A training table will commence for track men this fall just as soon as a committee can make arrangements for it. At the meeting of the M.I.T.A.A. yesterday afternoon, J. W. Cannon '24, treasurer of the A.A., was appointed as chairman of the aforementioned committee, while G. R. Holt '24, R. W. Ambach '24, and R. S. Wilson, Jr., '25 were named as the other members.

At the present time crew men will not be included in the arrangements, but later developments may result in their eating with the runners. At any rate, they will be perfectly free to do so if their management should favor such a move.

The appointment of the committee insures the continuation of the custom of the training table which was initiated last spring. Members of the teams who ate at the table last year expressed themselves at the time as being well pleased with it, and that it was of great benefit to them.

R. J. Hochstettler, '24 was appointed basketball manager for the coming season. He was forced to resign from the position on account of his studies after his election last year. PUBLIC HEALTH MEN CONVENE THIS WEEK

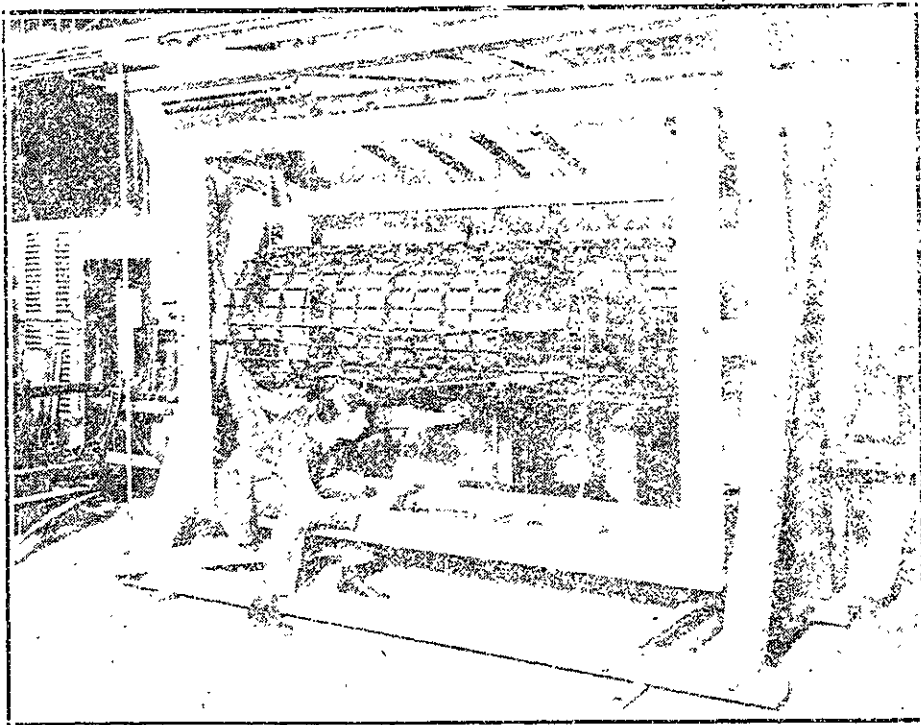
Fifty-Second Annual Convention
Meets in Huntington
Hall, Rogers

This week the American Public Health Association will hold its fifty-second annual convention in Huntington Hall, Rogers. Eminent biologists from all over the country will spend a week in session to listen to papers on the advancement of public health work since last year. It is of special interest to the Institute because of the large percentage of Technology graduates among those attending.

Public health is a relatively new science and it is only in the last quarter of a century that men have been especially trained for this kind of work. Technology, however, was a pioneer in the field, the first course in Public Health being given 30 years ago with Professor Sedgwick. Since that time the department has grown rapidly and has put forth men who have become famous as public health experts. Several hold prominent places in the coming convention. The president, E. C. Levy '04, the retiring secretary, A. W. Hedrich '17, and the incoming secretary, H. N. Calver '14, are all graduates of the Institute. Other Technology men figuring on the council and the different committees are: Prof. C. E. A. Winslow '98, on the council, Dr. S. H. Osborne '15, secretary of Public Health Administration, Dr. J. F. Norton '06, secretary of the laboratory section, Professor J. O. Jordan, secretary of the Food and Drugs committee, and Professor C. E. Turner '17, secretary of the Child Hygiene committee, also of the Biology department of the Institute.

Of the many papers that are to be read a large number are by Technology graduates. Dr. M. P. Horwood '16 and Professor S. C. Prescott '94 of the Biology department will also present papers. According to a custom which has existed for several years, the Technology men attending the convention will meet together at a dinner which will be given this week.

LIGHT MEN URGED TO GO OUT FOR COXWAIN'S JOB

Varsity Eight This Year Must
Be Made up Largely of
New Material

"I'll bet if there was a call for six foot, 170 pound men to form an expedition to beat up a Boston cop or drive a flivver down a subway that there would be at least a dozen men answering, from the freshman class alone. These big fellows are the ones we want for our freshman crew; they are there; get them out." These words of Coach Stevens' talk to the crew mass meeting Friday gave an idea to the 175 men present of the sort of material he wants for the crews this year.

His talk was the third on a program addressed mainly to the new men, composing about half the number assembled in room 5-330. Stressing the point of size and weight, Coach Stevens spoke of the fact that the varsity eight this year will have to be made from practically new material, and that future successful varsities depend on men well trained in their freshman year.

Turnout Pleases Captain Eaton
Manager Stanton opened the meeting by introducing Captain Dick Eaton, of this year's varsity. Pleased with the large turnout so early in the season, Captain Eaton urged the men to get the proper spirit toward rowing at the Institute. Success he said, is largely a matter of the proper enjoyment of the sport and the men engaged in it.

Dr. A. W. Rowe '01, next to address the men, gave the attitude of the alumni who are sponsoring rowing at Technology. Then want to see crews on the river made up of men enjoying the exercise and the health the sport gives them; that they be winning crews; secondary in the minds of those backing the sport, though this end is perhaps of greater interest to the men.

Football Squads to Meet
Local Teams for
Practice

FIRST TRYOUT OF CREW CANDIDATES SATURDAY

With the dawning of the second week of the term, preparations for Field Day start in earnest. Long before the end of this week the Sophomore outfits will be greeted with a formidable '26 array, for all but one of last year's team are expected to answer the call. The first practice is scheduled for this afternoon at five o'clock and all candidates are expected to report at the field ready for work.

Practice Games Scheduled

As in previous years, the opposing teams will play several practice games with nearby schools. At present the Sophomores schedule calls for two contests, both on foreign fields.

First will come Dean Academy, on the afternoon of October 13. Then a week later the '26 men journey to Andover for their last session before they line up against the '27 representatives.

Must Furnish Own Togs

In all sports candidates must furnish their own equipment, although for Field Day the rival teams are issued jerseys of the proper color. For the Sophomores, gray will be the tint, while the freshmen will be more colorful, having their sweaters dyed cardinal.

Saturday the crew candidates had their first workout, the men reporting at the boat house at one o'clock. The entire eight men who manned the shell last November are back in line for the present year and ready to defend their right to a place in the boat.

While comparative data are not available, the consensus of opinion seems to be that the freshmen who have appeared for crew are heavier on the average than their upperclass opponents. Until actual weighings of the two boats have been made, however, no figures can be given.

PRESIDENT STRATTON MADE DOCTOR OF LAWS

Among those honored by Harvard University at Commencement last June 21 was our own President Stratton who had conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws. President Lowell of Harvard in conferring this degree declared President Stratton "A standard bearer, who from material things has turned to standards for education and for men."

At the same time two Institute graduates, F. H. Duff '16 and E. D. Reynolds '17, received the degree of Doctor of Medicine. Dr. Ewald Tomenak of Prague, who took his certificate in Public Health in the Harvard-Technology School of Public Health was awarded the degree of Doctor of Public Health.

TESTS MADE AT INSTITUTE FOR DIRIGIBLE ZR-1

Tests by Photoelastic Methods
Made on Dirigible Model
By Prof. Norton

DESIGNER TO BECOME A MEMBER OF THE FACULTY

Institute Men Take Prominent
Part in Construction
of Airship

Information has just been released by the Bureau of Aeronautics of the Navy Department to the effect that for the last ten months a study of a celluloid model of the dirigible ZR-1 by means of photoelastic methods has been carried on at the Institute under the direction of Professor C. L. Norton '93, head of the Physics Department.

The ZR-1 was scheduled to fly over Boston last Saturday and also for the Brockton fair, but adverse weather conditions prevailed, causing the trip to be cancelled.

Thousands of Parts in Model

No definite statements of the results of the tests can be made, but Navy Department officials have expressed themselves as well pleased with the data obtained. These tests are "believed of distinct value" and will be of "material aid in the design of airships to prevent repetition of the ZR-2 and Roma disasters."

Several thousand pieces of celluloid fashioned precisely to scale were fitted together in a duplicate of the giant plane. The testing was then performed in the photoelastic laboratory by Dr. Paul Heymans and Mr. T. H. Frost of the Institute staff, who were working under the supervision of Professor Norton.

Equipment Unique

Although the phenomena of photoelasticity have been known for some time, it is only recently that they have been used to settle problems of structural design, many of which can not be solved any other way. The laboratory of the Department of Physics is the only one in the western hemisphere equipped to carry on this kind of work.

Professor Heymans states: "By this photoelastic method we can look into the vast and intricate network of the dirigible and see exactly what is going on when it is laboring. We can see how she is carrying and distributing the load. We have made an analysis of the ZR-1, saying exactly how the stress are taken up by the members of the frame and the wires. When we hear of the new forces which the ship must meet in its ven-
