Tennis Team Wins from Tufts by Score of 6-0 on Saturday

Engineers Meet Williams Court Tamers at Williamstown on Wednesday

The tennis team defeated Tufts last Saturday at Medford Hillside, 6-0. In the singles, Tressel's match was the only one that was extended to three sets. In the doubles Russell and Tressel defeated Caldwell and Darcy of Tufts in straight sets while Tremaine and Hayden were forced to play three sets to win their match.

On Wednesday the Engineers will leave for Williamstown, Mass., where they will play Williams College.

Russell will probably play Chapin of Williams in the first singles match. Chapin has just recently won the New England Singles Championship for the second time, and has not been defeated in any of his singles matches this season.

Russell and Tressel will play Chapin and Taylor of Williams. The latter pair won the New England Doubles Championship which was held recently.

By winning the New England Singles and Doubles Championship, Williams College now has permanent possession of the New England Cup.

MAKE NEW RECORD IN HAMMER THROW

Two Events in Field Net Winners Seventeen Points—Tigers Second

The University of California repeated its feat of a year ago by again winning the Intercollegiate Championship, scoring 39 1/2 points. The Bears owed their victory to their remarkable prowess in field, rather than in track competition. The Californians scored three points on the track and 36 1/2 on the field.

Tech was able to score five points by placing fourth in the mile run and third in the hammer throw.

Elmer Sanborn collected two points for Tech by being fourth in the mile run. This race was won by Kirby of Cornell whose time was 4m. 17.4-5 secs.

Princeton High Eastern Team

In the hammer throw Dexter scored three points for Tech by placing third. His distance was 146 ft. 9 1/8 in. Tootell of Bowdoin placed first and his distance was 181 ft. 6 1/2 in. Hills of Princeton placed second with a distance of 149 ft. 6 in.

Neufeldt was the Bears' only champion, being first in the discus, while Norris, pole vault champion of last May, was tied at the finish Saturday at 12 ft. 9 in. by Owen of Pennsylvania.

Princeton furnished the main fight of the Eastern teams against California in the quest of the latter for its third successive I. C. A. A. A. championship.

The Tigers ran ahead of Yale by 10 1/2 points, while Yale in turn, just passed Pennsylvania by a half point. Cornell ranked fifth with 15 points, Syracuse and Penn State scored 13 each, John Hopkins scored 12 points and Dartmouth 10. Then followed nine other colleges whose scores were measurable by a single digit. Harvard scored six points and Tech was tied with Lafayette with five points each.

The 1923 championships will not go down as one of the best ever. There were enough thrilling races and upsets to keep one guessing just how the ranking, next to California, would be.

Elmer Takes Fourth in the Mile

If the Bears had fallen down in their field events as did many of the Eastern stars in the track events, the Intercollegiate cup would return to the East.

Douglas of Yale led for a time in the mile, with Kirby of Cornell following. Capt. Burke of Harvard was fourth at the half mile. Connolly did not start his race until Kirby did and both passed Douglas on the last lap. Douglas remained in third position while Sanborn of Tech finished strong to beat Webster of Princeton, who won over Douglas at Princeton several weeks ago.

Bowdoin Captain Sets Record

Tootell of Bowdoin was just as consistent Saturday as he was in the trial round the day before. Every one of his throws was over the 170 foot mark. The hammer with which Tootell made his great record Saturday was found to weigh two ounces more and one inch shorter than the regulations call for.

Taylor, Leroy Brown, and Norris were the champions who successfully defended their titles. Brown led the high jumpers with a 6 ft. 3 3/4 in. performance. That is almost an inch below the record he made last year. Needs of Penn was his only worth while rival, but he dropped out at 6 ft. 1 1/2 in.

Brick Muller, the individual champion of last year's meet, was a bit of a disappointment this year. He was tied for third place with two others in the high jump and his 23 ft. 2 in. jump in the running broad contest only brought him fourth place.

Two new records were made in this meet. Tootell's hammer mark of 181 ft. 6 1/2 in., and Storrs' 199 ft. 1 in. heave in the javelin.

Faculty Opposes Varsity

A match between the varsity tennis team and a team consisting of members of the faculty has been arranged at Cornell. The faculty team has been practicing regularly and intends to give the varsity a run for their money.

Faculty Oppose Syllabi

A ruling has been passed by the faculty at Princeton in which undergraduates are forbidden to prepare for sale or use a syllabus of lectures or required reading unless prepared by the instructor in charge. The professors have declared that syllabi have relieved men of doing the required amount of work and are fundamentally wrong. This action was taken against a group of undergraduates known as the Consolidated Syllabi Company, who are earning their way through college by selling notes taken at the different lectures.

"Grave Diggers" Unite

In order to promote more college spirit and to make the entering members to Tulane University more friendly, the freshmen at the college have formed a new society known as "The Grave Diggers." Its main purpose is to unite the lower classes when they enter. At present it recalls to one's mind the late "Shifters" on account of the membership token which is a gold safety pin.

Assign Examination Seats

Assigned seats in all rooms where final examinations are being given is a new idea at the Stevens Institute of Technology. This decision to have each student occupy a particular seat was reached after much deliberation on the part of the Honor System Committee as the most convenient and just way to all concerned.

No Flappers at Radcliff

The authorities and undergraduates at Radcliff boast that there are no flappers at that college. High heels never make their appearance on the campus and powder and rouge are never used in the open. However this Radcliff is situated in Iowa and not Cambridge.

Musical Clubs After Talented Foreigners

Foreign students are to be given a chance to demonstrate their ability in a musical line to the Combined Musical Clubs for next year. It is the custom to have about four specialty acts to break the monotony of straight musical club singing and playing. It seems probable that foreign students could well provide the necessary change by their own instruments and language.

DR. STRATTON TELLS PLANS FOR FUTURE

His Article Out Tomorrow in the June Issue of Tech Engineering News

"Plans for the Future" is the title of an article by Dr. S. W. Stratton in the June Tech Engineering News, which will be out tomorrow. In this article, which closes the "Technology Series," Dr. Stratton outlines the needs of Technology and plans for their fulfillment.

That science and religion are not incompatible is shown by Dr. A. A. Blanchard '98, Associate Professor of Chemistry, in an essay "The Unity of Science and Religion." The material and spiritual worlds, according to Professor Blanchard, are inseparable, and the scientist and religious teacher should each have a mutual respect for the other and his work.

A timely article by a Western Electric engineer, W. G. Housekeeper '05, describes the recent great strides that have been made in the construction of high power vacuum tubes for radio transmission.

"Applications of Light Waves to Measurements" is an account of a striking example of the application of science to modern industry. The writer, H. L. Van Keuren, tells how light interference phenomena are used in measuring accurately less than a millionth of an inch.

Other articles in the issue appearing tomorrow, the last of this school year, are "Water Dispersions of Rubber Compounds" by W. B. Pratt, "Recent Developments in the Use of X-Rays" by T. Fuwa, and "Reclaiming 100,000 Acres of Desert Land" by Franklin Remington.
