CORNELL IS TRAINING FOR INSTITUTE MEET

Cornell this year in the contest Saturday. Cornell, which since 1899 has won all but six intercollegiate cross country championships, but which was forced back into fifth place at the championship run in New York last year, is making a determined effort to come back this fall. Although the squad Coach Moakley is working cannot be compared to the famous pack of 1921, which won two meets with a perfect score and triumphed at the intercollegiate by a remarkably low final tally, Cornellians feel that this year's team will be much better than that of a year ago and ought to be a big factor in all of its engagements, including the intercollegiate.

No Definite Line-up

The combination that will face the freshmen a week from today has not been decided on. The definite line-up will not, in all probabilities, be fixed until the day of the game. MacQuarrie and Harrison seem to be the best ends and Gorsuch and Berman guards. Berman has a bad arm but it is improving steadily. He is out for practice already, although his arm kept him out of the Andover game. Callahan is a good possibility for center, while Rogers will give the signals. The backfield is more indefinite and no conjectures can be made on its composition. Two more heavy men have appeared for backfield positions. They are MacCoughlin and Baldrige

The English High team was scheduled for a scrimmage last Wednesday but as they had a regular game on today, they did not wish to risk hurting any men, and so did not appear.

RUNNERS HOPE TO REPEAT VICTORY OF LAST YEAR

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run in many trial races since the beginning of the practice season, they have been out on the track every day and are in mighty good condition for their first run. Saturday's practice run gave an indication of the strength of the team as the ranking men on the squad showed that much could be expected of them in the Cornell run.

Cornell Has Good Team

The Engineer harriers will put forth their best efforts to repeat their win over the Ithaca runners. With Bob Hendie and Elmer Sanborn missing from the line up, Captain Holt and his team mates will have to go the limit to keep Technology's slate clean. Hendie and Sanborn came in first and second last year and were the means of defeating Coach Moakley's runners by the close count of 51-55.

Four members of Captain Holt's team ran at Ithaca in the race last year, Bemis, Parkinson, and Keplinger competed against the red and white team, in addition to Gubby Holt. The Cornell harriers have at least five veterans running this season, and as Captain Kirby is one of them, a strong opposition is sure to be given by the Ithaca runners. Kirby has been leading all the Cornell men in the trial races and is their best bet for first position. He won the mile run at I. C. A. A. A. title meet at Franklin Field last spring.

Is a Four Mile Race

As this run is the first race for both teams the distance has been fixed at four miles so that the harriers will not have to over work at this stage of the season. This was the same distance the teams ran last year and it proved very satisfactory in that run. Ten men will run for each school, and following the precedent established last year, the first seven men to cross the finish line will score. In other years the custom usually was to have the first five score instead of the first seven.

All of the Engineers are runners who have been showing steady improvement throughout their track careers and if they run in Saturday's race as indications from their trials point out they should, Cornell will have to show mighty good running ability to beat Coach Connor's men. The harriers have been developing steadily and it is just a question if they can come through with the goods against such ability as Coach Moakley has to offer Saturday.

Harriers Have Good Record

The complete team which will make the trip includes Capt. Holt, Fricker, Bemis, Rooney, Parkinson, Duffy, Keplinger, Howe, Davidson, and Symonds. Besides the four veterans Holt, Bemis, Parkinson and Keplinger, who saw service last year with the varsity, the other members of the team have had varied experience. Fricker was ineligible last year, but in the trials in which he ran he gave indication of being the Engineers' leading harrier. In the fall handicap last season he came in fourth and in Saturday's trial race he crossed the finish line 150 yards ahead of any other runner.

Duffy and Howe were on the varsity squad last year and have shown rapid development. The remaining three men were on the frosh harrier team and have given promise of good work on the varsity. Rooney was the first Engineer yearling to cross the line in the intercollegiate at New York, while Davidson and Symonds were third and fourth.

Close Run Last Year

The 51-55 victory of the Engineers last year was only decided when the last few runners crossed the line. After Bob Hendie and Sanborn came in first and second, the next place that went to Technology was fifth when Bemis beat out Glick, and with Keplinger closely following Bemis in seventh place, the first seven men scoring were completed. Cornell placed three runners in a bunch until Poore came in for the Engineers in tenth place. Coach Moakley's runners seemed to be having things a good bit their own way at this period of the race and the next runner to cross the line would probably decide the contest. There was quite an interval until the next harrier came in sight, and when he did, he wore Technology's colors. It was Parkinson who came up the home stretch and crossed the line 11th. Gubby Holt made the victory certain by nosing out a Cornell man for 15th place.

Race in Afternoon

The ten harriers with Coach Connor and the assistant track manager left last night and will arrive in Ithaca about 12 today. The runners will probably walk over the course this afternoon to accustom themselves to the turns and twists. They will leave Cornell Saturday evening and get back in Boston Sunday morning.

NO '27 FOOTBALL GAME THIS WEEK

Too Many Players Injured to
Take Chance on More
Accidents

The freshman football team will not have any outside game this week-end as the team is considerably weakened by the number of players injured. Four of the best men are out of the line-up till next week. Coach Miller has decided not to have any games at all until Field Day for the team can not afford to have any more of its players crippled. Right now the team is much weaker than at the beginning of the season. Only three men, Burke, Red Earl, and Arky Cargile have had experience and they were all hurt in last Saturday's game at Lynn. With the absence of Davier at center and these three men out of the backfield, the yearlings can not present a winning combination for some time yet.

Fewer Men Appear at Practice

At the beginning of the season almost 30 men reported for practice but lately only about 14 men have appeared on the field. The team seems to be overconfident for they have had considerable practice to date. But they are in no condition to put up any kind of a fight against the Sophomores until they learn to avoid such mistakes as were committed in their last game against the General Electric team. Last week there were enough men out for a scrimmage and one was held at every practice. There are some mighty good men who were out and who have not appeared this week. Their absence is keenly felt. With Field Day looming up a week from today, the yearlings cannot afford to lay down on the job. To put a good team on the field next Friday, they must practice all they can and this means that every single man must be out.

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TUG-OF-WARSMEN NOW PRACTICING

For the First Time Freshmen
and Sophomores Have
Full Teams

At last tug-of-war practice seems have gotten under way. Last night's freshmen for the first time had a full squad of men out, the Sophomores duplicating the feat.
