Praise Frank Kanaly at Field Day Banquet

George Owen, of Harvard. The Professor said: "When I thought George was too young to begin playing football, I brought him down here to Tech Field, though I knew he was going to Harvard. I asked Frank Kanaly to give him something to do on the track. George was only 15 then, but he certainly learned a great deal. I attribute all of his quick starting ability to this early training with Mr. Kanaly. I think we don't appreciate our coach enough. He is one of the best, in fact I think the best in the country today."

Government Will Appoint 85 Second Lieutenants

The Military Science Department announces that the Government will commission 85 second lieutenants in the regular army this year, most of them taken from fourth year R. O. T. C. men. To be commissioned, candidates must pass competitive examinations. To enter the examinations candidates must apply before June 25. Seniors at the Institute may leave their applications in the hands of the Military Science Department, in room 3-310. Examinations will be held on June 25 in various centers in the country. Accepted candidates will receive commissions in the fall.

The examination will take the form of a preliminary and final part. In the preliminary, army officials examine the candidate's past records and personal characteristics. The second tests the candidate's educational training. It consists of three parts, each one of which is chosen from a list of nine options on such varying subjects as: chemistry, the United States constitution and international law, and surveying. Further details in regard to the complete list of options, subject matter covered by each, marking system, and other related information may be obtained at the Military Science Department headquarters, room 3-310.

Successful candidates will be commissioned in the fall and stationed with some body of troops for about a year. Then they will spend a school year in an officers' training school. After this, service is likely to be varied and full of travel.

Pay begins at \$142 a month and is subject to rise with length of service and promotion. In addition when station requirements incur extra expense, this too is added to the payroll.

Technology Out of Tennis Finals in New Englands

Russell High Man, But Defeated After Fight in Semi-finals

Technology's hopes for winning the New England tennis cup this season were sent glimmering yesterday when Joe Russell lost his match in the semi-finals to Howe of Dartmouth.

Capt. Tremaine and Tressel were defeated Monday by Howe and Osgood of Dartmouth in the doubles matches in four sets. The Engineers put up a game fight but were unable to defeat the Hanover men.

Chapin of Williams was the other survivor of the semi-final round. He defeated Polley of Brown by a score of 12-10, 8-6, 6-2. Polley forced Chapin to the limit but was not able to stand the pace and lost to the better man.

Champ Decided Today

Howe and Chapin will fight it out today to determine who will be the New England Champion. Chapin is favored to repeat his feat of two years ago when he won the New England championship. Howe, however, is a strong opponent and should force Chapin to his utmost.

In the doubles championship, Howe and Osgood of Dartmouth will probably fight it out with Fisher and Chapin of Williams. Howe and Osgood are favored to win the New England Doubles championship. They have been playing together for some time and know each other's style better than Fisher and Chapin.

In the number as a whole one felt a suppressed desire for a literary medium of expression on the part of the contributors. The substance, though not the form, of the verse was the best thing in it. The satire ought to have been the best, if we have not misread the purpose for which Voo Doo was founded. The one really dull thing published was called "An Interesting Excursion," to a region commonly regarded as interesting, whatever else it may be.

There have been better numbers, and several worse numbers in the past history of Voo Doo. The editors should beware of saving their best stuff for special issues, or possibly for semi-private circulation.

Since then there has been no exhibition from which to gauge the skill of the freshman boat but if the men are at all in form they should be the victors.

This afternoon's contest will close the season for Technology but the boathouse will be open through the summer. Those having the club rowing cards may continue to take out boats and canoes as before. Quite a number of men have availed themselves of this arrangement so far this year. It provides for certain privileges concerning the canoes and single shells, either on a card membership basis or on the payment of 25 cents an hour.

Vote to Abolish Reading

At a meeting of the Faculty last Wednesday the Summer Reading requirement was abolished. According to Prof. A. L. Merrill '85, the reasons are two: first, because the English and History courses as now given combine much more reading than they did at the time the requirement was put into effect; and second, because of the increased number of required summer courses in other departments.

The English and History Department is emphasizing the fact that this ruling takes effect only with the class of 1926 and following classes. The present upperclassmen must fulfill the old requirements before receiving their degree.

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
