HARRIERS LACK STARS THIS YEAR

Without Hendrie or Sanborn
Coaches Must Count on
Balanced Team

If Technology is to maintain its good record in crosscountry this year it will be without the aid of any stellar material on its teams. Bob Hendrie, who won the New England Intercollegiate Crosscountry run last year and took second in the I.C.A.A.A. run at Van Cortlandt Park is no longer available. Neither is his teammate Elmer Sanborn. Both men were for several years consistent performers and brought the cardinal and gray harriers to more than one victory. But they have gone to join the army of alumni.

Need Well-Balanced Team

What the new coaches will naturally find it necessary to depend on will be a well balanced team, a team whose members can all perform fairly well and come in well bunched, not too far behind the leaders. Too often teams with the fastest runners will take one or two of the front places in the race and then find that the large scores rung up by their teammates who come in near the last will more than compensate for their

efforts and the team will place poorly. The team with good performers throughout, even though none are of first rank, is a strong contender for first place team honors.

Captain Gubby Holt will lead his harriers against Cornell at Ithaca on October 27 in the first run of the season, and a week later the crosscountry team will contend with the Princeton fence-hoppers at Princeton. Harvard, who has been pretty regularly defeated at crosscountry by the Engineers in recent years, will be met on the Belmont Course November 10. Then the team will train for the New England's and later go to the I.C.A.A.A. meet at Van Cortlandt Park on November 27.

All men who are candidates for either the varsity or the freshman teams are asked to report at once at the track house. The track house will be open every day after 2 o'clock.

40% OF ENTERING MEN ARE PHYSICALLY UNFIT

According to Dr. G. W. Morse, in charge of the Institute Medical department, forty percent of the men entering Technology are physically unfit. Though startlingly large, Dr. Morse adds that this figure is not unusual. That it indicates no inferiority on the part of Institute men is shown by an examination of United States army records.

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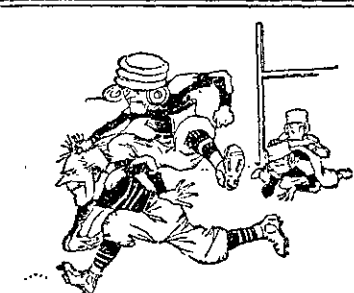
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
