C. battalion will for the first time all meet in a social gathering.

C. battalion, and further organization now under contemplation, is the result of the activity of certain students who were cadet officers in the freshman battalion last year. These men while at camp last summer, organized a local chapter of the Sigma Alpha Beta military fraternity, and promise further activity to come.

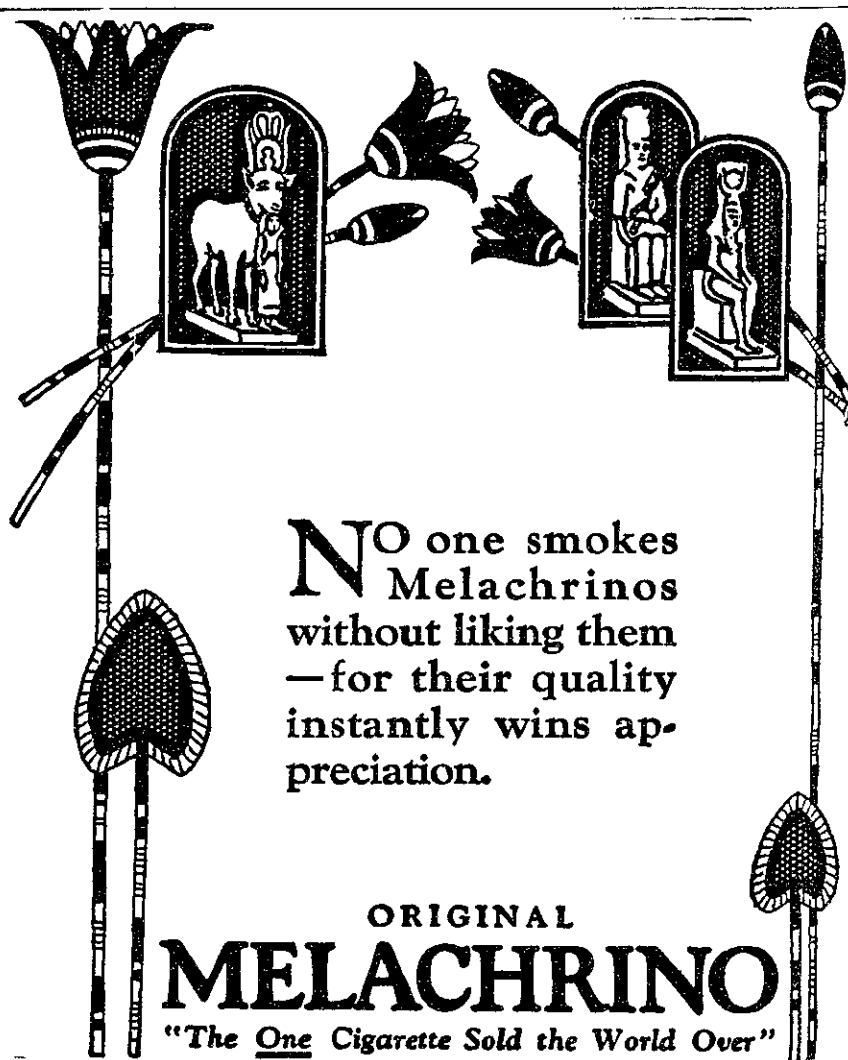
