from whom the ends will be chosen are pretty evenly matched. Jerry Ridley has been out since the first day and shows good fast material. Ogren, Colt, and Jacobs weigh around 145 each while Ridley weighs 160. Colt and Ogren play a good interference game.

Plenty of good material is on hand for the Sophomore backfield. Captain Rogers will fill in at quarter and has earned his position by his good work in the past. A. Kelley will start the game at half-back. He is slow getting started but showed great stuff at the Andover game where he made several gains in spite of fierce opposition. He was knocked out three times before he finally went to the showers. The other half-back will probably be Warner, another speedy man. He has been out since the beginning of the season besides having some experience on the Northwestern Military Academy where he was a letter man. The Sophs were in the need of a full-back at the beginning of the season but a little scouting among the class brought out Bannon, who weighs 190 pounds and a fast runner.

Freshmen Outweighed

The average weight of the Sophs team is close to 170 which is about 15 more pounds than the average frosh weight. As the main difference in weight are in the lines, the frosh have a stiff battle ahead of them and can only hope to win by offsetting this weight with strategy. The '27 team is much faster than the '26 team and much quicker in the use of their heads. They are much less apt to fumble. Dodge will start at center for the frosh. Up until last week, this was Davier's position but Coach Miller will shift him to guard although he weighs but 135 pounds. Davier is a valuable man, for his grit and encouraging chatter during a game puts the rest of the team in a confident state of mind. Volante is the heaviest man on the team weighing close to 200. His position in the line is not determined yet, but he will probably face either Harrison or Gorsuch, two of the Sophomore heavyweights. Volante is slow however and tires easily so may not last the game. Higgins, a guard, is lighter and has more ability as a line backer. He showed this to his advantage in the Lynn game when many of the Lynn players were stopped short. Small and Franks are the best possibilities for the tackle positions, but they are good but rather light to drop some of the heavier Sophs.

Frosh Backfield Good

The backfield is the best part of the freshman team. It is a snappy, well-coordinated group which goes down the field with perfect interference for good gains. Captain Haertl at quarter is a hard little player and a very deceiving one to match wits against. He played at

West Roxbury High School last year and has improved considerably with practice. The half-back positions will be filled by Cline and Arky Cargile. Cline is a good back and is always ready to go down the field for a gain. Cargile, the other half, is a crack player and the team looks to him to make most of their gains. He is especially quick to find his opening and to go through it. The full-back position is in some doubt as Burke, the regular man, has a weak ankle and may not last the game. He will start the game and with care may be able to play it out. If so, the freshmen will be greatly strengthened for he is a good player. Brown will probably substitute. Brown made the only touchdown against Lynn by a beautiful run around end and has also shown his speed in the practice scrimmages.

Brawn Against Brains

The two teams will face each other with a pretty even split on the outcome. Though outweighed in almost every position by 15 to 20 pounds, the frosh have in their advantage more speed and quicker thinking than the Sophs. Neither team has shown any real kickers for few of the men have any experience in that line. Warner or Rogers will do the punting for the Sophs while Cargile or Cline will kick for the yearlings. The coaches have not emphasized the kicking end of the game but have put more stress on the passing. In this the frosh have the advantage for they have shown great proficiency at the aerial stuff and throw long and accurate passes. The yearlings have developed a fine system of signals and excel the Sophs in headwork. In this way they hope to offset their lack of weight.
