Class Seated Together

Tickets will be on sale from 9 till 2 o'clock in the main lobby. As last year the classes will be seated together, the freshmen in the second balcony, Sophomores and Juniors in the first balcony and the Seniors and graduates on the orchestra floor. The highest price ticket this year will be \$3.00 as compared with \$2.50 last year. No man will be allowed to get more than five tickets in which case he must give the names of the men for whom he is purchasing the tickets. There will be no refunds this year and anyone wishing to take outsiders must see Marsh Tuesday evening.

Boxes for Athletes

Field Day teams will have box seats again this year and special seats are going to be reserved for the band. At the show this year nothing will be thrown or any pigeons let loose though the customary caps will prevail. This year the show will contain special jokes inserted regarding Technology.

After the show the student body will parade out Tremont Street to Boylston Street and from there to Charles Street where it will cross the East Cambridge Bridge and proceed to the Athletic Field for the barbecue.

Enjoy Feed and Song

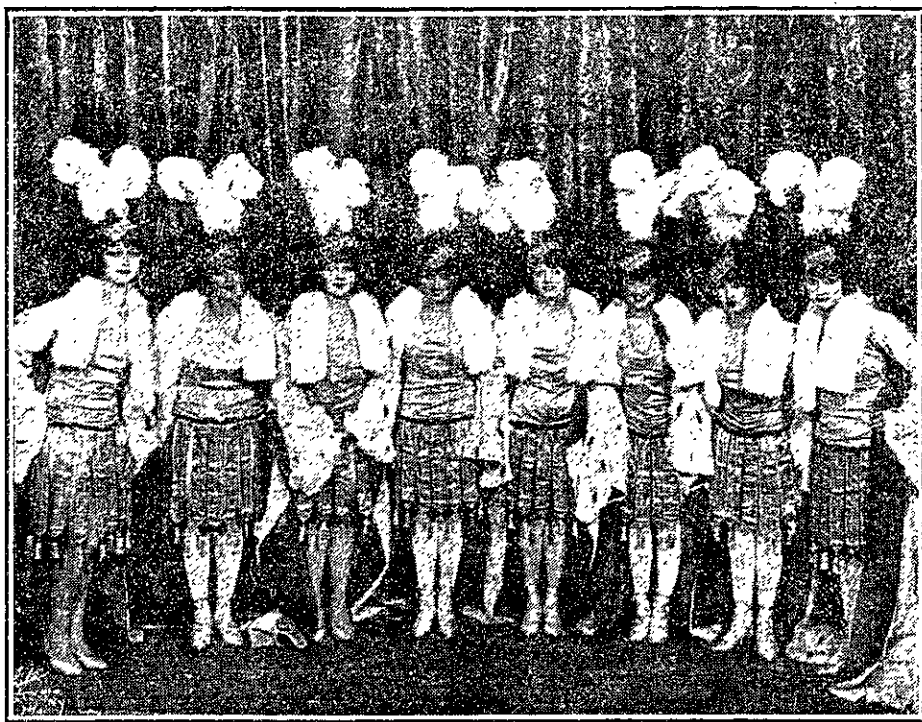

CHAIRMEN SELECT REST OF CHARITY DRIVE COMMITTEE

Drive to Be From November 12
to 17—Only Charity
Campaign of Year

With 27 men enlisted, the Combined Drives Committee is now complete. The various chairmen picked Saturday by the Executive Committee of the Institute Committee met Monday afternoon in the T. C. A. office and appointed the remaining members of the committee which will have charge of the Combined Charities Drive, to be held at the Institute from November 12 to 17.

The drive, which will be the only charity campaign of the year, will attempt to raise \$4000, \$2000 of which will be turned over to the Technology Christian Association, and \$1000 each to the Red Cross and the Student Friendship fund. The committee plans to conduct the drive so that every member of the student body and faculty will be reached. They aim to obtain an average of \$2 per man.

Speakers Furnish Publicity

To stimulate interest in the campaign there will be a competition during the week among the classes, courses, and fraternities, for the largest per cent of the total contributed. The Speakers division of the committee plans to present the facts of the drive to students at classes, and also there will be talks on the drive at the fraternities.

AWARD OF BOIT PRIZES ANNOUNCED

Adams, Ward, and Kuss, Members
of Sophomore Class
Receive Cash Prizes

The awards of the Boit Prizes for the third term last year were made yesterday afternoon by Mr. James P. Munroe '82, secretary of the Corporation, who presented the three prizes of twenty-five dollars each.

The winners of the prizes were W. H. Adams '25, who wrote on "Are Science and Religion Irreconcilable?" and Roger Ward '25 who wrote on "Reaction With Audubon as a Catalyst." Theodore Kuss, who wrote on "Where In The Devil Is It" was not present to receive his twenty-five dollars. Mr. Munroe suggested that one might ask "Where in the devil is he?"

Prizes Given Annually

By the will of the late Robert A. Boit, a prominent insurance man of Boston, the sum of \$5000 was left to the Institute, the interest of which is to be used in annual prizes "to stimulate the interest in the best use of the English language." These prizes are awarded to members of the Sophomore class in English and History on the basis of the required written work done by them. Three prizes of \$25 each are awarded each term. Last year eight members of the Sophomore class were awarded this prize, one man, Glennon Gilboy, receiving the award in both the first and second term.

Mr. Munroe Gives Some Advice

As Mr. Munroe reads these themes, he is naturally interested in the contents and style of them, and he gave some advice to the Sophomores who were present. The first and most important of these points was that the writer must have something to say. Themes which have no message are very hard to get interested in. The second is that the method of delivery be clear and to the point. Involved statements will be looked on with great disfavor. The third point is the age old cry of all readers of themes: namely, make your work readable. As a bit of inside information from one who knows, Mr. Munroe whispered that one should never have the title apply to the subject of a composition, and pointed out Roger Ward's theme "Reaction With Audubon as a Catalyst" as a specific example.

FIRST SEVEN OF TECHNOLOGY TEAM PICKED FOR RUN

Rain Yesterday Prevented Time
Trials to Select Cross
Country Men

LAST THREE RUNNERS TO BE NAMED TODAY

Four Veterans Are Among Those
Picked—Fricker to Run
This Year

As the rain made it impossible to hold time trials yesterday, Coach Connor selected the first seven men who will make up the varsity cross country team that meets Cornell Saturday without timing the harriers. The last three positions on the team will be determined tomorrow when the remainder of the squad will run over a three mile course and the times are taken. Captain Gubby Holt, Fricker, Bemis, Rooney, Parkinson, Duffy, and Keplinger were the seven men picked yesterday. Of the seven runners four are veterans of last season's team, Captain Holt, Bemis, Parkinson, and Keplinger being varsity men under Coach Kanaly. Fricker was ineligible last year and hence was lost to the team while Rooney was the leading man on the freshman squad. Duffy was on the varsity squad last year and has been showing rapid improvement this season. This combination gives Technology a strong team with which to face Coach Moakley's runners next Saturday. The choice for the last three positions on the team probably lies among Grossman, Fife, Howe, Symonds, Davidson, and O'Brien.

Runners are Experienced

All of the seven runners named for the Cornell meet have had experience and their records for last year show that Technology will continue to keep up its good record in cross country. Although the loss of Bob Hendrie and Sanborn will be felt keenly, the material this year promises to develop into a winning team.

Captain Gubby Holt has a record that shows what hard work and perseverance will do. Starting out in his first year at Technology he became the leading freshman harrier. The next year he showed steady improvement and finally won his "cTe" when he was a Soph, but last year
