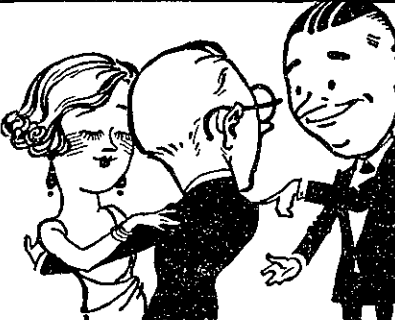

was proved unofficial. He also said that he believed this one was fair and that the Course II men could have voted.

T. M. Taylor in reply stated that the dissatisfaction was righteous in this case, because the results of the election might easily have been changed by the votes of those who were disfranchised. By disfranchised he did not mean that the men were physically unable to vote, but that conditions had discouraged coming back to try to vote.

He further pointed out that if the referendum went through the men elected as a result would have the support of the class, while if the referendum was defeated it would mean a vote of confidence for those already elected. He then stated that "a referendum will clear the air, and is the only thing that will clear the air."

At this point H. G. Gray '23, offered the first of six proposed amendments to the effect that the referendum not be accepted as valid unless a majority of the class voted either for or against it, but Taylor refused to accept the amendment on the grounds that all those opposed to the new election, could easily prevent it by not voting on the referendum, for seldom does 50 per cent of a class vote at all.

G. E. Barnes Provides Laugh
Referring back to whether members of the class had been disfranchised or not, G. E. Barnes '23 told the story of a captain of a steamer which was scheduled to sail for England. In the middle of the ocean the captain decided he wanted to go to South America instead, so he announced to the passengers that the ship was going there, but that any desiring to go on to England were perfectly able to do so, as there were plenty of rowboats aboard.

There was some discussion on the fact that although several were claimed to have been disfranchised, no one had appeared before the Executive Committee to make such a statement. To this G. F. Nesbitt, Jr. '23, replied that the constitution said that appeal was to be made by petition, thus implying that it was not necessary for the aggrieved party to appear in person.

Next came some discussion on what was meant by disfranchisement. C. C. Taylor caused surprise by saying that since the beginning of the meeting he had changed his mind, and now favored a referendum only among those who had not voted. However when this was offered as an amendment to his motion, T. M. Taylor refused to accept it.

Soon after this the motion was put to a vote. Men voting by proxy had to present written evidence of the fact, and the vote was taken by a roll-call. As was stated above, the motion for a referendum was passed by a vote of 24 to 9.

CHEMICALS HEAR DR. STRATTON AT DINNER

Banquet at Riverbank Last Night
Addressed by Faculty Men

Dr. Stratton's speech at the Chemical Society's annual banquet held last night at the Riverbank Hotel, was based on the cooperation which outside organizations are giving to the various departments of the Institute. He brought out the idea that leaders, rather than mere factory foremen and managers are developed here.

Dr. Keyes said that the training of the mind which the Institute strives to give is more valuable to the industrial world than a mere accumulation of facts in the mind of the graduate.

Dr. Haslam urged his hearers to take advantage of their youth after graduating. He said that a man's greatest deeds are usually accomplished before he is thirty years old. His advice was to "hit the world hard at first."

Dr. Little spoke of the great development of chemistry up to the present and saw no reason why that development should not continue on even a greater scale in the future.

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
