MILITARY ENGINEERS TO MEET ON TUESDAY

Major Godfrey to Speak—Rifle Matches at Camp Perry To Be Discussed

Major S. C. Godfrey '07, who left the Institute to make at West Point the highest scholastic record that has ever been made at the military academy, will return to Technology Tuesday evening to discuss the "Duties of an Engineer Officer" at the Engineer Corps smoker, which will be held in the grill, Walker Memorial, at 7:30 o'clock.

Major Godfrey has had wide and varied engineering experience, involving the Panama Canal and the Muske Shoals project. He also saw service in France. Music will be supplied by members of the corps, and refreshments will be served. All Juniors and Seniors are invited. At this meeting nominations for next year's officers will be made from the floor, and balloting by mail will take place during the following week.

Institute Men Will Speak

It is expected that accounts will be given of rifle matches held at Camp Perry, Ohio, last summer, by the Technology participants, C. S. Stodter '24 and E. B. Davidson '24. Both of these men obtained the rank of sharpshooters at the camp, and their team, seven men from Camp Devens, came out in the twentieth rank from among 66 competing teams, most of whose members had had more training.

Major Godfrey is district engineer for the civil work of the government, being consulted on all federal engineering projects in the states of Maine, New Hampshire, and Massachusetts. He is also First Corps Area engineer, besides the holder of other similar positions. During the recent war he commanded the 2nd Engineers in France. The Society of American Engineers is a national organization, but the officers and students at the Institute have formed a local chapter, recruited from those men at the Institute in the engineers' unit. All Sophomores and Juniors interested in joining this are invited to attend the smoker.

IF PROBLEMS PUZZLE PHONE YOUR P.E.E. PROF.

Insufficient data constitutes no excuse for failure to get problems in on time, Professor D. C. Jackson, head of the Electrical Engineering department, informed his P. E. E. sections Wednesday. If you start to work on a problem and find that there is not enough data given to solve the problem, he advises to call up your instructor on the telephone and find out what's what.

To P. E. E. students in particular, Professor Jackson says, "Professor Timbie is in charge of the course, so you will naturally call him up first." Professors Timbie and Ricker, study as late as 12:30 o'clock, he says further, inserting a warning note to the effect that a phone call at 10:30 last night would have found him in bed. The phone numbers of Professors Timbie and Ricker are respectively West Newton 0889 and Arlington 1706W; that of Professor Jackson is University 4624M.

Professor Jackson advocates for instructors the practice of working for themselves the problems they are about to assign to see if they can be done in the time allotted. He reports that he has known of cases in his own department where professors, in their natural exuberance, have assigned lessons which they could not do themselves in twice the time provided. Once in a while the pace becomes so swift that he has to get hold of some of his supervisors of courses and sit alongside of them while they work out their lessons, keeping track of the time required.
