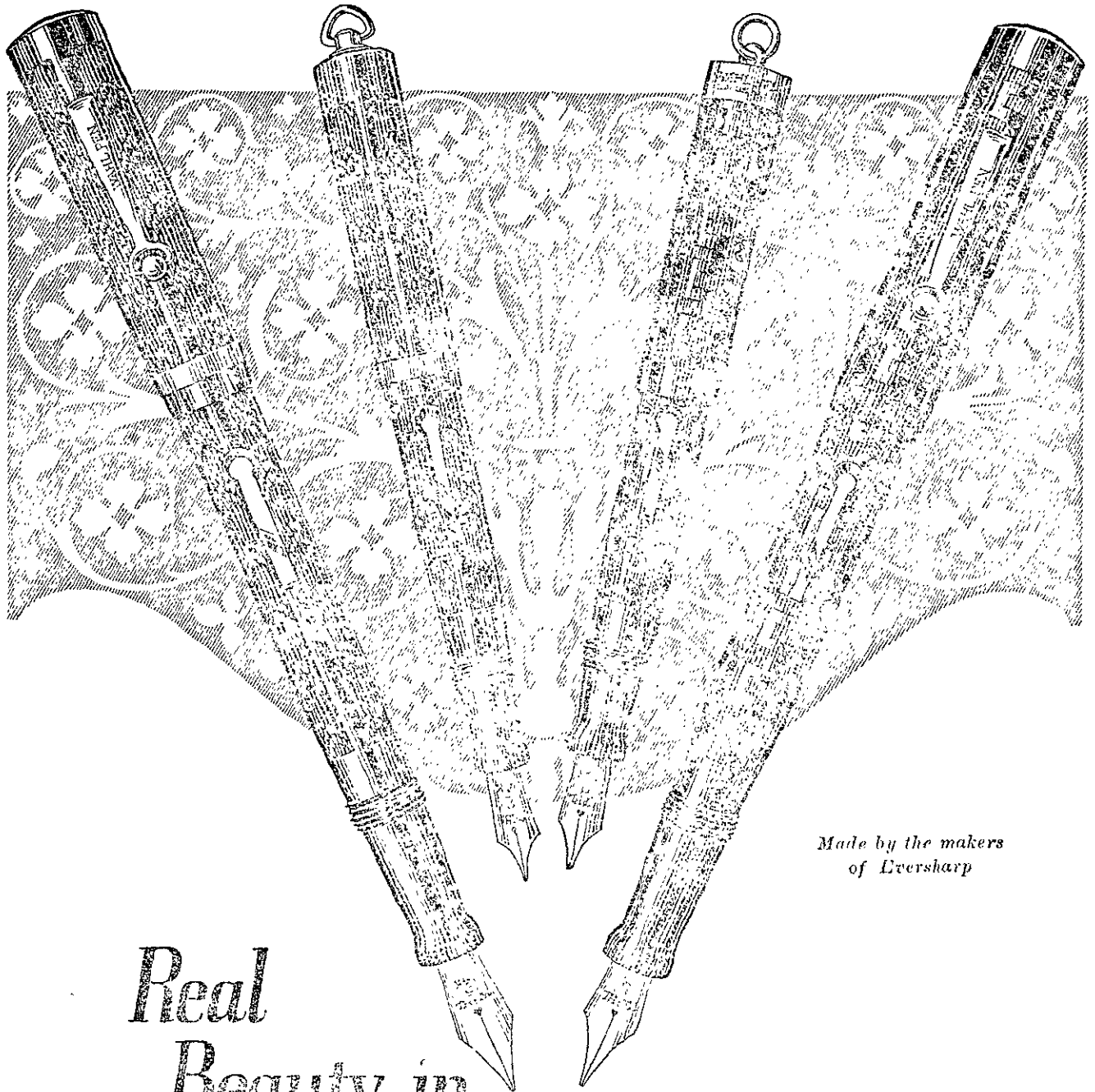
R.O.T.C. SENIORS

tures overhead we can try them out on the model here at Technology.
By the photoelastic method polarized light is passed through the celluloid under different conditions of load. The stresses are shown in all colors of the rainbow. Since the structural action of celluloid is the same as that of the metals used in the airship, it is easy to determine how the plane itself will behave under different actions of the model.
The ZR-1 was planned by C. F. Burgess, who will become a member of the Institute faculty next January, and Star Truscott '07. Both men are in the Navy Department. Two of Technology' alumni prominently connected with the building of the dirigible were Commander J. C. Hunsaker '12, Chief of Design of the Bureau of Aeronautics, and Commander R. D. Weyerbacher '14, Superintendent of Construction on the ship.

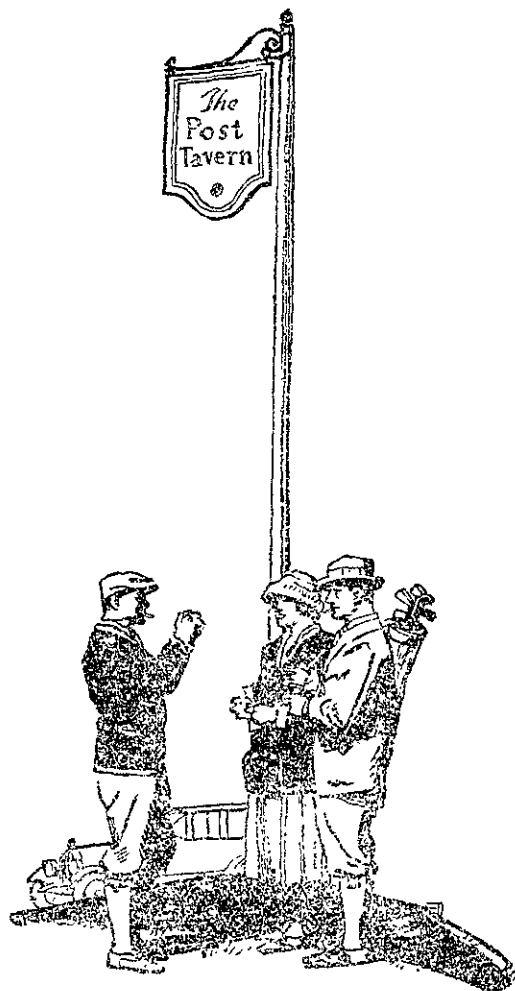
