FROSH CREW ENDS SEASON WITH WIN

Choppy Water Prevents Good Time in Season's Victory

Covering the mile course in the last race of the season the Institute freshmen won by a length over the Huntington School shell Wednesday afternoon. This contest was not only the closing event of the season for the oarsmen but was also the only win, though many of the contests were not without closer finishes.

The start was made at Cottage Farm Bridge for the mile distance. Technology eight getting the jump on the schoolboys. With a lead of a length and a half for the frosh shell both crews retained their positions throughout the middle of the course. In the last quarter, however, the Huntington shell crept up to the leader and at the finish there was but one length between the boats.

Weather Conditions Fair

The winning eight was clocked at 5 minutes 39.4-5 seconds while the Huntington bow crossed the finish line a few seconds later. This is not particularly fast time for the distance but the race was rowed against a fair head wind and with the basin in a rather choppy condition.

Coach Fred Dellenbaugh of the Institute Varsity acted as referee and Assistance Manager Stanton as timer. Boucher of Huntington and D. A. Peterson of Technology were the judges. The lineup for the Institute shell was the same as announced before the race, with the exception of the substitution of Taylor in the place of D. A. Peterson in number five. TRACK TEAM GOES TO I.C.A.A.A. MEET

Art Smith, Dexter, Sanborn, Lou Porter Should Place—Hendrie Sick

Coach Frank Kanaly and his squad of entrants for the I. C. A. A. A. games at Philadelphia left Boston last night for the trip to the big meet, and on Saturday will run up against the greatest athletes of the country in the climax of a big track season.

Practically every track star of note in American college circles is competing, and records thus far this season indicate that more than a few national records will go by the board.

Included in the Technology delegation are Captain Art Smith, whose work in the 440 in dual meets and in the Intercollegiate entitles him to a good deal of consideration from his fellow competitors; Elmer Sanborn, whose two years as New England Intercollegiate mile champion mark him as a worthy contender for the best the country has to offer; Bob Hershey, of New England fame; Russ Ambach and Emmons Blodgett for the hurdles; Dexter for the hurdles and weight events; Tryon and Chink Drew for the mile and Phelps for the half; and Lou Porter, who is expected to show up well in the dashes. Trainer Doc Johnson, Coach Kanaly, and Manager Phil Herrich complete the party.

Art Smith Has Infection

Capt. Art Smith left for Philadelphia Wednesday night while the team followed yesterday. Art has been troubled with an infection that started up after the meet on Tech Field, and even if he runs in the trial heats today it is very likely that his running time will be much effected. It seems that Art has had more than his share of hard luck. After his exhibition Saturday in the 440 when he covered the distance in very near 49.2-5 seconds, Art had a mighty good chance to make an official record in the Penn meet. Although his time in the New England broke all previous Institute records it is not taken as official as he came in second.

Bob Hendrie, whose week of tonsillitis was the only thing which prevented his taking the New England two-mile title last week, is not sufficiently recovered from his illness to go on the trip, which means that the man who three weeks ago was considered Technology's best chance of distinction in the big races will not be in the field at all.

Harvard Doubles Engineers Score on Belmont Links

The Institute golfers were beaten by Harvard in two foursomes and four singles at the Belmont Spring Country Club Wednesday afternoon. Captain Fritz Clement of the Institute team was the only one of the quartet to win in the singles, taking a victory over Williams of the Crimson team, 2 up. Clement and Johnny Ballard were also victorious in the foursomes, winning over Hodder and Williams of Harvard, while the Crimson was credited with the other foursome and three singles.

Is Second of Season

This marks the second defeat for the Technology golfers out of an otherwise very successful season, West Point being the first to best them. The other three matches played resulted in a 5-1 win over Brown, 3-0 over the Merrimack Valley Country Club, 6-0 over Boston University, and 6-0 over Bowdoin.

The last match of the season will be played this afternoon at Brookline Country Club against the Amherst College squad, which is rated as being a pretty accurate-playing combination.

The Harvard match was played against one of the best combinations the team will meet, Clark Hodder being runner-up in the Massachusetts open championship tournament and winner of the Junior State title, while Perison was Metropolitan champion of New York last summer.

JUNIOR BASEBALL TEAM NOSES OUT SENIORS, 18-17

1924 Tossers Ahead Until the Seventh When Seniors Hop Into Lead

ROBINSON AND GILES POLE OUT HOME RUNS

An eight inning slug-fest Wednesday afternoon between the Juniors and Seniors found the 1924 nine leading by a big margin up to the end of the sixth, the seniors pulling up nine runs in the seventh, tying the score, and the Juniors finally breaking with them in the eighth for an 18-17 win.

Bunched hits, errors, and wild throws, particularly on the part of the Juniors in the seventh inning contributed largely to the big score of the game, while hard hitting, including a homer, a triple, and a double by Bill Robinson, and another homer and a triple by Ran Giles, were factors in the runs piled up by the 1924 sluggers.

The early part of the game found the Juniors piling up a consistent lead over the upperclassmen, making liberal hits off Klein Whittaker and Frank Knight, while the Seniors were unable to touch the '24 boxmen for more than a few pellets.

The end of the sixth inning found the Juniors leading by an apparently safe margin of 13 to 7, and they added 3 more in the seventh, but the combined batting rally and fielding slump, acted by the Seniors and Juniors respectively, tied the score at 16 all, and it was a close decision that shut the Seniors out of another tally. One for the Seniors and a pair for the Juniors in the eighth frame were enough to clinch the game for the latter, making a clear record of wins for the '24 team.

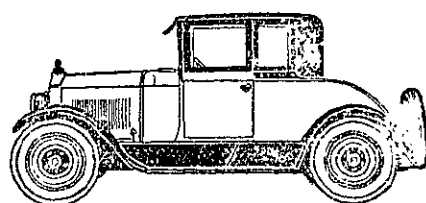

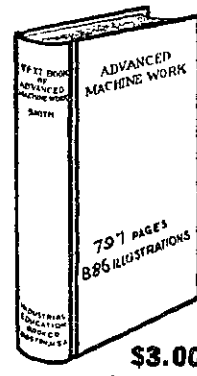
