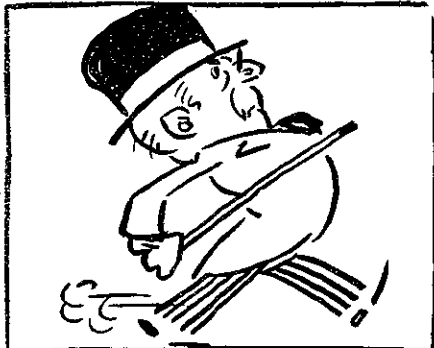


— TECHNOLOGY STRIVES FOR FINAL POSSESSION OF CUP —

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TECH FIELD IS SCENE OF NEW ENGLAND MEET

Williams, Brown, Bates, and Wesleyan have teams which will be fighting every minute and these colleges can turn the meet one way or the other for the Engineers or for Boston College by placing men in a few of the leading positions. Hence it will almost be a question of luck which of the two leading contenders will benefit by the victories of the other schools.

Technology Has Slight Edge
In regard to the comparative standing of the Engineers and Boston College, Capt. Art Smith's men seem to have a very slight advantage over the Boston outfit. The track events will be hotly contested throughout. Last Saturday the B. C. team carried off the Eastern Intercollegiate Athletic Association meet by a margin of 12 points. The 220, and 120 yard high hurdles went to the local team, in addition to the 880 and the one mile run. Owing to the chilly wind and sloppy condition of the track it is impossible to use any of the times as a basis for a real comparison of the strength of the teams.

Technology has a little advantage in the weight events. The B. C. team is not as strong in this department as they were last season, while Coach Kanaly has developed material well for these events, and the cardinal and gray team are stronger in the weights than they have been for a number of years.

Big Entry List
Nineteen teams are entered in this year's New England, and while all of the teams are sure to put up a hard battle, it can easily be seen who will be near the top of the scoring list. Williams has Miller who did the 100 in 9 and 9-10 seconds in the Wesleyan meet. Coleman, also of Williams, crossed the tape in the 120 yard high hurdles in the time of 15 and 7-10 seconds.

In the 440-run Bates has a good man in Archibald who has turned in some fast times. Amherst has Darling entered in the high jump who will put the other entries to a stiff test to carry away the event. All these men will very likely be the deciding factor in either the Engineers' or Boston College's victory, as they will be able to swing the meet one way or the other if the score is very close.

Necessary To Remove Fence
How much the meet is affecting the general run of events at the track house can be seen from the commotion the entry of Tootell of Bowdoin has caused. For the first time the fence along the road has been removed for this event so as the visiting weight man will not damage any of the Institute's property. Last year he won the event by a hammer throw of 157 ft. 10 1-8 inches.

Darling of Amherst will also be in the pole vault, his vault of 11 ft. 5 1/2 inches carried off the event last season. In the quarter mile Capt. Stowers of Williams will push Art Smith to the utmost, and this event promises to be one of the best on the list. In the Williams-Wesleyan meet Stowers did the quarter in 49 and 4-10 seconds and it remains to be seen if he can repeat the performance Saturday.

Williams has a fast man in Keep who turned in 2 minutes and 6-10 seconds for the half mile. Tierney of Holy Cross also looms as a competitor for Art Smith; in the 440 he captured the event in the Eastern College meet.

Mile Events To Technology
The mile looks like a Technology event as Elmer Sanborn is the logical winner of this. He has been doing consistently around 4 min. 32 sec.; last year he walked off with the event in 4 min. 31-2-5 sec. A number of other men are entered who make the run in 4 min., 33 sec., but there seems to be no entry who will press the Engineer runner. Cavanaugh of B. C. and Knowles of Wesleyan will be contenders for places.

Hendrie appears to be the best bet in the two mile. He won the run in the Dartmouth meet in 9 min., 56 4-5 secs. The other entries have turned in times which are above the Engineer runner's clocking, and although some of the men may press Hendrie, it will take a mighty fast

man to cross the tape ahead of the veteran Engineer.

The track events will be close from the start. Hersey won the 220 low hurdles against Dartmouth in 26 1-5 sec., while Sullivan of B. C. was victor in the meet Saturday in 27 4-5 seconds, but the weather conditions were so bad that all the times were necessarily slow. Blodgett for the Engineers and Merrick of B. C. are pretty evenly matched and the 120 high hurdles are sure to provide a good race.

In the field events Technology has a little advantage, but they will be closely contested. Flahive of B. C. will compete in the high jump and will give plenty of competition. The following schools are entered in the New England: Amherst, Bates, Boston College, Boston University, Bowdoin, Brown, Colby, Holy Cross, Mass. Agricultural College, New Hampshire State, Maine, Wesleyan, Williams, Worcester Polytechnical, Trinity, Vermont, Norwich, Rhode Island State, Middlebury and M. I. T.

TENNIS MEN WILL MEET DARTMOUTH

Princeton To Meet Engineers on Saturday Afternoon at Longwood

On Friday afternoon at two o'clock Dartmouth's tennis team will play the Engineers at the Longwood Courts. Dartmouth has lost one match this season which was won by the West Side Club of Forest Hills by a score of 4-2. Dartmouth has defeated University of Penn., Wesleyan, and Harvard Business School.

The order of Dartmouth's tennis players is: Capt. Howe, Osgood, Gray, Smith. In the doubles they pair off, Howe and Osgood, Gray and Smith.

The Engineers, encouraged by their showing at Annapolis, are very optimistic about the results of this match and all future matches.

On Saturday afternoon Princeton's tennis team will play the Engineers on the Longwood Courts at two o'clock. Princeton is considered one of Tech's strongest opponents and the match should be one of the most exciting and most difficult that the Engineers will have to play this season.

Captain Tremaine will not be able to play in either of these matches, due to the soreness of his shoulder. Captain Tremaine's loss will be keenly felt by all members of the team. It has not been definitely decided who will be the sixth man to represent Tech in these matches, but in all probability Miller will be chosen to take the place left vacant by Captain Tremaine.

The match with Harvard, which was to be played last week and was postponed, will be played on May 24 at the Divinity Courts.

Test matches will be held tonight to determine the final ranking of Technology's tennis team and who, with Captain Tremaine, will represent Tech in the New England tournament in the near future. Russell, who is ranking man No. 2, if not defeated tonight in the test matches, will be Tech's other representative in the New England tournament.

SENIORS WILL PLAY SOPHOMORES TODAY

Junior Team Leading in Interclass Series With a Perfect Record

The last game between these two camps, turned out to be a slug-fest, with the Seniors polling out hits enough for 13 runs, while the Sophs were able to drag in 6.

Today and Saturday mark the last two games on the Sophomore list, while the other teams all have a few more to go, largely as a result of rainy afternoons.

The Junior team still heads the list for the interclass series with a perfect record, and judging by the margins piled up in most of the games, are in no danger of being headed. Junior Varsity Meets Harvard on Henley Course This Afternoon

This week brings the rowing season for the Technology oarsmen practically to a close. Tomorrow the Varsity and 150 pound crews leave for New York for their last races, meeting the Columbia varsity and Junior varsity on Saturday, and this afternoon the Institute's Junior varsity has its last contest, opposing Harvard on the Henley course.

In racing against the Columbia eight, the Varsity will be opposing the crew that so easily left Penn and Princeton behind in its first race. Since then this crew has lost to Yale but nevertheless is capable of some mighty fast work. The contest with Syracuse May 5 showed that the Institute varsity has improved much since the first of the season, especially in the matter of picking up the stroke at the finish, and they will be at their best.

Second Varsity Was to Take Trip

As originally planned, the second Varsity was to take the Columbia trip this week-end. However, several members of this crew have been unable to row the last week and have made the choosing of a new lineup necessary. This less practiced outfit yesterday raced the 150 pounders to see which eight would make the better showing, and the latter boat won by several lengths, thus getting the trip. The Varsity also covered the course, finishing in the lead by a short distance of open water.

The two crews are leaving tomorrow night, taking with them their shells and oars. For every race away from the home course that the Institute oarsmen have rowed so far this season they have found it impossible to take their own boats, and have had to race in strange ones. This time they will not be so handicapped and should be at their best.

A word of advice from the Pacific coast which has particular application to students here at the Institute is that of Professor Charles Sherman, head of the psychology department at Willamette University. Professor Sherman says, "Don't work and attend school at the same time. It is not well to combine work and study. A student should spend his entire time on studies while at college, and then, if necessary, drop out for a time to earn sufficient funds to continue."

Professor Sherman has made his way up to his professorship entirely by his own efforts and ought to be in a position to say. He believes that students nowadays are in too much of a hurry to get through school; he spent 13 years getting an education himself. "The best years to spend in college are between 20 and 24," he said.
