

MAINE TRACKMEN LED TO VICTORY BY MEET'S HIGH POINT WINNER

Columbia Crews Defeat Institute Oarsmen Decisively on Harlem

Form of Varsity Below Usual Standard—150 Pounders Outweighed

Two rather overwhelming defeats were the lot of the Institute crews on their last trip of the season, both eight losing to their Columbia opponents by a margin of six lengths. The work of the Varsity boat was noticeably not up to its usual standard but the win over the 150 pound eight was due to superior power, rather than better form.

The race between the Varsity boats was made over a smooth course with a slight assisting current. At the start the Columbia shell jumped to a slight advantage, thus reversing the conditions which have prevailed in the races of the Engineer eight this year. This lead was soon cut down, as stroke Brill held the count at 35 to the leader's 34.

Institute Out of It at Quarter

At the quarter mark the Institute shell ran into the wash from one of the launches and from then on the disorganization was such that the eight was no longer in it. From then the New York shell gained consistently and the final sprint of the Institute oarsmen gained them little. The winner's time was 7 minutes 34 seconds while the Technology boat crossed the finish line 7 minutes 55 seconds after the start.

In the race between the Columbia Junior Varsity and the 150 pounders, both crews rowed practically stroke and stroke all the way down the course. The Columbia eight proved the more powerful, however, and gradually drew away, crossing the finish line in 8 minutes 10 seconds. The 150 pounders, rowing well throughout the entire race, finished 23 seconds later.

Course Dotted With Driftwood

Considerable difficulty was experienced by all the crews because of the many floating boxes and driftwood that covered the course. These obstacles made rowing very difficult and necessitated somewhat erratic courses. The difference in the tide flow was responsible for the rather large difference in the times of the two contests.

Ames, rowing bow on the Varsity, was troubled by an abscess on his arm. He was nevertheless able to row and so was not replaced by a substitute in the race.

In a race against the Harvard third boat Friday, Technology's second crew was left more than eight lengths behind. Considering the amount of practice this rather pick-up crew has had, its time of about 7 minutes 35 seconds was quite respectable.

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40 feet 3 inches for a win, with Tootell coming in second with 39 feet 7 1/2 inches. Wittenburg of Middlebury and Lourella of B. U., came in third and fourth.

The big event of the meet was to see Capt. Fred Tootell throw the hammer. After tossing it 163 feet 11 inches on Friday it was hoped he would further break the record Saturday. But it looked as if he was over-anxious to score, for he had hard luck every time he went into the ring, and every one of the six throws he made yesterday was a foul. On one of the throws in which he fouled by a matter of inches, he threw the ball and chain 176 feet 9 inches. Because of the fouls he had to be content with his mark of Friday.

In the high jump Clark of Amherst came near to equalling his record of last year when he cleared the bar at six feet. Technology didn't place in this event. Darling of Amherst and Flahive of B. C. were tied at 5 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Stewart Second in Broad

Stewart came in second in the broad jump with 20 feet 11 inches. None of the winners showed exceptional ability as Johnson came in first with 21 feet 2 inches.

Drew secured next place to Tootell in the hammer, throwing the ball 134 feet 5 1/2 inches, with Dexter coming in third. The discus went to the Bowdoin captain on a throw of 119 feet 2 inches. As this was the first time the javelin throw had been run off in the New England, King of Wesleyan was credited with a record in this event. His throw was 152 feet 2 inches.

Tressel and Tremaine Only Engineers to Win Matches

The tennis team was defeated by Princeton last Friday at the Chestnut Hill Courts, 7-2. Tressel and McWane were the only Engineers to win their matches.

Russell, who played against Howard of Princeton was easily defeated by a score of 6-1, 6-1. He was a bit wild in returning some of the shots. Tressel defeated Taylor of Princeton by a score of 9-7, 6-0. The first set was very close and long drawn out but the second was easily won by Tressel.

McWane Lacks Alertness

McWane defeated Wood of Princeton 2-6, 6-4, 7-5, and was easily the superior player, but his tendency to relax after making a difficult shot instead of being on the alert for a return nearly lost the match for him.

Miller was defeated by Lewis of Princeton only after the latter player had gone to his utmost. Miller started off with a good deal of pep and had Lewis baffled for a time, but after the first set he began to weaken and Lewis won the next two sets and the match.

Storb and Harris were defeated by Loeb and Dailey of Princeton in straight sets.

In the doubles Howard and Taylor of Princeton defeated Russell and Tressel in two straight sets. The Engineers were off form and seemed to lack co-ordination.

Tech Field Dangerous for Innocent Watcher

In the trials for the New England Championships which were held on Tech Field Friday, the spectators had plenty of diversions to which they could turn their attention if they did not enjoy the regular events. First a javelin passed through the coat and shirt of one of the officials and it didn't even scratch him. A 16-pound shot gently knocked off the hat of one of the innocent spectators without damage to the owner of the hat. In the discus trials the disk landed right in the middle of a group of people and by a miracle no one was hurt.

The climax occurred when one of the competitors in the hammer throw had the chain which attached the ball to the handle break while he was in the act of heaving the weight. A heavy iron screen is placed around the ring which is supposed to stop all wandering hammers, but to no avail on Friday. The ball went clean through the screen, leaving a hole as if a cannon ball had gone through. The officials had all the crowd nicely herded in front of the screen for the finish of the 880 run, and it was a miracle double prime that no one was hurt this time.

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
