

POLLS OPEN ALL DAY FOR JUNIOR VOTE TOMORROW

Original Nominees Running as Candidates in New Elections

MEN ELECTED ASSUME OFFICE ON THURSDAY

Elections Committee Head Says Customary Regulations to Be Enforced

For the second time in three weeks, members of the Class of 1924 will cast their votes to determine who their officers will be for the coming year. The voting booths will be located in room 1-011, which is the place where the referendum and Junior Prom elections were held. The polls will be open from 9 until 4 o'clock tomorrow. G. W. Hall, Jr., '23, Chairman of the Elections Committee, has announced that all regulations of the Institute Committee will be strictly enforced.

The nominees in this election are the same as those in the first. Of the 45 candidates who are running for the various offices, eight will be chosen and the election will be reported to the Institute Committee at its special meeting next Thursday. If it is ratified the new officers will take up their duties immediately, and the Institute Committee for next year will be organized.

First Election Is Void

The election tomorrow is the climax of a long series of events. Due to a breakdown at the printers and a subsequent mistake in the ballots, which had to be corrected, voting in the first election was delayed nearly three hours. It was claimed that this late opening of the polls had disfranchised many, and, since only one vote had separated the two leading candidates, had probably influenced the election.

Numerous petitions were circulated by those who had been deprived of the opportunity of voting and by those who believed that the election did not voice the sentiment of the class. All of these were refused by the Executive Committee of the Institute Committee, except one, which was referred to the latter organization.

Referendum Goes Through

This petition asked for a referendum of the class to determine if it was satisfied with the results of the election. After nearly two hours of debate, this petition was finally granted. As a result, a referendum was held last Thursday, and it was decided by a vote of 185 to 84 to hold a new election.

A part of the regulations governing the election are printed below. "All forms of electioneering at the polls shall be prohibited. The voter shall fill out his ballot at a booth provided for the purpose, separate the two portions of his ballot, dropping the upper portion in the ballot box, and giving the lower portion containing his signature to the attendant."

UNITARIANS' ELECTIONS POSTPONED UNTIL FALL

At its monthly meeting Thursday night in Unity House, the Technology Chapter of the Unitarian Laymen's League voted to postpone the annual election of officers until next October, when it is planned to call a meeting of all Unitarian students at Technology in order to elect a thoroughly representative body of officers and to start off the year's activities with the most possible enthusiasm. R. W. Sherman '25, was elected temporary chairman to call the meeting for next October.

Oarsmen Dine May 29

The regular annual banquet of the Institute oarsmen will be held on Tuesday, May 29, at the River Bank Court Hotel at 7 o'clock. It is the custom for the members of the various crews to gather together for an evening of this sort, with appropriate speakers. Tickets may be had from the crew managers.

Two-Thirds of Seniors Order Caps and Gowns

Friday, fifty-three orders for caps and gowns were placed at the Technology Branch. So far this is the record for any one day. To date, 451 orders have been placed, or roughly, two-thirds of the Senior class have taken care of this matter. When the gowns are rented, the orders are filled by the Cotterell, Leonard Company of Albany. The Co-operative Society states that if the orders are left until the last minute, it is probable that there will be difficulty in getting them filled, since the company may have rented them to some other school.

Putney will both be present and expect to add to the general good time. There will be entertainment furnished by two members of the Coast Artillery unit, J. J. Murphy '23, and W. S. Anderson '23.

Should there be any remaining tickets after the sale on Wednesday they will be sold at the same time and place Thursday noontime. The demand last year was so great that this second day will probably be unnecessary.

R. M. HOMBERG DIES EARLY YESTERDAY

Contracts Pneumonia As Result of Exposure When Senior Shell Sinks

R. M. Homberg, a Senior in Course IX, died early yesterday morning after an illness lasting less than a week. His death was attributed to the combined effects of pneumonia and the poisoning of his system as the result of a boil.

He was apparently in perfect health ten days ago. However, shortly before the Richards Cup Race, he developed an infection as the result of crew work. Nevertheless, he rowed in the class crew race, and his exposure following the foundering of the shell after the contest is partially responsible for the subsequent attack of pneumonia. He went to the Brooks Hospital last Monday complaining only of a boil. On Wednesday the diagnosis showed him to be suffering from pneumonia.

"Dick," as he was known about the Institute, was born Dec. 18, 1902. He prepared at the Horace Mann School in New York City and entered as a freshman. During his first year he was manager of the freshman swimming team, and on the advertising staff of The Tech. He later served in the news department and then became Sporting Editor. He always showed a marked interest in journalistic and publicity work, serving on the publicity committees of the Technology Athletic Club and the T. C. A., and as a correspondent of the Boston Herald. During the past year he rowed on the second 150 pound crew and the Senior Class crew. He was a member of Corporation XV and the Chemical Society. Funeral services will be held in New York.

Frosh Still Begging for More Bath Water

It will probably be circulated during the rest of this week. W. C. Hemen, E. S. Johnson, and C. E. WILLIAMS THIRD AFTER PRESSING LEADERS CLOSELY

Tootell Breaks Hammer Record — 440 High Mark Is Equalled

Representing a powerful and well balanced team which exhibited wonderful fighting qualities from start to finish, Bowdoin upset all predictions by winning five first places and carrying off the honors in the thirty-seventh Annual New England Intercollegiate Track Meet, held Friday and Saturday on Technology Field. Rallying around Captain Fred Tootell, the individual high point man of the meet, the Maine team gave their captain such support that Bowdoin was able to pile up 29 1-3 points against 24 for their nearest rival, Technology. Williams coming in third with 23 points, after hard pressing the Engineers from the very start.

For hotly contested events and untimely of final results, the meet rivals any held for many a year on Technology Field. With Bowdoin leading Coach Kanaly's men by 1-3 of a point before the last event, the pole vault turned out to be the deciding factor. Coming through in the same fashion that characterized the support given by the whole Maine team, Bishop cleared the bar at 11 feet 3 inches, thus giving Bowdoin their first New England Championship in 24 years.

Records Broken and Equalled
One association record was smashed and another equalled. Fred Tootell was expected to do big things in the hammer throw and he did not disappoint, as he broke the record established by Bailey of Maine in 1914, both in the trials on Friday and in the finals Saturday. His throw of 168 feet 11 inches, excelled the old record by 4 feet 3 inches. Stowers of Williams equalled the New England record in the 440 by covering the distance in 49 1-5 seconds.

Captain Art Smith broke the Institute record made by himself and ran the best race of his career, but as he came in second his time can not be taken as official. He covered the run in 49 2-5 seconds, the distance between him and the winner being a matter of inches. In the trial heat Friday John Sullivan of Boston College, knocked 1-5 of a second off the Tech Field record in the 220 low hurdles, established by Savage in 1915. His time over the obstacles was 25 1-5 seconds.

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Musical Clubs Poster Competition Now Open

Competition for a Musical Clubs Poster has been opened. The entries should be along the same idea as the poster used at present which is suitable for use for publicity purposes in the local concerts. In order to give men plenty of time the competition is being held open all summer, the closing date being October 13. Anyone connected with the Institute is eligible to compete. The prize has not yet been selected but will be enough to be an incentive towards hard work on the part of the competitors. The Executive Board of the Musical Clubs will judge the posters.
