At about this time, Mike Hoar discovered that they were blasting right in the middle of his track. He started to investigate, and in doing so, got to the leeward of the tear gas producer. vented the experiments and apparatus which were very ingenious."

### First Co-ed in 1873

They were shown the Emma Rogers room and when they came out, one of the party remarked that the first co-ed to graduate from the Institute was a member of the Class of 1873. She was Miss Ellen Henrietta Swallow, who married Professor R. H. Richards '68. Dr. Richards is Professor Emeritus of Mining Engineering and Metallurgy of the Institute, and is the donor of the Richards Cup.
