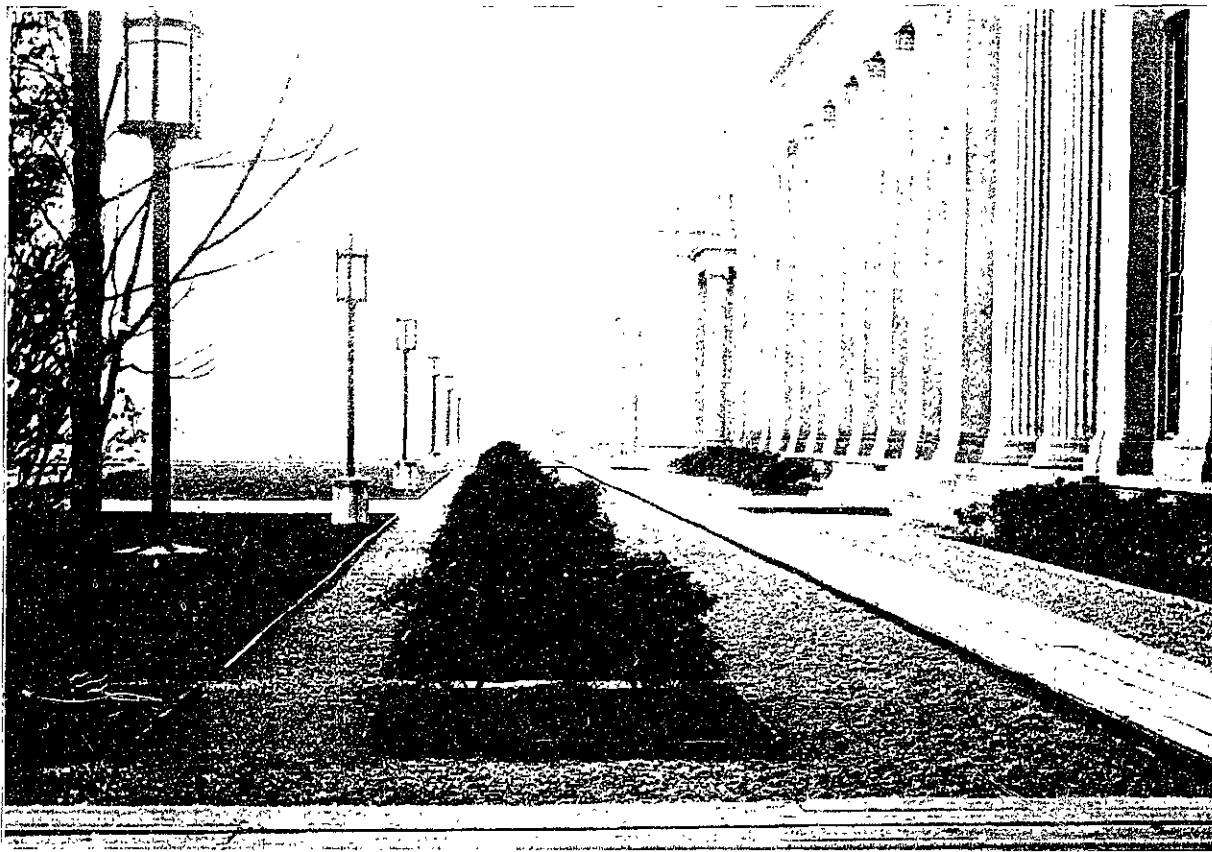


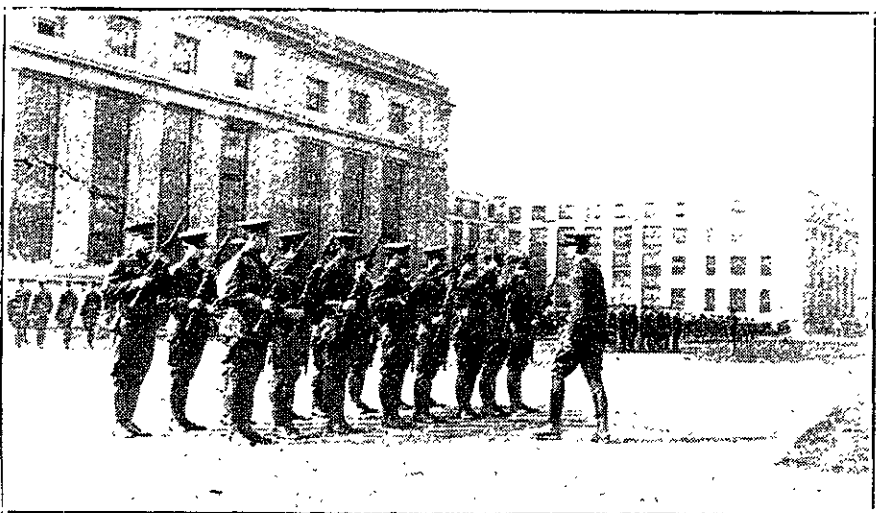


A FAMILIAR VIEW OF THE NEW BUILDINGS



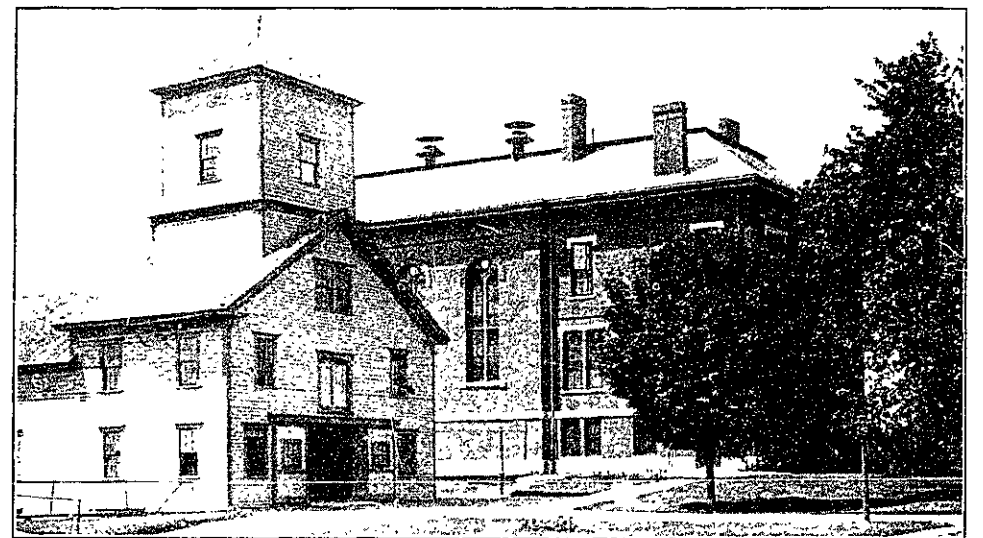
BY WAY OF CONTRAST WITH THE MODERN TECHNOLOGY
