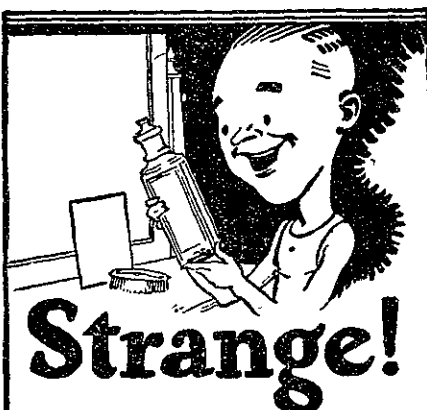

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GOLF TEAM DOWNS AMHERST FRIDAY

Match Last of Season in Which
Technology Team Has
Won 5 Out of 7

The last match of a very successful season found the golf team defeating the Amherst College combination 5-0 at the Brookline Country Club last Friday. With a record of five victories and two defeats the team stands out as one of the best seen on the suburban links, and deserves a good deal of credit for the season.

The only defeats suffered out of seven matches were those pinned on by West Point and Harvard, who took their matches 3-2 and 4-2 respectively. Wins over Brown University, Boston University, Merrimack Valley Club, Bowdoin, and the last one over Amherst, indicate the mettle of the team, the only bad feature of the season being that practically the whole combination will graduate this year, and the ranks will have to be filled up with new material.

Under the leadership of Captain Fritz Clement '23, the whole team has shown excellent form. Clement has been a consistent winner, taking every match of the season, and has been receiving steady support from Johnny Ballard, Ab Johnson, and Crowley, who although a new man on the team has shown promise of being among the best for next year.

Clement, Johnson, and Ballard were practically the founders of golf at Technology and the success of the past three years is largely due to their efforts.

A Fall tournament will be run off in October under the direction of the new manager, W. A. Whitehead '25, with the idea of getting a line on the prospects for next year's team, and with the first six of this year's squad graduating, there seems to be an excellent opportunity for new material to find a place on the team.

TENNIS MATCH WON BY WILLIAMS TEAM

Capt. Tremaine was paired against Chapin of Williams, recent winner in the New England Singles Championship. Tremaine put up a good fight but was unable to match the skill of his opponent and lost the match.

Russell was pitted against Baker of Williams and defeated him in three sets. After winning the first set he lost the second to Baker, but in the third set he beat Baker decisively.

Tressel was defeated by Blackmer of Williams in straight sets. Blackmer was the better of the two and won his match without much extending himself to the limit.

Miller, after winning the first set from Greff of Williams, lost the next two sets and with it the match. After the first set Greff had no trouble in winning the match.

In the doubles Russell and Tressel were defeated by Chapin and Fisher of Williams, the recent winners in the New England Doubles Championship in straight sets. The last set, however, was bitterly contested and the Engineers forced their opponents to an 8-6 score in that set.

Tremaine and Miller defeated Blackmer and Baker of Williams in straight sets. The Engineers won their first set rather easily but were forced to extend themselves in the next set.

The match with Williams College concludes the tennis team's schedule for this season.

Russell who was runner up in the semi-finals in the New England Singles Championship, and who was defeated by Capt. Howe of Dartmouth in the semi-finals, has been awarded a straight T for his good work. Russell has won most of his matches this season and was pitted against many of the leading tennis players of the various colleges due to the inability of Capt. Tremaine to play them on account of his injured shoulder.

Capt. Tremaine has been out of quite a number of the most important matches this season. His absence was keenly felt and if he had been in many of the results of the matches might have been reversed.

Have Five Straight Victories
with Shutout Over
Freshmen

SENIORS COME OUT NEXT
TO HEAD OF THE LIST

Split Even on Wins and Loses—
Three Games Go
Each Way

Winning their last game from the Seniors last Wednesday, 18-17, the Junior baseball team ended the season with a string of 5 straight wins. They handed out defeats to all the other classes and totaled 46 runs against their opponents' 23. Bates led the team in batting and finished the season with an average of .414. He played sterling baseball all the time and was dependable in the pinches. Bud Robertson was close behind him with a batting average of .412. Capt. Walterskirchen finished high on the list with an average of .353. The pitching was well taken care of by Canfield, Tom Fitzgerald and Walt Kennett.

The '25 team finished the season third, winning two and losing three. They were supposed to play the frosh last Tuesday, but the frosh did not show up, cutting the Sophs out of a chance to break even on games. Bill Brown was the heavy hitter on the Soph nine and towards the close of the season he was playing wonderful baseball. Besides holding down the shortstop's berth he was available for pitching and could work well in the box when needed. Joe Terrell, playing second base for the '25 nine, batted above three hundred and was one of the steadiest players on the field. Capt. Dave Peene held down the first sack in great shape throughout the season and few throws got by him.

The '25 team finished the season with three won and three lost. Flather who played in the last three games collected a goodly bunch of hits and led the team batting list with an average of .545. Abe Kenney who caught most of the games was among the topnotchers with a batting average of .331. Frank Knight at the second sack played good ball and was one of the best on the team.

The freshmen were at the bottom of the team list and did not show up as good as the other teams. Rain was the cause of not playing two games and they lost the other four. Capt. Jacobsen was the star and finished with the highest batting average in the league, .667. Charlie Bianchi was the other good hitter and had an average of .333.

The Juniors will be presented with the cup that will be awarded by the Advisory Council. Dr. Rowe stated that the Advisory Council would furnish the cup if the M. I. T. A. sanctioned the award. The cup will probably be given to the '24 nine next fall. This year the winning team will get numerals and the other teams will not. It was thought that all the teams would get them, but it has been decided that there will be more interest and competition if only the winning team of the series is awarded their numerals.

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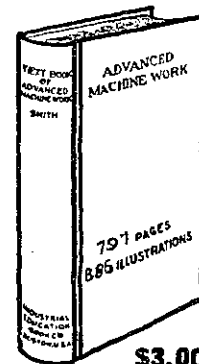
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
