the petition asking for a referendum from the class on its election. The petition for a referendum was started at three o'clock yesterday after petitions asking for a new election and for permission for those to vote who had been denied the opportunity had been refused by the Executive Committee of the Institute Committee.

Get 26 Signatures

Hurriedly passing the petition through one lecture section and securing only 26 signatures due to this fact, the petition was taken to a meeting of the Executive Committee held at 3 o'clock. Here it was decided to refer the petition to the Institute Committee. At this meeting a petition for a new election was also refused.

After preliminary skirmishes which included the accepting of the reports of the Executive Committee meetings yesterday and last Sunday and the retaining on the table of a motion to accept the report of the Elections Committee, T. M. Taylor '23, moved that the Institute Committee have a referendum of the Class of 1924 to see if it desired a new election.

C. C. Taylor Backs Result

C. C. Taylor '23, immediately secured the floor. He said that it was a three to one bet that a referendum would result in a new election, for all who had voted for a defeated candidate would favor the revote. He added later that there should not be a new election unless the one just held
