Eddy's work has been better than Porter's in regard to the period of time from the first of the season, so with the form shown by Lou, the pair would have made a strong addition to the Cambridge teams list of entries.

Elmer Sanborn and Nazro will compete for honors in the mile run, Sanborn ran a great race Saturday and can be depended upon to give the Dartmouth runner a real race. In addition Keplinger has shown enough, so that Technology might count on another place. In the two mile, Bob Hendrie can be looked upon as having a little edge on things, although he probably will be forced to give all he has to come out victor. Young of Dartmouth came in second at Penn, the winner taking the run in 9 minutes, 44 seconds. Bob lead the field against the Crimson by a full 36 yards, but he will be forced to extend himself today.

Races Will Be Close

Dartmouth has the high jump on ice as Leroy Brown will represent the Hanover school. Brown is the world's record holder for the indoor high jump and in the Penn meet he cleared the bar at 6 feet 2 inches, but McArdle and Bill Greenough will be right there competing for second place. Greenough easily took the measure of the crimson jumpers Saturday. Art Smith looks like a winner in the quarter. He has a record well under 51 seconds, while Foster won the run at Penn in 51 3-5 seconds. The other events bid fair to be as close.

In the field events the Engineers will be well represented. The records turned in by the weight men have shown that Technology cannot be any longer classed as being weak in the field events. Dexter will be the Engineer's best bet in the hammer throw and according to the records there will be a battle for a win in this event. Swenson of Dartmouth tossed the hammer 134 ft. 7 inches, in the Penn meet, while Dexter won Saturday by a throw of 136 feet 10 1-4 inches. Stearns will be in the pole vault and Stewart will represent the Engineers in the broad jump. Cainfield of the Hanover team has 21 feet, 9 inches to his credit in the Penn meet, while Al did 21 1-2 against Harvard.

Dartmouth will face a much stronger team than they met two years ago and the meet will be a more closely contested affair. Coach Kanaly is taking twenty two men on the trip. The list of men who go are: Captain Art Smith, Stewart, Porter, Gurney, Snow,

Class Crews Meet in Annual Race for the Richards Cup Tomorrow

150 Pound Crew Meets Harvard Lightweights—Frosh Race Stone

Tomorrow will be the busy day for all the courses on the Charles with Technology entered in three outside races and the annual Richards Cup race for class crews. The Stone first freshman race is scheduled for 2:30 o'clock, the class races for 3:30 o'clock and the Harvard-Technology 150-pound race for 5 o'clock.

A good deal of interest is centered on the 150 pound contest since it is the first time these two crews have met, though they practice on the basin every day. Both the contestants have raced with the Stone School eight and both were beaten. The crimson boat has since defeated Stone in a second race, however, while no second contest for the Institute crew has been held.

150's in Usual Lineup

This improvement in the Harvard eight has been paralleled by a considerable improvement on the part of the Technology 150 pounders too, so that they are in much better form now than at the time of the Stone race, and a fight to a finish is in order. The usual lineup with Smith, Taylor, Goble, Rosseau, Butler, Dunbar, Davis, Evans in stroke and Reid as cox will cover the Henley course tomorrow.

Class Racers Compete

The class races tomorrow will be between an experienced freshman second crew, Sophomore and Junior eights of some experience, and a Senior boat that is not yet formed. The Seniors that are rowing on the varsity boats and no others have come out to make up the class crew, though strenuous efforts are being made to gather eight men together for a showing and an attempt to get 1923 on the new cup.

Classes Race on Field Day Course

This is the first time that the Richards Cup Races have been held, the trophy having been presented to the M. I. T. A. A. Wednesday evening at the annual Award Dinner. It is to be inscribed with the numerals of the winning crew each year, remaining in the possession of the M. I. T. A. A. The races will cover the Field Day course, finishing in front of Walker

Memorial.

Having been unsuccessful in their first contest with the fast Stone combination, the first frosh eight will meet them again tomorrow. They lost by about three lengths before, over the Henley course, but will try to leave their opponents behind over the same distance in the coming race.

It is reported that due to injuries to Lauria, Coleman and Harriman, the junior varsity race scheduled with Harvard junior varsity will have to be indefinitely delayed, and no arrangements have as yet been made to set another date. While the injuries of the men are unfortunate in the light of spoiling a good race with the Crimson, the fact that the remainder of the junior varsity boat will be available for class crews should make a big difference in the results of the Richards Cup Races, for the dismantled boat is composed almost entirely of upper-classmen whose services will be welcomed in their respective class boats.

Seniors Defeat Frosh in Scrub Team Contest

With a team on the field that contained only a few regulars in the lineup the freshman baseball team was defeated by the Senior nine, 3-0, Wednesday afternoon. The game only lasted for five innings and it is expected that it will be played over again. Most of the freshman decided that there would be no game due to the weather and went home. In order to get a full team Dave Shepard, the frosh manager, went through Walker scouting freshmen and finally succeeded in getting nine men on the diamond.

Nichols Trims Atkinson

Nichols defeated Atkinson in a five inning baseball game yesterday afternoon by a score of 7 to 0. Harry Kelly pitched airtight ball for the winners, while Whitaker was hit hard, Bill Vicinus and Bud Robertson socking out homers.

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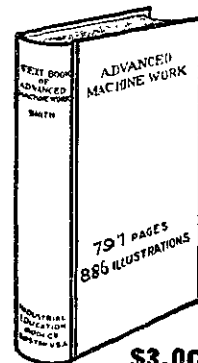
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
