Heavy Sophomore Tug of War
Team Wins From Frosh
in Two Pulls

Starting the afternoon with high hope and a reasonable chance of tucking away a Field Day victory, the freshmen ended the day without a clear win to their credit. Crew, relay and tug-of-war totaled 8 points for the Sophomores. A tied score in football resulted in a final score of 10½ to 2½ in favor of 1926.

The football game was the hardest fought event of the afternoon. Early in the game Jewell recovered a freshman fumble and ran 40 yards for a touchdown. Things looked bad for the yearlings, but they evened things up in the first quarter when Volante dropped on a blocked Sophomore kick behind the goal.

Soph Line Ineffective

Throughout the game the heavier Sophomore line seemed helpless against the frosh attack. They penetrated the 1926 defense again and again for five and 10 yard gains. The whistle at the end of the half caught the freshmen within striking distance of the Sophomore goal and staved off a possible touchdown.

Again in the last half a chance to score was lost when Cargile, freshman captain, failed by a matter of inches, to send a long drop kick between the Sophomore goal posts. With but a minute to play in the last quarter the Sops were again forced back into the danger zone. This time two passes were tried, both of them incomplete.

Crew Race Close

The result of the crew race was in doubt from the start until the flag was raised at the finish. At the bridge Sophomore and freshman were neck and neck. A sprint and a slight resulting lead on the part of the frosh was soon reversed when the Sophomore eight raised their stroke and pushed ahead for a quarter length lead at the finish. Both crews broke the established record, the winner lowering it 11 seconds.

Relay Goes to 1926

The relay promised to be a close and exciting race. The Sophomores got off to a fast start and held the lead. Their advantage was less than a yard when, at the end of the fifth lap, the freshman baton was dropped, causing a loss of over 20 yards. This lead was never

G. L. Gilmore '90, president of the M. I. T. Alumni Association, spoke on the purpose of the Association, addressing the students present as "potential alumni." Dean H. P. Talbot '85 congratulated the classes on the outcome of Field Day and the general behavior Tech Night. He said that although some regrettable incidents happened, the conduct of the students as a whole was to be commended, as a real effort was made this year to make the affair a credit to Technology.

The Dean then presented the Cabot medals to those men of the class of 1926 who showed the most physical improvement during last year. W. E. Edwards, M. L. Minsk, Solomon Ruzitsky, R. A. Rust, and F. E. Spitzer were the five men to receive the medals this year. After the toastmaster called on short talks from the various Field Day captains, the Banquet was closed by the custom of passing around the Field Day Cup. The cup was passed along the table from person to person, as soon as one received the cup he stood up and gave his name, class numeral, and the city in which his home is located.

Attempts of the Sophomores to secure a cloth banner with 1927 inscribed on it were at first unsuccessful, but an oil-cloth banner belonging to the freshmen was torn to shreds.

A momentary interruption in the fight was caused by four members of Cleofan who started a fairly heated argument in accordance with the prevailing Field Day spirit. Two Sophomore Co-eds stopped one with a '27 arm band and told her some interesting facts about her class. A Junior immediately came to the assistance of her sister classmate whereupon both sides retired in good order.

After this, attention of the Sophomores was again drawn to the freshmen banner, which was guarded on a window ledge by a large group of freshmen in front of it. Someone diverted their attention from the banner by thrusting a nose through a window and soaking many of the freshmen. Seizing this opportunity, an enterprising Sophomore grabbed the banner and attempted to make off with it.

Fricker Loses Way on New
Cambridge Course But
Finishes First

ENGINEERS FINISH 5 OF FIRST 7 RUNNERS

Winner's Time of 27:31 Good
For Five and One-Half
Mile Course

The Engineer harriers won their second victory this year when they defeated the Harvard cross country team on the five and a half mile Cambridge course Saturday by the score of 21-35. Fricker led all the runners to the finish line, closely followed by Rooney and Bemis in third and fourth places; Cutcheon of Harvard coming in second.

Fricker gave a remarkable exhibition of running. He had been leading the harriers from the start and coming to one of the points on the course, he made the wrong turn. He lost close to 150 yards before he corrected his mistake, then he passed ten runners and came in first with the good time of 27 minutes 31 seconds.

Rooney followed at Cutcheon's heels, only a second behind Harvard's best man, while Bemis was six seconds behind Rooney. Captain Gubby Holt and Watters staged the best finish of the run when Holt nosed out the famous runner by one second. Captain Holt was able to win by his great sprint on the home stretch.
