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collegiates held at New York where he ran up against such opposition as Tootell of Bowdoin, New England Champion, Dexter was awarded a straight "T." The spring track season opened with Maine; and Dexter contributed to the 81-44 Engineer victory by taking second in the low hurdles. In the Harvard meet he placed himself far in the lead of his crimson opponents by taking first in the hammer throw with 136 ft. 10 1/4 in.

The Dartmouth meet proved to be a rally day for Dexter as he placed in three events taking second in the high hurdles, third in the shotput and the hammer. Tootell upheld his reputation in the New England by taking the hammer throw with a distance of 168 ft. 11 in., Dexter securing fourth with 131 ft. The final test came in the Intercollegiate held at Philadelphia and although Tootell took the hammer toss with the record throw of 181 ft. 6 1/2 in., Dexter outdid himself by securing third over a field of college stars with a throw of 146 ft. 9 1/8 in. Hills of Princeton taking second with 149 ft.

Dexter prepared at Duval High School and entered Technology as a Sophomore. He was on the Junior Prom Committee, Ex. utive Committee, and the Dormitory Committee, being Chairman his fourth year.

TECH MEN IN THE TELEPHONE INDUSTRY

According to Mr. W. E. Wickenden, Assistant Vice-President of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company, the Technology men in the several companies of the Bell System, make up by far the largest group from any one institution. This group of Tech men numbers close to 250 men and an unusual proportion of them have won positions of great responsibility. In recent years the contributions of Tech men to the advancement of the communication art have been particularly conspicuous. In the field of research and development, Dr. G. A. Campbell '91, O. B. Blackwell '06, B. W. Kendall '06, H. S. Osborne '08, J. R. Carson '09, R. L. Jones '09, L. P. Ferris '11 and W. H. Martin '11 have taken leading parts in creating the modern art of long distance transmission. K. W. Waterson '98, the Assistant Chief Engineer of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company, has been the directing genius behind the Traffic Engineering work of the system, involving the handling of 35,000,000 telephone connections a day. H. P. Charlesworth and W. H. Matthies '02 have had important parts in developing central office equipment, particularly of the machine switching type. F. L. Rhodes '92, is in charge of all new developments in outside plant construction. Dr. F. B. Jewett '01, a former member of the Faculty, has for many years directed the great Research Laboratories of the System and is now Vice President of the Western Electric Company, in charge of all its telephone activities.

Technology men have been equally distinguished in the administrative and technical work of the operating companies. W. A. Drake '95 is Chief Commercial Superintendent of the Long Lines Department. H. B. Coolidge '94, occupies a like post with the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company. W. O. Pennell '96, is Chief Engineer of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. F. J. Chesterman '05, is Chief Engineer of the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania. G. W. McRae '10, has recently been appointed Chief Engineer of the Illinois Bell Telephone Company. G. A. Pennock '99, is Plant Superintendent at the Hawthorne Works of the Western Electric Company. F. A. Benham '06, is Fundamental Plan Engineer of the New England Telephone & Telegraph Co.

The rapid expansion of the telephone industry is not generally appreciated. In point of volume of service, revenue and investment in plant, it has practically doubled since 1915. This growth continues unchecked despite the prevailing business depression. To provide for the needed increase in the technical and administrative staff, the usual number of accessions from this year's graduates will be made in all branches of the industry. These opportunities are of very great variety. They include physical, chemical and mathematical research, the development of new apparatus and systems, apparatus and plant design, plant construction and maintenance, the improvement of operating practice, studies of growth and of future requirements, valuations and rate studies and other forms of commercial engineering transmission practices, the supervision of operations in plant traffic and commercial departments and the entire range of technical and administrative problems involved in the manufacture, distribution and installation of telephone equipment.
