With five veteran harriers and three members of last year's freshman team among the hill and dalers who will run against Cornell, the Engineers will present a team that has more than an even chance to repeat the victory of last year.

CORNELL IN TRAINING FOR INSTITUTE MEET

The runners wrapped in heavier than usual uniforms were sent for a four mile run, the first one and a half miles being taken at a jog and the remaining distance at a racing pace. The probable lineup against Amherst is as follows. Forwards: Lin, Marquis, Ruiz, Santos, and Lew; halfbacks: Knight, Jones, and Sheppard; fullbacks: Sun and Young; goal, Captain Duevel. Captain Duevel, Ruiz, Santos, and Sun are veterans, while Jones was captain of last year's freshman team. The main brunt of the burden will doubtless fall upon those five.

Tackle Clark Tomorrow

Tomorrow the team takes on Clark at Worcester. Technology swamped Clark last year to the tune of 6-0. The game this year will probably be just as much of a runaway. A week from today Dartmouth will be played. Not much is known either about this team nor about Worcester Tech which comes here the seventeenth. The Chinese All-Stars, who play here the tenth, have already been beaten this season by Harvard 3-0.

The soccer team this year has had tough luck in practicing. Only about fifteen men came out for varsity soccer. The late date at which Technology started its season and the late hour at which the day ends has cut down the time for practice considerably. The number of rainy days has also had its effect. In spite of all this a fairly fast team has been rounded out and a successful season is looked forward to by all connected with the team.

HANDICAP MEET COMES TOMORROW

Contest Gives Coach Idea of Men Available

The fall track practice will really get under way when the annual fall handicap track meet takes place tomorrow at Tech Field. The custom of having a meet in which everybody in the Institute can participate was started by Coach Kanaly and has been continued each year. Hence those who enter the meet tomorrow will be much better off for the added experience than those who did not compete.

Many Entries Are In

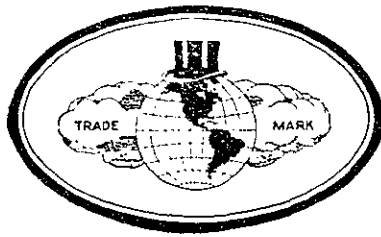

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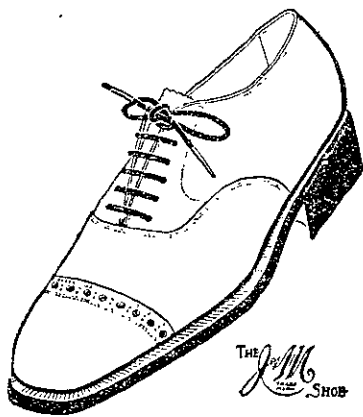
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
