

19 COLLEGES COMPETING ON TECH FIELD TODAY AND TOMORROW

CLIMAX OF SIX YEARS TODAY AND TOMORROW

Hendrie, Bemis, and Heap Out

Although there is the slenderest of possibilities that Bob Hendrie, Technology's star two-miler, may be able to compete, it is practically safe to say that he will not be able to carry the Engineer's colors in his favorite event. He has been sick in bed with a severe case of tonsillitis and it is not likely that the doctors will allow him to run. As he could be counted on to bring in the first place in the two mile, his absence puts a question mark in an event that could be put in the list of sure points for the Engineers.

Bemis, another Technology entry in the two-mile, will probably be absent in the line of starters, and that puts another damper on the Engineers' hopes in this run. Eddie Heap, who pulled a tendon while running a great race in the Harvard meet, has not recovered yet and so will not represent the Institute in the dashes or the broad jump.

B. C. to Give Hard Battle

With Technology possessing a clean record for six years and with Boston College tying Coach Kanaly's men last year, these two local teams will put up the hardest kind of a fight. In addition B. C. has especially high hopes after winning the Eastern Intercollegiate last Saturday. If the Engineers are able to carry off the meet tomorrow, they will obtain the final possession of the cup.

Last year the Institute team trailed Boston College to the very end, then Captain Chittick and Bob Hershey came through and evened up the points so that the Engineers still kept an undefeated record for six years. Today and tomorrow will show if the Cambridge team can get the cup permanently.

Both teams are so closely matched in the track events it is impossible to make predictions, although the Engineers are conceded to have a little advantage in the field events. The B. U. team won the meet last Saturday by a margin of 12 points, but the weather conditions were such that it is impossible to form any opinions on the strength of the team by the times made then.

Many Colleges Have Stars

The meet will by no means be confined to Technology and Boston College as a number of other schools have a formidable array of athletes entered, and if either of the two teams that seem to have the edge on the meet fall below the standard set for them, one of the other strong teams will be right after the title. And again, the teams who are not generally considered as being in line for the championship will hold the fate of the two leaders in their hands for the meet will very likely hinge on one or two of the leading events, and if one of the schools outside of Technology or B. C. secures a number of these places it will be the deciding factor in determining the winner.

The meet will find only six winners of last year's intercollegiate competing today and tomorrow for more than half of last year's season champions are lost by graduation. The marks of those in this year's intercollegiate as compared with those made by the various men last year taken as a whole are lower, but the weather conditions have greatly handicapped the men this season.

Records Likely to Go

At least one new record is likely to be established, and that is for the hammer throw. The record now stands at 164 ft. 8½ in. made by Bailey of Maine nine years ago. Fred Tootell of Bowdoin is the man who is looked to break this mark. He won the event last year by a throw of 157 ft., but there is no telling what he will do tomorrow as he has exceeded 170 ft. many times and has tossed the hammer 180 ft. in practice.

Miller can be expected to make fast time in the 100 as he did the dash in 9.9-10 sec. recently. Of the six winners of last year who will compete all of them seem to be right in the fore as to their event. Dodge of Williams will put up a great battle with Miller in the century. Elmer Sanborn will carry the Engineers to the front in the mile. Reid of Brown will be in the broad again, he jumped 22 ft. 5 in. in order to win last meet. Tootell of Bowdoin in the hammer. Clark of Amherst in the high jump, and Darling, also of Amherst, in the pole vault. Three of the above men who participated in the last intercollegiate seem to have the edge in their event, Tootell, Clark, and Reid, but the other three seem to have their work cut out for them. Dodge will have no easy time in the dash, and Elmer Sanborn will have to watch out for Cavanaugh of B. C. in the mile. Bishop of Bowdoin has a much better record in the pole vault than Darling of Amherst.

Technology's Entries

In the 100 Porter will be the Engineer's best bet; he showed his ability in the Harvard meet and can be looked upon for a good race. Captain Art Smith will run in the 220 and can be expected to come through well. Por-

ter, Gurney, and Webster are also entered in this event. Art Smith looks mighty good in the 440 and he will do his best to clip some time off the existing record. Charlie Snow, Glen Bateman, and Phelps are the Engineers' hope in the 880 run.

Elmer Sanborn can be depended upon to put forth every effort in the mile, and he has a slight edge on the event, although he will have his hands full with the other entries. Keplinger and Poore will put up a battle in this event along with Elmer. With Bob Hendrie and Bemis probably missing from the Engineers' lineup in the two mile, the event will rest on the shoulders of Allis and Holt. Allis put up a great race at Dartmouth and both he and Holt will do all they can to fill Hendrie's shoes.

Hurdles Will Be Close

In the 120 yd. high hurdles Blodgett and Dexter will be the sole entries of the Institute team. Both are capable men and will be in the fore. Hershey, who saved the day last year by coming in third in the low hurdles, will compete for a win this time. Ambach, Boardman, and Read also will run this event. Greenough and McArdle will have their work cut out for them in the high jump; both have been doing well in the past meets. Eddie Heap's loss on the broad jump will be felt, but Stewart will be right on the job. McClean, McArdle, are also entered in this event.

Coach Kanaly will have Phil Stearns in the pole vault, and Dexter, Jeff Drew, and Holmes in the hammer throw. Dexter has been tossing the hammer well and should make some counters for the Engineers. He, with Pete Shipley in the shot put, will be the cardinal and gray's entries, while Dexter is entered in the discus with Tyron, Caine and Johnston, Garrard, Holt, Holmes and Williams are entered in the javelin.

440 To Be Hard Fought

Capt. Art Smith, Tierney of Holy Cross, Stowers of Williams, and Archibald of Bates will put up a royal battle for the honors. Stowers has done something under 50 sec., and with Art Smith at his best a great run will be seen in the 440 yd. In the one mile, Elmer Sanborn will have plenty of competition with Pat Mahoney of B. C. and Cavanaugh, also of B. C., entered. Both the Boston College men have been showing up mighty well.

With Bob Hendrie out of the two mile it is a struggle between Holt and a number of entries who have turned in times which are pretty closely matched. The hurdles are going to be an open scramble for places with Bob Merrick of B. C., Hardy of Bowdoin, and Blodgett and Dexter all making bids for position.

SIGNALERS TO INSPECT WESTERN UNION PLANT

The Technology Signal Battalion plans to make a pair of inspection trips to the central plant of the Western Union Telegraph Company tomorrow and next Tuesday. Each party will leave the main lobby at 1:30 o'clock for the plant on Congress street. There they will see the actual use of numerous complicated instruments enabling the handling of modern complex wire traffic systems. One of the most important of such instruments is the machine which automatically prints telegraphic messages at the rate of about 60 words a minute.

The trips are open to all Sophomores in the electrical courses, and Juniors and Seniors interested. Those intending to go must sign on the place provided on the bulletin board opposite room 10-100. No party will make the trip unless 15 men sign up for it.

Explain Civil Service

At the request of the Division of Industrial Co-operation and Research the Civil Service Commission is sending their representative, Mr. H. E. Morgan, to give a talk on the service today in room 10-250 at 4 o'clock. Mr. Morgan, who is in charge of public information and recruiting for the commission, will discuss the opportunities for technically trained workers in the government service.

The Reclassification Act, recently passed by Congress, provides for a standardization of positions and offers a much more attractive salary range than formerly provided. He will explain the provisions of this act and show how it improves the former unstandardized positions fixed by statutory and lump sum appropriation lists.

Camp Devens, Engineering Camp

Word has been received from the R. O. T. C. Office at Corps Area Headquarters, Army Base, that in addition to the Engineer Unit from the Technology R. O. T. C., Units from the following colleges and universities will be represented at Camp Devens this summer: Yale, Norwich, New Hampshire State, Maine, Vermont, Rhode Island State, Massachusetts Aggies, Boston University, Connecticut Aggies, Michigan, Marion Institute (Ala.), and Staunton Military Academy (Va.).

Bob Hendrie Out of New Englands



As the only disturbing feature of Technology's participation in the New Englands, comes the news that Bob Hendrie, whose place as New England two-mile champion seemed the most settled result of the big meet, is ill with tonsillitis and will not be able to compete.

Bob's three years of consistent work as a winner were to have been brought to a climax in this, the big meet of the year for Technology track men, and his loss to the team comes as a sudden one. While there still exists the barest possibility that the game little runner will be able to run his race, advices from his doctors are forbidding.

CREWS ROW COLUMBIA EIGHTS IN NEW YORK

Harvard Junior Varsity Races on Charles This Afternoon—New Seatings Made

Today Technology's Varsity and 150 pound crews will get their last workouts in preparation for their final races this season. The oarsmen left last night with their shells for New York and will race the Columbia Varsity and Junior Varsity over the Henley distance tomorrow.

These contests are to be with crews whose season have been quite successful and will probably be as stiff as any the Institute crews have had this year, with the possible exception of the Navy races. However, the improvement shown by both eights since the Annapolis trip is such that they will put forth a different performance tomorrow.

Taking Two Substitutes

Considerable trouble has been experienced in the last few weeks on both lineups on account of men laid up with infections. It is expected that both crews will row in their regular seatings but a substitute for each shell is making the trip to be available if necessary. Don Murdock is varsity sub and Jack Tench will hold this job for the 150 pounders.

The workouts of the eights yesterday were handicapped by strange shells, their regular boats having been dismantled for the trip. Both boats are rowing in better form than at any other time this season and are expecting to put up speedy fights for supremacy over their last opponents.

Harvard Junior Race Today

Postponed several times, the race of the Junior Varsity with the Harvard second eight is now scheduled for this afternoon. The crews are to cover the mile and seven-eighths course, starting shortly after 5 o'clock, and finishing in front of the Union Boat Club. The breaking up of the second boat is responsible for the delay. Several men of the original lineup have been unable to row because of slight injuries so that the present lineup is rather a pick-up one.
