came at the bridge and the stroke of the Soph shell immediately raised his count to 34. Holding their advantage with a gradually increasing stroke the Senior eight put all their power into the drive and at the finish had gained a lead of a quarter length open water, winning for their class the banner given by Dr. A. W. Rowe '01 for the fastest class crew in the fall races.

The Junior-Senior Race on Field Day was the easiest won of the fall races, with the Juniors lacking the power of their opponents. The contest was marked by a higher stroke throughout for the Senior shell and a gradual pulling away of the latter boat to a two lengths lead at the bridge. The final sprints lengthened this lead to the four length win and gave the Senior boat its chance for the banner it finally won.

weight and drive of his combination, held the stroke at 32 throughout almost the entire contest.

Even at Harvard Bridge

Neither shell was able to draw away from the other for the first half of the contest and at the Harvard bridge the boats were even. Here signals from the coxswain of both boats raised the stroke and the final sprint was on.

With a powerful drive at 34 counts the 1927 outfit began to nose ahead but the raising of the 1926 stroke soon cut down this slight lead and reversed it. The finish line was crossed with scarce a quarter length advantage for the leading boat, the result surprising even those who had been most optimistic as to the probable lead of the victors. The rowing of both combinations was by far the best they have done this year, and the coaches feel it very unusual for the short training period.

participating. He was partly successful in his endeavor, as only about two-thirds of the banner remained when the freshmen finally secured possession of it.

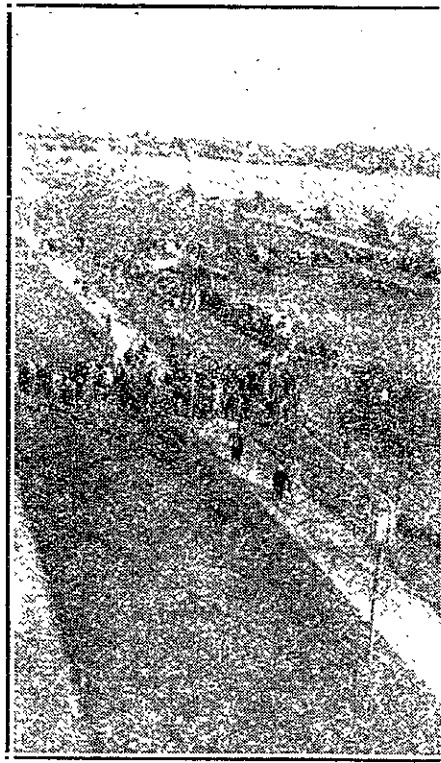
During the fight over the freshmen banner, members of both classes stormed the buildings and appropriated fire hose contained therein for their own use. In all about five streams of jet black water were playing over the heads of the swirling mob in the court beneath. About this time the Field Day Marshals, whose duty was to prevent disorder, appeared on the scene and apparently turned off the main water supply, as all the hose stopped functioning at once.

Accident Mars Snake Dance

The freshmen were headed by their torn banner when they marched to the stands, but soon afterward it was made away with by a Sophomore, who kept it in his possession for the remainder of the day. Two Junior Field Day Marshals, by virtue of their authority, endeavored to persuade him to give it up, but he was not tricked by the ruse.

The snake dance in which about 500 Sophomores participated, was marred by one serious accident. R. C. Dean '26 was run over by a truck which attempted

to "buck" the parade just off the Boston end of Harvard Bridge. Dean was hurled to his room and later removed to a hospital. Three bones in his foot were cracked, and his ankle broken. Pain kept him from sleeping at all Friday night, but by Saturday he was better and was expected to be able to leave the hospital in about a week.

"Asthma," one of the Sophomore mascots and a former taxi which had had its top removed, met a sad fate. After leaving the Sophomore parade to the grandstand, it was shoved back to the middle of the campus. Here several freshmen set fire to it, but it was so old that it could not even burn well, and they had to keep reapplying the torch.

Make Dr. Stratton Pay Admission

"Asthma" first gained prominence around the Institute last spring, when Professor R. G. Hudson '97 won it in a race at a smoker. He forfeited his right to it when he failed to remove it, and it came into the possession of two Sophomores who finally managed to get it going. It is now resting on the dump-heap behind the Institute.

When President S. W. Stratton came to the entrance gate, one of the assistants asked him for his ticket, and when he could produce none, he was forced to buy one before he was permitted to enter.

to Coolidge. This immediately put about 20 yards between the two contending runners which was increased at the end of this lap.

Symonds steadily gained during the seventh lap over Davies, the frosh sprinter, until almost a fourth of a lap separated the runners at the end of their run. Fort took the baton from Symonds at the beginning of the eighth lap and kept the lead obtained by his teammates. He gained some yards over Becker when his turn of the track ended.

Sophs Keep Big Lead

Howlett and Steinbrenner did not change the relative distance between the two teams for the first half of their lap, but Howlett still further increased the distance to about 45 yards at the end of the ninth lap. The tenth lap gave the Sophomores their last increase in lead when Manion gained some yards on Cole. The frosh getting away each time with such a big handicap found it impossible to cut down the distance.

No advantage was given to either team by the 11th lap as both Brown and Fitzpatrick separated themselves by the same distance by which Manion had led the last frosh runner in the lap before. The lead of the Sophs continued to be about 50 yards.

The last lap which might have been a hot battle between the Sophomore captain, Copley, and the freshman captain Weibe, proved an easy lap for the Soph runner with such a big lead given to him. Copley crossed the finish line for the Sophs with the same lead of about 50 yards that the other runners had kept for the last part of the race.

The time of the relay was 4 min. and 56 secs, which is one second better than the time made last year.

rush some frosh was laid out. Haertl and Earl both were out but came back into the game with such gameness that this feeling imparted itself to the rest of the line, so that the Soph gains were few and did not amount to anything. In fact, the Sophomore team at no time in the game showed any great prowess though they had everything with which to walk away with the game. The whole team gave the impression of having played football before but of never playing together. Their line, which was cracked up to be so wonderful, did not offer the resistance that it should have, while the backfield was seriously lacking in coordination. Another time the Sophomores will learn that the only way to make a winning combination is to practice, and that weight alone is not a deciding factor in football matters.

Frosh Pierce Soph Line

In the last half the yearlings worked several line rushes for they had learned that the Soph line was not as formidable as it looked. Captain Cargile and Brown were sent through time and again for five yard gains. Cargile was doing stellar work all around, often stopping short in his rush to pick another hole to go through and it took two men to stop him each time.

In the last quarter, with less than a minute to play, the coaches substituted seven men. The Soph coach started this game of chess and for each man that he substituted, the frosh coach made a like move, so that all around it was a clever little bit of stalling. The game ended with the ball on the 50 yard line near the sidelines.

harriers of the team lost practically all work outs last week, hence it was a question what kind of a showing they would make against Harvard. Both men made a mighty good showing Saturday and there is no telling what Fricker's lead might have been if he had not gone off the course.

Duffy's feat was the most striking, from a no scoring position at Cornell he rose to be the Engineer's fourth scoring man Saturday. His time was only two seconds more than that of Chapin, Harvard's second man. Most of the Technology runners stayed together so the team finished men in bunches of twos.

Rooney Runs Well

Throughout the greater part of the course Rooney and Bemis were on practically even terms with Parkinson behind. But when the home stretch came Rooney pulled ahead of Bemis and crossed the line six seconds ahead of his teammate. He almost placed second in the run as he came in just a second behind Cutcheon. Ducey and Chapin stayed pretty well together throughout the race, Chapin finally winning by two seconds.

At the four mile mark Fricker was at the head of all the runners with Cutcheon second. Bemis was running ahead of Rooney at this stage of the race. Chapin was in the fifth place which he held throughout. The next three Engineer runners were closely bunched in this order, Duffy, Keplinger and Holt. Four Harvard men were in between Parkinson, who came 12th.
