Banjo Club Best Received at Entertainment in Boston

THREE SPECIALTIES ON PROGRAM LAST EVENING

Dippy Davy Duo, Banjo Duet and Mono-duet Novelty Given By Clubs

Combined Musical Clubs made its first appearance this season before a capacity crowd in the Franklin Square House last night. From the beginning at 8 o'clock to the end with the dance, the clubs were very well received. The best applauded numbers were those given by the banjo club. They were forced to give several encores.

The opening number on the program was a selection played by the Banjo Club entitled "Yankee Pep." As an encore they played the "March of the Minikins." An enthusiastic reception was granted this part of the program. The Glee Club next sang "Rise, Sleep No More," by H. J. Stewart.

Following the singers came the first specialty number, an instrumental novelty, P. C. Davidson '25 first gave a number on a musical saw. He followed this with his popular duet playing both a banjo and a cornet at the same time. This was accomplished by stumming the banjo with his foot using a specially made piece of apparatus. The Mandolin Club then played "Love's Old Sweet Song" by Molly. The encore number was "A Kiss in the Dark," by Victor Herbert.

Jazz Band Features
The second specialty number was the "Dippy Davy Duo." It consisted of a piano duet of popular music. This number was exceedingly well received giving three encores. The act was given by O. H. Davol '24 and D. K. Grant Sp. The sixth number on the program was given by the Glee Club who sang "Gypsy Love Song," by Victor Herbert. The final number which was to have been a violin solo specialty was changed as the man was absent. In his stead a banjo duet by D. A. Sheppard '26 and Raymond Mancha '26 was given. Mancha is leader of the Banjo Club.

After the regular program the Musical Clubs Dance Orchestra also known as the Jazz Band, furnished the music for the dance. This was ended as is customary by the singing of the Stein Song by the entire club.

CADETS TO WEAR SLEEVE INSIGNIA

Technology Colors at Shoulder Will Distinguish Our R.O.T.C. Men

Technology warriors, particularly in the freshman R. O. T. C. battalion, need not henceforth fear lest they be mistaken for high school cadets when they show the haughty uniform in public. Distinctive sleeve insignia are now in the process of making, and within a few weeks the cardinal and grey will gleam from the left shoulder of every Technology embryo officer.

The insignia will consist of sewed felt patches in the form of circles, divided into two parts, the top of cardinal and the bottom of grey. In the case of those worn by freshmen or Sophomores, a large "T" in the reverse colors of the background will stand out on this. For the advanced corps, the top portion will contain a gray "T" and the bottom a cardinal branch of service insignia.

Will Remain Institute Property
The use of these insignia at Technology is an adoption of a custom prevalent in many New England colleges. An order for about twelve hundred pieces has been placed with a Boston firm and it is expected that deliveries will be made within a month. In view of the fact that they are costing the Institute about \$300, they will remain Institute property and will not be retained by the student except in case of suitable restitution.

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NOMINATIONS DUE BY END OF WEEK

Freshmen Must Turn in Blanks Saturday for Election Next Wednesday

Freshmen will elect their officers for the coming year a week from today, and consequently nominations must be turned in between 9 o'clock next Friday and noon Saturday. This is in accord with the new regulations adopted last spring after the contested election of the Class of 1924.

In class elections there must be at least ten signatures on the nomination blanks, which must be worded as follows: "We, the undersigned, members of the Class of _____ do hereby nominate _____ for _____ of our Class." At the bottom of the sheet shall be the words, "I hereby accept the nomination," followed by the signature of the nominee.

Officers which are elected next Wednesday will serve until next spring, when the annual spring elections are held for the three classes returning to the Institute the next fall. In the freshman class a large majority of the officers are usually members of the Field Day teams, since few other freshmen have made enough friends to secure the votes necessary to win an election.
