BULLETIN ISSUED BY MIL. SCI. DEPARTMENT

The Military Science Department has issued a catalogue in the form of the regular official Institute publications. In it are stated certain courses that are offered to all Advanced R. O. T. C. Students. Among these are included a General Study in International Law, conducted by Colonel Phisterer. Arrangements are being made so that the members of the Advanced Coast Artillery Unit will be able to use a course in surveying as a professional option at some point during their course. This replaces the course in Orientation previously given by the Military Science Department.

R.O.T.C. JUNIORS BEING FITTED FOR UNIFORMS

Being Made by Army Tailors—
Expense Borne By
Government

The Military Science department headquarters will be the scene of intense sartorial activity for the remainder of the week. The embryo warriors of the Junior class are being measured for their uniforms. Long lines stretch the corridors composed of men eager to demonstrate that they are true knights of the sword by being able to sport the external habiliments common to the trade. The tailor is making frantic efforts to keep the lines moving at the expense of his good humor. In all 200 men are to be fitted during the week. All those failing to meet the tailor this week will have to make a special appointment with him.

The uniforms are provided gratis by the government to all advanced R. O. T. C. students whose only obligation is to wear them once a week. Those failing to conform with this regulation will be required to make up for their delinquency by wearing the suits twice the next week. Last year \$12,000 was spent by the government on the students for uniforms alone, besides the \$50,000 in pay that was given to the advanced students.

The uniforms are the standard officer's suit with the single exception that they have a Norfolk collar instead of the usual stand up type. Extra material is provided by the government so that a simple operation on the collar transforms the suit into the regular officer's uniform. The student keeps his suit upon graduation. A fund is provided from which men may draw \$6 apiece at the beginning of the senior year with which to refurbish their uniforms, sew on buttons and make all necessary repairs. They cost the government about \$30 each.

Jacob Read's Sons of Philadelphia popular army tailors, are in charge of the measuring in the department headquarters in building 3. All necessary tailoring is provided at government expense and the men are expected to make sure that their suits fit them to their own satisfaction.

The uniforms proved a great advantage to the men at the various summer camps. Post hops came more easily, attired in the snug fitting R. O. T. C. models than in the regulation O. D. uniforms issued to the students.

The uniform as provided by the government consists of blouse, breeches, cap and leather puttees. Shoes must be bought at the student's expense, together with a Sam Brown belt if desired. The department promises to accommodate all sizes and shapes provided they will show up for the measuring before the end of the week.
