

FALL HANDICAP TRACK MEET IS HELD SATURDAY

Everyone Is Eligible to Enter Meet—Gives Good Chance To Compete

CANDIDATES NEEDED FOR VARIED EVENTS

The annual fall handicap track meet will be held at Tech Field Saturday afternoon, the purpose of which is to allow the coach to get some idea of the material on hand and to give all candidates an opportunity to show what they can do in competition. Everyone out for track is eligible to compete and although this meet has no official bearing on the selection of a team, the men who enter the meet Saturday will be much better off than those who do not have the experience obtained in the competition.

As Coach Connor will be at Cornell with the varsity cross country team, the meet will be under the direction of Manager Bill Northrop. Competition will be held in all the events in order that the number of men out for the various events can be checked up and the Coach will be able to see in which branch the team lacks candidates. With the handicaps each man will have an equal opportunity to show what he can do and the meet offers good chances for any coming stars to show their ability.

Large Turnout Expected
With 40 men out for fall track and with the other freshman and Sophomore teams competing, a large number of men can be expected on the field Saturday. In addition many men take this opportunity to compete for their first time and hence the novices are much in evidence. The track team has had the disadvantage for the last few years of being weak in the field events and this season quite a few events lack the proper number of candidates. The handicap meet is just for the purpose of remedying such defects by developing new material.

The high jump, sprints, and shot put are suffering most this year from the lack of men, and although some veterans are back in the other events many more men are needed for the track team.

Veterans Back
Captain Ambach will run in the hurdles while Stewart is a favorite in the broad jump. Among the 40 men who have signed up for fall track the events are pretty well distributed. Those out for the high jump are Bloomberg, Shil, Smith, Mitcam and Dexter; for the pole vault Chen, Sanford, Lucy; for the sprints, Joyce, Brewster, Campbell; for the broad jump, Samaha, Makepeace, Bailey, Durkeep; for the shot put and hammer, Black, Garrard.

He had his knee twisted in a rush but kept on playing as it did not appear to be serious. Over Sunday, however, water on the knee developed so that he will have to lay off for a few days.

Stars on Injured List
Burke, star full back for the frosh, has a very bad ankle. There is some question as to whether the ankle is broken and an X-ray will be taken to ascertain this. He will not be able to play for over a week but there is a possibility of his playing on Field Day. He is a valuable man whose presence in the backfield would go far towards making the freshman combination a winning one.

Lynn Game Disastrous
In the game with Lynn, Arky Cargile suffered a badly sprained thumb which is still in a very painful condition. This will put him out of the game for the rest of the week. Davier, who hurt his ankle last week, is improving and will appear on the field again this week. He is a peppy little player, full of spunk, and keeps the whole team fighting by his example.

As few showed up Monday afternoon, the practice did not last long and was limited to some drill in signals and in passing. The forward passes in the Lynn game were not what they should have been and the team will have extensive practice on the aerial stuff this week.

YALE STAR IS OUT OF GAME FOR GOOD

SCRIMMAGES ARE IN ORDER FOR SOPH TEAM

Candidates Are Still Needed By Second Year Eleven

The Sophomore football team practised Monday afternoon but the team is still handicapped by the lack of men. Only 14 men showed up and though some regulars were there, this is a poor showing with Field Day only a little more than two weeks ahead. The maximum number of men that have appeared is under 20 so that the team cannot have any practice scrimmages except with other teams. Last week, a scrimmage with Huntington was held and another is expected this afternoon though it has not been settled with whom.

Scrimmages Needed
The practice so far has been on signals and drill in line rushes. About five more men would be enough to get a good practice system going. Since the Andover game, the Sophs show great fighting spirit and handle the ball in a better manner. With several scrimmages, the Sophomore team would show great improvement especially in the way of coordination. Practice is held every afternoon at four and there is still time for new men to come out. The candidates do not have to be very heavy men for the team has it all over the freshmen already, so far as weight goes. Good fast men to play at end or quarter or even at center are needed.

Gully ran the best races of his career and showed marked improvement throughout the season. In the Cornell meet last year he was seventh man for the Engineers, but through steady advancement, he worked up to being Technology's fourth scoring man in the national intercollegiate at New York.

Captain Holt finished 15th at Cornell, 16th in the Harvard-Dartmouth meet, and ran a good race at Princeton coming in 13th. In the next two intercollegiate meets, Gully ran up against the best runners of the country and ran great races in both.

Bemis Has Good Record
Bemis, who is a junior, also made his start with the frosh barriers, being the leading runner of the 1921 team. Last year he continued to make a name for himself as a hill and daler. He secured fifth place at Cornell, sixth in the triangular meet with Harvard and Dartmouth, and seventh in the run with the Princeton tigers. Bemis showed clearly he was a barrier of the first water when he came in third in the fall handicap against such opposition as Hendrie and Sanborn afforded.

He had his first taste of intercollegiate competition on a big scale in the New Englands, in which he was the 15th to cross the finish line, but his real test came in the national intercollegiate at New York where he showed his ability among the country's best barriers by coming in 12th.

Parkinson a Steady Runner
Parkinson, the third varsity man, proved himself a good, reliable runner all last year. He secured 11th place in three meets, at Cornell, in the Harvard-Dartmouth run, and in the fall handicap. In the New Englands he ran the best race of his career coming in 18th after a hard contest.

Keplinger, the last varsity runner, did not have opportunity to show his ability as he was out after the first run all the season with an infected foot, but his work in the Cornell meet showed that his loss was a hard blow to the team. He was seventh in the Cornell race.

Fricker was ineligible last season and his only run was in the fall handicap, but his record in that proves that he is one of the most valuable men on the team. In the handicap he crossed the line fourth, only Hendrie, Sanborn, and Bemis were ahead of him. His real claim to fame lies in his accomplishment last Saturday when he led the entire field of barriers by over 150 yards in the practice race.

Rooney on Frosh Team
Rooney was the leading man of last year freshman barrier team. In the handicap race he obtained sixth place, and in his first intercollegiate meet in New York he was the first Engineer frosh to cross the line.

Duffy was on the varsity squad last season and has been showing steady improvement. He is developing into one of Technology's most dependable runners. He came in 16th in the fall handicap run last year.

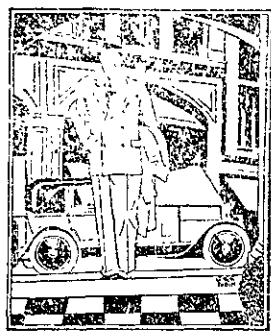
CORNELL PREPARING FOR M.I.T. HARRIERS
