Summer School Courses Start Monday Morning

Summer school courses scheduled to begin next Monday will start on that date and not be postponed on account of the inauguration of Dr. Stratton. This action was determined after consultation with Dr. Stratton and was recommended by him. There are several courses beginning Monday including the required one in Qualitative Analysis.

Candidates for degrees have all been notified by the Secretary of the Faculty whether they have been awarded to them or not. Seniors, not candidates for a degree, will have their records sent to them tomorrow and all undergraduates will have their records mailed a week from today.

T.C.A. ALREADY LOOKS FORWARD TO OCTOBER

Freshman Handbook Turned Over to Printers for Publication

The T. C. A. Undergraduate Employment Bureau announces the amount of their business during the past three terms. During this time they placed 108 men in part time work, the pay of which amounted to approximately \$15,000. For the coming summer they have placed 105 men with salaries amounting to about \$10,000.

The Book Exchange has done about \$2,000 business during the year. From their files they estimate that they have reached 1500 men. They have also collected a large number of books for sale in the fall.

Work on the Freshman Handbook has been completed. The copy has gone to press and the books will be delivered in July. 2000 fillers containing the usual general information and 1200 covers are being printed. These will be mailed in September to men just entering the Institute, and the remaining copies distributed in October to the faculty and returning students.

Individualism of Youth in Europe

In Czechoslovakia, the Forum officers came into close contact with the small Student Renaissance Movement which takes its religious inspiration from the American Y. M. C. A. and its national ideals from President Masaryk. The great internal problem of Czechoslovakia is the reconciliation of Teuton and Czech. The Student Renaissance Movement composed of German and Czech students has led the way.

It was in Germany that the full force of the Youth Movement struck the Americans. They found themselves in a tangle of organizations—scores of them—some political, some religious, some purely cultural; they were deluged with magazines published by young people; they heard of communities and schools, conferences and proclamations till their confusion was comparable to the sensations of an up-state farmer in the Times Square Subway. Everywhere they met boys and girls clad in a quaint, slightly mediaeval outdoor costume which is characteristic of the Youth Movement. In a score of ways the youth of Germany were at work remaking the life of the most philistine nation in the world to a human pattern. A full account would require the length of this article.

Six Students Coming to America

A lecture mission of six young Europeans come to America this fall with the returning Forum representatives. They are known already to several thousand American students who have heard them speak in chapels.

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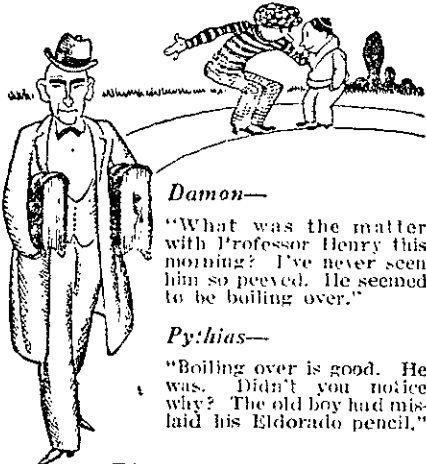
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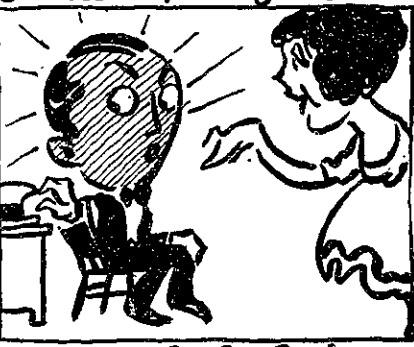
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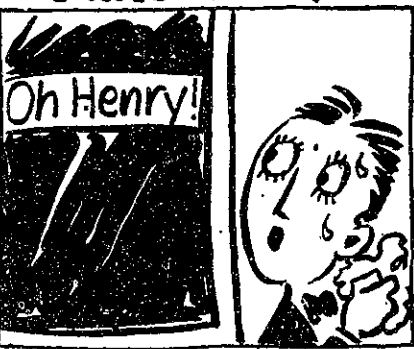
