

Varsity Harriers Meet Princeton Tomorrow

Third Team Loses to B. U.—Soccer Squad Plays All-Stars

FIRST THREE PLACES LOST BY ENGINEERS

Davidson, Symonds and Robertson Secure First Scoring Positions

BOSTON UNIVERSITY SHOWS FINAL PUNCH

The third varsity cross country team was defeated yesterday afternoon in a run over the Belmont three-mile course 33-32 by the B. U. first string harriers. The University runners took the first three places, nosing out Davidson by about ten yards. The Engineers secured the next two scoring positions but when B. U. secured seventh and tenth places the fate of Coach Connor's team was sealed.

At the finish none of the runners were separated by any great distance. B. U.'s first three runners finished with not more than ten yards separating the leader from the third man. This gave them the victory. Although the Engineers lunched their men, the advantage of the University runners could not be overcome.

Engineers Finish Together

Davidson came in fourth on the list of runners, while Symonds and Robertson followed right along at his heels coming in fifth and sixth. Robertson and Symonds ran a close finish, but Davidson lead the pair by a good 20 yards at the end. After the Beaver runners had secured these three places, Martin of B. U. crossed the line for seventh position. The list of Technology scores was closed when Myrick and Peck placed immediately after Guertin. Le Blanc was the last runner to get a scoring point for B. U.

WRESTLERS HAVE BUSY SEASON IN VIEW FOR WINTER

Team Has Good Prospects With Most of Last Year's Grapplers Back

FOUR OF TEN MEETS SCHEDULED AT HOME

With most of last year's men back and several promising new men out, Technology's wrestling team presents an excellent aspect. There is a pretty stiff schedule ahead including meets with one of the finest college wrestlers, in view of which training has already started. Last year's team was a corker and had a very successful season and all but two of its members are back. In the 115 pound class, Coyle will take the place left by Brunner while in the 145 pound class, which suffered the loss of Pike, there are several men, all good wrestlers. Of these Wetherly and Morry Cohen are the fastest and most experienced while Grinnell, a freshman, has also entered that class.

Tuttle Among 125 Pounders

The 125 pound class will be represented by an especially strong wrestler, Tommy Tuttle who was New England Intercollegiate champion two years ago and is back with his old form and speed. There are three men in the 135 pound class, Richards, Norwood, and Hazeltine all last year's men. Rock Hereford will represent the 158 pound class. He is one of the best men on the team and is also much respected among college grapplers, having held the Intercollegiate championship for the last year.

There are fewer candidates for the heavyweight divisions. Fred Greer, captain of this year's team and Walt Ketter, another last year's man, will place in the 175 pound class and as they both have considerable experience, this weight will be well supported. In the unlimited division, however, there are no candidates reported as yet and, as this is an important class, all the husky men with or without wrestling knowledge will find a hearty welcome. Anyone weighing around 190 or even more could be of much use to the team.

Heavy Schedule Planned

There are already ten big meets scheduled, of which four are at home.

Cornell meet brought out the ability of the men and the Harvard run proved that this first victory was not a fluke. Fricker has proven himself able to fill the place left by Bob Hendrie as he has obtained first position by a large margin in the first two races. A number of the men are able to turn in times that compensate for the loss of Elmer Sanborn.

Team Improving Fast

In defeating Cornell 42 to 65 the Beaver harriers made a great start on the way to having a championship team this season and the most promising fact of this run, besides the individual showing of Fricker, was that the Engineers had the ability to bunch together and so put across the necessary punch to score. Princeton won the race last year on this very quality. Although Bob Hendrie and Elmer Sanborn came in first and second, four Tiger harriers crossed the line together before any other Engineer scored. It was this bunching of the men that gave Princeton the victory. With the same team running against Technology's harriers tomorrow the winner will be the team which has better developed this quality of team balance. With the exception of Duffy, all the men who run against Princeton were among the first seven to score against Cornell.

Princeton Has Veteran Team

All the Technology runners are in the best of condition so the meet will not be marred by such conditions as existed last Saturday at Harvard. Both Fricker and Bemis were handicapped in the Crimson run, Fricker being bothered with an infected foot and Bemis with stiffness. In addition to this, Fricker got off the course, and although he finished first he did not have the opportunity of seeing what kind of a record he could make.

Princeton has all the veterans back from last year. In the Beaver-Tiger race a year ago, Hendrie and Sanborn came in first and second but the next four places went to Princeton as Gordon, Raymond, Leeming, and Conger came into the next scoring places. Then Bemis came in seventh with Willett of Princeton right behind him.

Parkinson and Holt came in ninth and tenth, with Nickolson of the Tigers in twelfth position. All the Princeton runners mentioned above will run tomorrow. Although Princeton only came in eighth in the Intercollegiate last year, the individual men obtained some good scoring places. Leeming secured 16th, Conger (Capt.) 19th, Kopf 43th, and both Raymond and Nickolson scored lower down the list.

Run in Morning

The race is scheduled for 10:30 tomorrow morning because of the football game in the afternoon. Coach Connor, Trainer Doc Johnson, Manager Wilson and the team took the boat for New York last night. They will go directly to Princeton and walk over the course this afternoon.

Frosh Runners Meet Worcester Team Tomorrow

First Year Harriers Will Be Minus the Services of Gaylord

The frosh harriers will travel to Worcester Academy tomorrow minus the services of their star runner Jim Gaylord. Gaylord has been bothered with a boil on his leg for the last two weeks or so and Coach Connor has decided to save him as much as he can so that he will be in tip top shape for the Intercollegiate at New York.

Gaylord was forced to drop out of the Harvard run last Saturday after the first two miles, and the Coach is taking no chances of laying up the freshman's best runner. With Gaylord out of the line up Technology's chances are sadly dimmed, but the runners who go to Worcester will put up a hard fight against the Academy team. The men who will make the trip are Beattie, Cheney, Hunt, Jutte, Smith, Spurr and Knowles.

Four Ran Against Arlington

Three of the members of the team were selected by Coach Connor a number of days ago, but the other four men were picked from those who showed up best in the run against Arlington Wednesday. Beattie, Jutte, and Smith were picked ahead while Knowles, Hunt, Cheney, and Spurr ran against Arlington. Coach Warren will take the team to Worcester, leaving at one o'clock.

PRACTICE FOR SWIMMERS TO BEGIN MONDAY

Meeting Called to Start Men on Workouts For Winter Season

LARGE NUMBER OF VETERANS ON HAND

Starting with a mass meeting next Monday of those interested in swimming, active practice of the tankmen will get under way. The gathering which is to be held in 10-275 at 5 o'clock, will be presided over by Captain Nip Marsh and Coach Russell Dean. Its purpose is to acquaint the new men with their future teammates, letting them know who they will be working with this winter.

A large number of veterans from last year's squad are back again. Besides the captain, the other three members of the relay team are ready to report. Dave Evans, Dunn and Ed Taylor, besides swimming in this event, are experts in the 50 and 100 yard dashes. Jones and Wilmot, two more veteran dash men are back, as well as Parsons and Ed Oxnard who swim the 220. Bill Cates is the only plunger on deck from last year. In the dives a number of veterans are on hand. Paul Carver, Art Keay, and Buerger, are all men of several years' experience. Bobby Dean, a promising diver from last season's freshman team was hurt in an accident Field Day. He is expected to be able

CROSS COUNTRY SECONDS WILL RUN TOMORROW

D. W. Howe Captains Team to Race in A. A. Union Championships

FRANKLIN PARK COURSE FAMILIAR TO HARRIERS

Coach Connor has entered the second varsity cross country team in the A. A. U. championship race, which takes place over the Franklin Park course tomorrow afternoon. As about 35 men have been practicing on the varsity squad, the coach wishes to give those runners who do not make the trips with the first varsity a chance to show their worth in competitive races. Hence the harriers have been entered in the run tomorrow in order to give the men opportunity to race after having trained and also so that the men can be properly rated on the varsity squad.

The team that will represent the Engineers is by no means a weak one as it includes some of the varsity's coming mainstays in cross country. As only seven will take the trip to Princeton a number of varsity men are available for this A. A. U. meet who would not be available if ten runners made the trip to Princeton.

Howe Captains Runners

The team that will run tomorrow includes Howe (Capt.), Grossman, Fife, Brown, Ostborg, O'Brien, Hooper, and Preston. The first three named have completed the varsity squad when ten men were entered in a run at Cornell and Harvard, while the remaining have been making steady progress on the squad.

Howe ran both at Cornell and at Harvard and made a good showing in each race. At Ithaca he secured 11th place out of the total list of finishers, which counted as sixth scoring position for the Engineers. He can be depended upon to give a good account of himself in tomorrow's race. Grossman and Fife are two runners who have been steadily improving from the start of the season. Although they did not go to Cornell, their performances after that run warranted placing them on the varsity team that met Harvard last Saturday.

Brown, Ostborg, and O'Brien are three runners who give promise of fast developing into consistent varsity men. They ran with the second varsity harriers against Harvard Saturday and the times of all three of these runners were better than the time of the ninth and 10th man to place on the first varsity for the Engineers. Hooper and Preston have been working steadily with the squad and can be counted among those who have shown real improvement in their work.

Varsity Soccer Plays All-Stars Here Tomorrow

Strong Chinese Combination Meet Beavers in First Home Contest

Tech Defense Strong

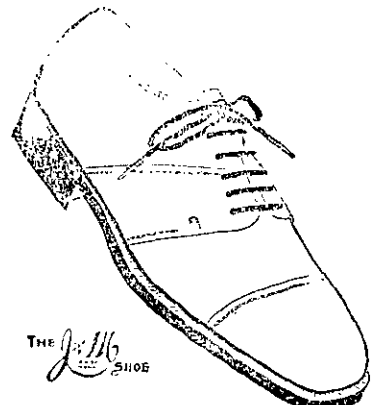
As for the men that represent Technology, the lineup will probably be the same as that of the three previous games. Captain Ducey at goal and Art Sun and Carol Young at fullback form the backbone of perhaps the strongest defense in this section of the country. So far this fall they have not allowed a single goal to be scored against them.

A glance at the comparative records of the two teams would apparently give the Engineers an edge in the coming contest. Worcester Tech and Northeastern have fallen before the strong Asiatic combination but Harvard, in their opening game of the season, put the well known skids under them to the tune of 3 to 0. Harvard in turn bowed to Amherst and Lord Jeff lost to Technology.
