Voo Doo Reforming Everything

The current number of Voo Doo shows Phosphorus falling a victim to reforming zeal. One editorial wants to abolish "drives" by substituting what the social reformers call a community chest to be kept in the appropriately named Five Cent Savings Bank. Another betrays a Victorian passion for freedom of the Press, using however the not especially Victorian illustration of Boccaccio's "Decameron" which "a foolish law" strives to prevent college students from reading a version said to be written in 20th century American. A third discusses the perennial problem of the press, how to reconcile the scandal the public wants with the information it ought to have. But is not what the public really wants merely to be amused?

The verse in this number, as in most numbers, is imaginative, and seldom too serious in tone. But why is it that the metre almost always limps along with an extra foot or two in one line balanced by a shortage in the next? If the verse is to be 'free' why deceive the careless reader by making it look like a poor imitation, metrically speaking, of the real thing?

One noticed several reminiscences of the Sophomore EH courses, a quotation from Tyndall, another from a Bill of Rights. Titian's portrait was entitled "Francis I" and not as the caption had it "Frances I." The not too Chaucerian Tale on page 9 contains several words Chaucer never knew, and requires a pronunciation differing not infrequently from that we once laboriously learned as the authentic 13th century English. But these comments betray a professional bias on the reviewer's part.

The clippings from other comic papers, inserted cannily among the advertising, like the fag ends of stories in The Saturday Evening Post, or the poems in The Literary Digest, have this time less than the customary proportion of jokes we remember from our high school paper long ago.

Among the drawings we still found occasion to regret the absence of Elmer's visions of feminine beauty. Even an instructor can sympathize, unofficially with the all too human hero of "A Student's Sunday." It was, however, unduly hard on him to make him look such a bonehead. One wished the book review page had dealt with more obviously actual

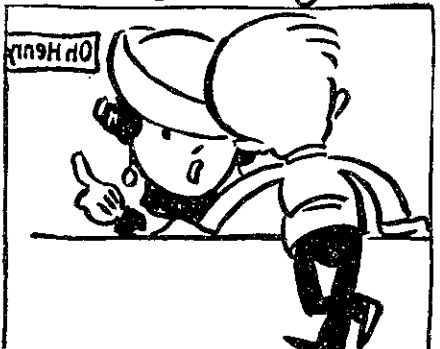

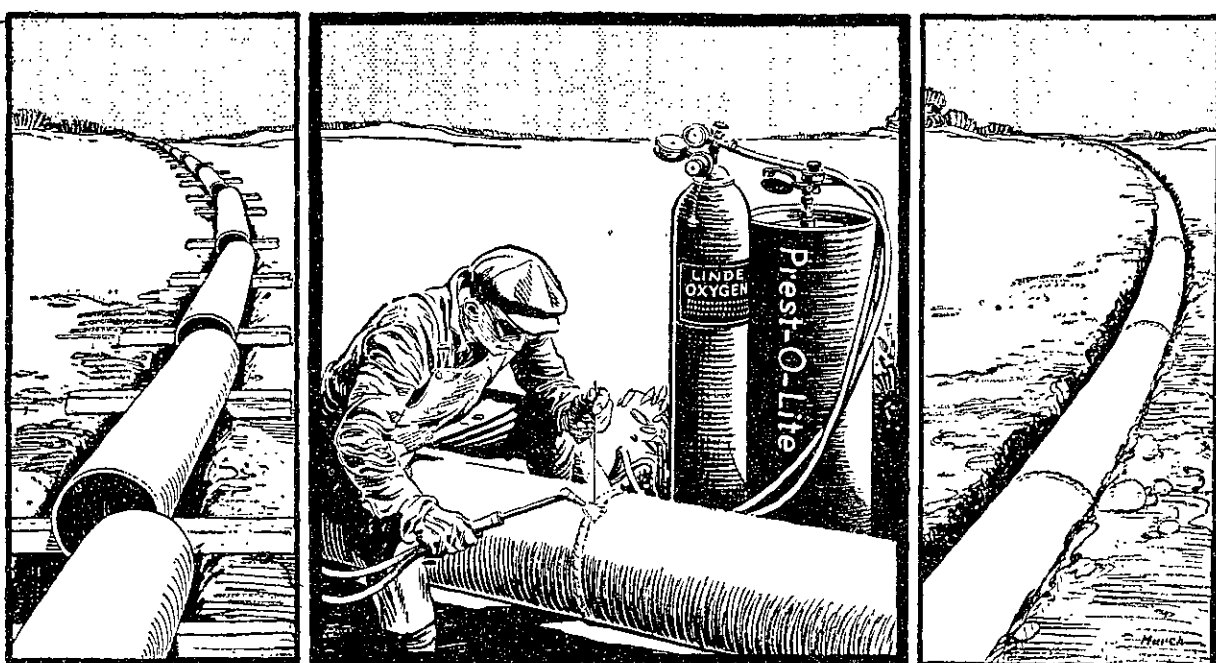
