

A New Policy CHARGE ACCOUNTS

Regulations for Opening an Account

- 1—Customer must be a member of Technology Branch and show his Bursar's card.
- 2—The monthly limit for each account is \$50.00 exclusive of charges for Suit, Overcoat or Typewriter.
- 3—To keep account open, payment must be made before the 10th of the month following.
- 4—No dividend is paid on a balance unpaid on the 25th of the month following.
- 5—The stockholders have the right to vote 2% greater dividend upon cash purchases than upon charge purchases.

DIVIDENDS

In recent years the dividend rate has been 10 per cent. on cash purchases and 8 per cent. on charge purchases. Your dividend checks for 1922-23 will be ready Monday, October 15. Bring your membership cards. A teller from our bank will be at the store from 10 A. M. to 3.30 P. M. to cash dividend checks.

THE STORY OF THE TECHNOLOGY BRANCH

WE ARE GIVING BELOW A RE-PRINT OF AN ARTICLE BY MAJOR EDWIN T. COLE, WHO WAS THE FIRST TECH DIRECTOR ON THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF HARVARD CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY. THE ARTICLE SHOWS HOW THE TECH BRANCH WAS CALLED INTO EXISTENCE AND THE ARTICLE IS NOW AN INTERESTING HISTORICAL SKETCH.

IT MIGHT BE WELL TO MENTION HERE THAT TECHNOLOGY'S REPRESENTATION IN THE MANAGEMENT OF THE BUSINESS HAS BEEN GREATLY INCREASED IN THE PAST FIVE YEARS. PROFESSOR DAVIS R. DEWEY IS NOW A STOCKHOLDER. THE FOLLOWING MEN FROM TECHNOLOGY HAVE BEEN NOMINATED AS DIRECTORS FOR THE COMING YEAR: MR. WALTER HUMPHREYS, MR. H. S. FORD, JASPER WHITING AND DOUGLAS F. ELLIOTT FROM THE STUDENT BODY. MR. HUMPHREYS IS ALSO NOMINATED FOR THE OFFICE OF SECRETARY OF THE CORPORATION.

Here is Major Cole's letter as it appeared in THE TECH on April 3, 1916.

TECHNOLOGY BRANCH

HARVARD CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY

Last year the Institute Committee, having gone into the subject of the Technology Co-operative Society, particularly with a view to establishing co-operative service at the new Technology, asked the Alumni Council to appoint a committee to investigate the matter and to make recommendations. This action was taken and the Committee after a very thorough investigation, nation-wide in its scope, suggested that the Harvard Co-operative Society, one of the most successful in the country, be invited to establish a branch as close to the new Technology as possible. This recommendation having been approved by the Institute Committee and accepted by the Harvard Co-operative Society, arrangements are now in progress for carrying out the plan.

One of the suggestions have been that a member of the Technology Faculty be elected to membership in the Board of Directors to represent the Institute in carrying out the plan, the undersigned on nomination of the President was duly elected and has secured this space in THE TECH for telling you all the details of the plan and its advantages to Technology.

In this first it is desirable to make a statement which will be repeated and argued about right along until everyone is convinced. Your branch is to be part of a real co-operative effort. The cost of any article to you will be the wholesale price procurable by a very large buying power, plus the cost of selling minimized to the utmost degree by scientific business management. Any charge over these two costs will be returned in dividends. But to make the scheme a success Technology must back it to the limit. This matter will be changed in each issue. Be sure to read it.

Concerts for Engineers

The first ten days were spent on the rifle range, firing the regular army qualification course. Fifteen of the 32 Institute men were awarded qualifications as either sharpshooter or marksmen. After the range work, engineering instruction began with days spent on floating and fixed bridge construction, explosives, mapping, fortification, horseback riding, and tactics.

Recreation included dances twice a week, riding and swimming. The 7th Artillery Band, of the regulars, which was on duty in camp, gave daily evening concerts and played for the hops and student ceremonies. Weekly trips to points of interest nearby included one over the Mohawk trail to Greenfield and another to Provincetown.

Camp ended with a two day practice march and manoeuvre in which each branch of the service played its respective part.

Men Saw ZR-1

Camp Alfred Vail was the scene of the Signal Corps training. Of the 99 men present 22 came from Technology. One of the features of the camp was the work on the pistol range in which 70 per cent of the men qualified as marksmen or sharpshooters.

Several inspection trips were made by the men. One was to the American Telephone and Telegraph Company in New York. Another was to the transatlantic station of the Radio Corporation of America which is in New Brunswick, N. J. A third was to the naval hangar at Lakehurst where they saw the dirigible ZR-1 which was at that time almost complete.

In the afternoons there was swimming, tennis and horsebackriding. Several dances were given for the R. O. T. C. men.

Courses of instruction included wire-laying, operation of field telephones and of radio sets. The last week was
