

HARRIERS RACE TOMORROW OVER 3 MILE COURSE

Varsity—Divided Into Seven
Teams—Gets Together in
Trial of Speed

FRESHMEN ACCOMPANY
VETERANS IN RACE

Time Trials Tuesday Will
Determine Teams to
Meet Cornell

Tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 seven teams of varsity harriers and a throng of freshmen will start from the track house in an informal three mile race up the esplanade, and past the boat house. With the opening meet at Cornell but a week off, this is the first time the whole of the varsity squad has been gathered together for a trial of speed. The course at Ithaca, contrary to the ruggedness of the Technology stamping ground at Belmont, is practically level throughout its entire length. A different kind of running is required than on the home course—easier perhaps, but certainly more monotonous.

Teams Will Be of Even Strength
In the race tomorrow the veteran members of the squad will be divided up, one or two men going into each team. The teams then will be as evenly divided in strength as possible, and new men will be given a better chance to show their worth than if all the strength were placed in one squad. The 22 freshmen harriers that start with the varsity will not be divided up into teams. It will be a case of every man for himself as the way the freshmen finish will be a factor in determining the composition of the yearling squad.

This race will be the last strenuous workout for the varsity before the final time trials Tuesday in preparation for the Cornell meet. It will not be counted in determining places on the team, the time trials will take care of

on Sale Monday

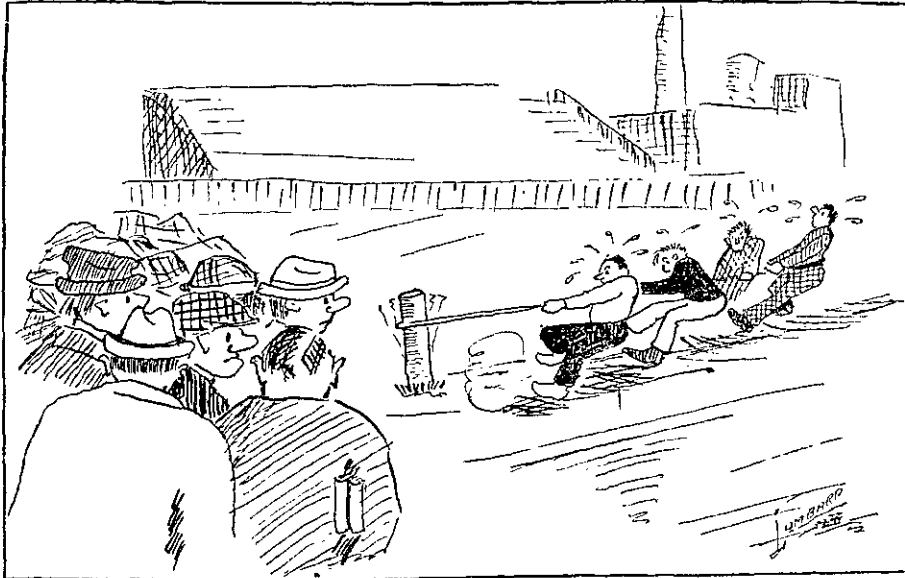

PARADE AFTER TECH NIGHT IS PLANNED NOW

Preliminary Arrangements Complete—Announce Theatre
Next Week

TECHNOLOGY BLOTTER TANGLE IS EXPLAINED

After the theater is over Tech Night, a parade will be formed and the students will march out to Technology where they will take part in a barbecue. The line of march will be through the down town section across the East Cambridge bridge and out Charles River Road to the Institute. Permits for the parade have already been obtained from the Boston police.

This news was made public yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Institute Committee. The tangle in regard to the printing of the Technology Blotter by the T. C. A. was straightened out and the Combined Drive for all charities was accepted.

No Confetti or Missiles Allowed

The theater where Tech Night will be celebrated has not yet been selected, final action having been delayed until the committee in charge had been "empowered by the Institute Committee to proceed with the arrangements." This power was granted, so that the theater will probably be announced next week.

The preliminaries for the contract have been gone over, but this year the committee must guarantee the selling of "the whole house, due to the action of the men last year" said L. P. Marsh '24, chairman of the committee. There will be cheering at the theater, and also the usual hats and banners, but the management will not allow the use of confetti or other missiles.

Theater Lets Out Early

Box seats will be reserved for members of the Field Day teams. Seniors will have seats in the orchestra. Juniors will be in the orchestra and balcony. Sophomores are to sit in the balcony, and freshmen will be placed in the gallery. The date of sale of tickets is to be announced later.

It is planned to have the show let out half an hour early so that the parade will miss the after theater crowds. Members of the Tech Night Committee are L. P. Marsh '24, chairman, and E. S. Johnston '25, B. A. Oxnard '24, J. A. Drain '26, J. B. Kimberly '26, J. P. Larkin '26, and J. S. Moon '26.

PRESIDENT STRATTON FOR COMBINED DRIVE

"I am heartily in favor of the Combined Drive. Quite a number of communities conduct their charitable work along similar lines. I see no reason why it would not result in more efficient and economical handling of the whole situation here at the Institute," said President S. W. Stratton when interviewed yesterday evening after his return from Europe the day before.

"I am in favor of Tech Night. I feel that if the Tech men keep before them the honor and reputation of the Institute and do not injure property or do anything indecent there is no objection to Tech Night. They should keep liquor out of it. We should hesitate before we think of abolishing an old tradition of Technology. They should be allowed to have their fun as Tech men do not have enough fun anyway," he said when asked what he thought of Tech Night as an institution at Technology.

T.C.A., Friendship Club and Red
Cross to Be Only
Benefactors

DRIVE TO BE HELD DURING FIRST TERM

A single "blanket drive" will be conducted for charities at Technology this term. As a result of action taken at the Institute Committee meeting yesterday afternoon, the T. C. A., the Red Cross, and the Student Friendship Fund will be the sole benefactors of this drive. The campaign will be held during the first term and no others this year will be permitted by the Institute Committee.

Point by point, the report of the Drive Committee was accepted. Strong opposition developed to some of the provisions of the report, but in each case it was accepted without change. The Committee was appointed at a meeting of the Executive Committee Tuesday afternoon.

Parker Speaks Favoring Idea

The report as accepted provides that the T. C. A. will receive the first \$2000 collected in the drive. All money over that amount will be divided equally between the Red Cross and the Student Friendship Fund.

In bringing the drive to the attention of the Institute Committee G. E. Parker '24, chairman of the investigating body, said that the purpose of the drive was to "save the students the trouble of being approached for money several times during the year." He expressed the opinion that a larger sum will be obtained, and that in future years any other organization that might want to conduct a campaign would get its application in time to receive its share of the single drive.

Several Oppose Plan

Ernest Hosbach '24 and C. A. Frank, Jr., '24 spoke to oppose the scheme, as each thought that not enough money could be raised by it. S. Vogelgesang '24 was the chief opponent of the plan, saying that it "interferes with the right of a man to give to one fund in preference to another."

He also opposed the prohibiting of other drives, citing the Good Will campaign of last year when the Architects aided by the rest of the Institute helped in sending Miss Marjorie Peirce to France. The claim was advanced that a similar emergency might arise, or that something corresponding to the Japanese earthquake might cause a demand for a fund to be raised by Institute students.

Quarles Gives Attitude of T. C. A.

T. F. Bundy '24 replied that in case of any such necessity that the Institute Committee could reconsider its action, and that the provision would prevent the holding of any small unimportant campaigns. At this point C. M. Phelps '24 stated that "the success of the combined drive depends largely upon the committee's being able to insure the students that it will be the only drive of the year."

W. W. Quarles, Jr., '24, president of the T. C. A. stated that the latter organization "wants only enough to cover its budget." He explained that this amount was absolutely necessary to the Association if it was to keep up its customary services to the men of the Institute, but that it did not ask for any more than this.

WINNER OF POSTER CONTEST ANNOUNCED

A. W. K. Billings '25 won the Prize Poster Contest of the Musical Clubs. The winner will receive two tickets to each of the four concerts given by the clubs.
