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from beginning to end. The candidates were divided into five teams each, headed by a varsity harrier and the individual teams made every effort to come out on top. As a means of doing this the team's captains tried to keep their squads intact up to the turning point at least. This meant that the varsity men had to hang back and hence lose ground while urging their team on.

Although the run was just the thing for the purpose of letting Coach Connor get a line on the material with which he is going to work, it was not a fair trial to test the ability of the varsity harriers. The time trials for the Cornell run will take care of that tomorrow.

Teams Closely Matched

The first two teams to cross the line were pretty evenly matched as their score differed only by two points. Keplinger and Duffy, aided by Preston, Brown, and Hooper, carried their team to victory scoring 59 points to the 61 made by Parkinson and Duffy, with their teammates Grossman, Norwood and Wells. The squad headed by Davidson and Peck nosed out Fricker and his mates even though Fricker headed the whole crowd of runners, as the rest of the team secured better places than did the remainder of the winner's squad. Captain Holt lead the next combination into fifth position, though they came within a hair of tying the count with Fricker's men as one point separated the two scores.

The freshmen all ran together in one big squad and although Gaylord gives promise of fast development, as he was the thirteenth to cross the finish line, the material for the frosh team appears only to be fair this season. The next two men to cross the line came in number 25 and 26.

Bright Varsity Prospects

The chances for a winning varsity cross country team appear to be bright if Saturday's race can give any indications of what is to come. The good showing of Fricker this year boosts the Engineer's stock considerably. He placed fourth in the annual handicap against such opposition as was afforded by Bob Hendrie and Elmer Sauborn. Another man available for the team is Rooney, last year's freshman star. He was the first man to score for the frosh in the Intercollegiate run at New York last season. Duffy has been on the varsity squad before and indications point to his making a strong bid for a regular varsity berth.

Parkinson, Holt, Keplinger, Gardiner and Robertson are veterans of experience and with the number of new men a well balanced team can be formed to represent Technology.

All the candidates for the varsity and freshman teams did not run Saturday as a number of the men went over the course that morning, among them were Bemis and Myrrick. Only one accident marred the afternoon's race, Rick, the former Princeton star, being forced out of the contest with a bad leg. He has been training with the relay men and very probably has been doing too much work.

Tomorrow afternoon at 5:15 the time trials will be held over a four mile course to determine who will compose the Engineer harrier team that meets Cornell at Ithaca Saturday. The trials will be run along the esplanade from Harvard Bridge to a point this side of Cottage Farm Bridge, which makes the distance between the bridges about a mile, hence up and back twice will furnish the runners with the necessary four mile course.

The race of last Saturday was only a workout for the cross country candidates and had no official bearing as to the selection of men for the Cornell run. Tomorrow ten men will be picked for Saturday's race, and the runners will be carefully timed. As this is the first time the harriers have been really clocked this year, some spirited competition can be looked for. Cornell has Kirk, their star runner and winner last year at the Penn relays; in addition, Coach Moakley has a number of other veterans on hand, so Gubby Holt and his mates will have no easy time of it at Ithaca.

Competition Looked For

In the run Saturday the varsity men were somewhat handicapped by the necessity of sticking with the particular team which they are leading, and so the true ability of the harriers could not be judged. Tomorrow every man will be for himself and the times will give a good basis for comparing the runners.

As the harriers crossed the road leading from the Cottage Farm Bridge last Saturday, it meant that the runners had to dodge the traffic while crossing the street or that all the traffic was held up while the racers ran across. The latter course was the one pursued Saturday but it was feared that it might be some little job to stop all the traffic coming across Cottage Farm Bridge at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, hence the new course was planned which did not necessitate the crossing the streets.

EXTENSION COURSES OPEN AT INSTITUTE

During the past week two University Extension Courses opened at the Institute. The first meeting of a course in "Health Education," given by Professor C. E. Turner of Technology, was held last Tuesday. This course is expected to prove of special interest to nurses and teachers as it deals primarily with procedures and methods used in health education by school and health departments. Classes meet on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 4:30 o'clock.

The second course is one on the "Physiological Basis of Health" or "Personal Hygiene," and will deal with such subjects as conditions and causes of personal health and disease, exercise, work, play, hygiene of clothing, and mental hygiene. Classes are to meet weekly on Wednesdays at 4:30 o'clock. The first meeting was held last Wednesday. Professor J. W. M. Bunker of Technology is the instructor for this course.

Students taking either of these courses and desiring to receive credit from the Institute should register as special students and pay a fee of \$5 in addition to the \$15 tuition charged by the state.

16000 BOOKS ADDED TO INSTITUTE LIBRARIES

During the latter part of the summer, the Walker Memorial Library has been greatly enlarged. The number of shelves has been almost doubled so that many more books can be accommodated. The extra books are either new or have been moved over from the Main Library. The Main Library has also been increased during the summer. About sixteen thousand books have been added since the first of July. At present, there are only six branch libraries. The largest of these is the library of Business Administration and Engineering. There is no longer a Physics Branch as that was moved up to the Main Library during the summer. It is now catalogued with the latter.

The Vail Library is also being joined with the Main Library. The work has not progressed very far as yet, but it is hoped that it will be finished by the end of the Christmas holidays. Mrs. Lane, who is in charge of this library, is giving a series of lectures at present to show how to use the libraries to the best advantage.

FIFTY MENORAHS MEET

About fifty of the Jewish students attended the initial meeting and smoker of the Menorah Society, Thursday evening in Walker. Dr. Samuel J. Abrams addressed the gathering on modern Jewish problems and an informal discussion followed his talk.

President George Neitich '24 emphasized the benefits of joining the society and opened the membership drive. The officers plan to have more undergraduates attend the next gathering which is expected to be a joint meeting with the Radcliffe Menorah Society. Other plans for the coming season were outlined at the same time.

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
