SOPH FOOTBALL PROSPECTS POOR WITHOUT COACH

Team Faces Heavy Handicap With No One to Train Candidates

The Sophomore football team is still in that state of inertia which affords amusement to the freshmen and fill with chagrin those Sophomores who possess pride of class. To date the squad has confined its practice to punting up and down the field when a football is available, and to putting the shot and watching the freshmen the rest of the time.

The daily turnout of candidates is far below that of the freshmen. This is bad enough in itself, coming from a class that has passed through one Field Day defeat, but the worst is that no one is on hand to sign them up when they do turn out and no coach in sight to tell them what is expected in the way of practice.

The second speaker was Mr. Calder, a consulting engineer with over 25 years' experience in industry and personnel work. Since his graduation from the Royal Technical College in Glasgow, Scotland, Mr. Calder had been actively engaged in industry in England, France and America. During the first part of the war, he was aiding France in her industry, and when the United States entered the war, came to this country to direct the work of airplane construction.

Taking up the discussion of labor about where the previous speaker had left off, he said that there was seldom trouble with the progressives among the laborers or the capitalistic group. Those who were "know-it-alls" and who were heedless of reason, he said were causing the present difficulties.

During the summer the men were asked to start work so that an idea of what they had done could be gotten. The program calls for meetings about once weekly where songs and lyrics will be discussed in detail. At this first meeting the composers will be addressed by E. P. Collins '19, and also by H. G. Ripley, Sp. All men interested should endeavor to be present, as much which is of value to them will be spoken of.

It is planned to select the best song, and pass them around to all the lyric writers. In this way it is hoped to secure the very best lyrics and also to have plenty of them. This plan will probably be followed in the writing of songs to lyrics as well which thus assures a maximum supply of show music.

The Boston performances will take place in the Opera House as usual on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 17, 18 and 19 respectively. This makes a total of nine shows as against the same number last year.

Another important branch of the Show which seldom is heard of, but which is nevertheless very important, is the production of the music and lyrics. Tech Show would not be Tech Show were it not for the original music which plays so important a part. With this end in view, Gavin Watson '24, who heads the music committee this year, has called the first meeting of lyric and music writers for next Monday afternoon at 5. The men should meet in North Hall where Watson will explain to them just what type of song is wanted.
