

"NEW ELECTION" IS DECISION OF 1924 BY YESTERDAY'S VOTE

COUNT IS 185 TO 84--TUESDAY WILL DECIDE OFFICERS

G. W. Hall, Jr., Replaces C. C.
Taylor as Head of Elec-
tions Committee

In the referendum held yesterday by the Class of 1924, the Juniors decided that they wanted a new election. Out of 269 votes cast, 185 were "Yes" and 84 were "No." As a result of this a new election will be held at which time officers of next year's Senior Class will be chosen.

The candidates in the new election will be the same as those in the first one, since no fault was found with the nominations. The new elections will be held next Tuesday, it has been announced, and it is probable that the place and hours of voting will be the same as those of yesterday.

C. C. Taylor Resigns

The referendum was ratified by the Institute Committee yesterday afternoon, and it was announced at the same time that C. C. Taylor '23, had resigned from the chairmanship of the Elections Committee. He did this, it was stated, because he had been sick recently and because he had very much school work to do before graduation.

Taylor was sick in bed most of yesterday, but he had made arrangements with the rest of his committee so that the election went off without a hitch. However, he got up and came over after the polls closed to help in the count. Satisfaction was expressed with the voting room, and all regulations of the Institute Committee were enforced.

New Election Tuesday

A new Elections Committee was appointed yesterday at the Institute Committee meeting, of which G. W. Hall, Jr., '23, is to be temporary chairman. The constitution states that "he shall be one of the two delegates to the Institute Committee elected by the Senior Class" but H. L. Hayden '23, the other member than Taylor, is out of town, so Hall is to act instead.

The election is being held Tuesday so that it may be ratified at a special meeting of the Institute Committee called for next Thursday. At this meeting the new committee will be installed, unless something unforeseen occurs.

Parliamentary procedure made the ratification of the referendum very complicated. First the motion to ratify the Class of 1924 elections had to be taken off the table. It was then defeated. Next a report of the referendum was accepted, after which Hall was put in charge of the new election.

COL. C. R. GOW ADDRESSES CIVILS AT HOTEL LENOX

"Every person in the country who has more than a dollar saved is a capitalist," said Col. C. R. Gow in a talk on industries and engineering at the annual banquet of the Civil Engineering Society held at the Hotel Lenox last night.

Owners of industries, he showed, derived no more benefit from their property than the millions of people who used the products and who make their living working for the owners. This universal usefulness of industries, coupled with the great increase in the number of industries in this country makes the chance for individual success in business and engineering greater than ever before, according to Col. Gow.

Before Col. Gow's talk short speeches were given by Professor C. M. Spofford, head of the Department of Civil and Sanitary Engineering, Professor C. F. Allen, also of the same department, and Professor Dwight Porter.

The affair closed with the announcement and formal introduction of the new officers of the Civil Engineering Society.

In addition to ratifying the referendum and appointing a new Elections Committee, the present Institute Committee at its last regular meeting of the year, accepted the reports of several of the Standing Committees and ratified the elections of the officers and managements for the coming year of several of the activities.

It was announced that the T. C. A. had been given the right to publish a "Tech Blotter" and that all profits from this would go to that organization. Emphasis was also placed on the fact that no other blotter would be sanctioned by the Committee as officially representing the Institute.

Recommend Sunday Rowing

The report of the Boathouse Committee made by R. H. Smith '23, was accepted. It contained a recommendation that permission be obtained from the proper authorities to use the boathouse for rowing on Sundays. It also announced the appointment of G. H. Cowan '24, as chairman for next year, which was ratified by the Institute Committee by a separate motion.

Figures contained in the report of the finance committee, which was accepted, show that the total business transacted by Institute activities in the last year amounted to over \$156,000. Another interesting item was the fact that although the Junior Prom Committee handled over \$5000, it made a profit of only \$25, approximately.

In the Budget Committee report, it was stated that the Institute Committee

SENIOR FUND NOT GREATLY ENLARGED

All Money Paid Will Be Paid
Over to Institute at
End of Time

No great increase in the Senior Endowment Fund has been noticed in the past week. The total principal now stands at 118,000 with 66% of the class enrolled. Two more fraternities have reached 100% since the last announcement. These are Theta XI and Kappa Beta Phi.

The committee is surprised to find that a rather widespread opinion has arisen to the effect that in the endowment policy plan in case a policy has to lapse in the years to come that all the money already paid in has to be forfeited. This is an error, for in the regular insurance plan as offered, should such a case arise all the money paid in plus the accrued dividends would be turned into the fund at the time of the lapse and would then continue to draw interest compounded annually for the remainder of the twenty-five-year period, with the deduction of only a fraction of a per cent of the income to defray handling charges by the company.

The committee will receive at any time up to May 30, subscriptions from those who may decide to enroll. Such members of the class are requested to apply to R. H. Smith '23, Chairman of the Committee.

NEW ENGLANDS BEST ATHLETES HERE FOR MEET

Hendrie, Bemis and Heap Out of
Events Due to Sickness—
Boston College Looms

All preparations have been completed for Technology to act as host to the nineteen other colleges who will compete in the New England Intercollegiate Track and Field Meet held today and tomorrow on Technology Field. With the preliminary trials scheduled to start at four o'clock today and the finals at two tomorrow afternoon Technology will be the scene for two days of strenuous and hard fought track contests. Indications seem to promise fine weather for both days, and with the field of entries that will strive for the Intercollegiate laurels, one of the most hotly contested and close meets that has occurred in many a year is expected.

The two teams that loom up as the real contenders for the title are Boston College and Technology. The two teams are very closely matched, although it was conceded that the Engineers had a little edge over the Boston outfit, judging from the past records of the teams and comparing their strength in the various departments of the meet, but with three of Coach Kanaly's best men preparing to be out of things entirely, due to illness or injuries, the two teams are about as evenly matched now as they possibly could be.

Instructions at
Meeting

Scenarios for Tech Show 1924 are due on Saturday, June 2. Final books will be called in about the second week of next year. These were the dates announced at the meeting of scenario writers in east lounge last Wednesday afternoon. General Manager E. P. Dunlaevy '24, gave out the conditions necessary for entering scenarios in the contest.

It is not necessary to enter a scenario, but in so doing valuable hints will be given by the judges of the contest to the expectant playwright. A number of more than four figures should be placed on the scenario and an envelope with the same number on the outside should accompany it. The name and summer address of the author are enclosed in the envelope. This is done in order to insure the picking of the show without any chance of favoritism.

Plot Should Be Humorous

E. F. Hodgins '22, author of Tech Show 1922, spoke to the meeting and dropped a few useful hints which he had found valuable. He particularly emphasized the fact that one can change the original plan for the play if at any time it is found that such a change will benefit the action.
