held among the two upper classes, not elections to the organization directly, but rather the elections to serve as recommendations by the classes, for men to be chosen by the present Committee with the ratification of the Department. The men picked in this way will form the undergraduate chapter of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, whereupon the present Course X Honor System Committee will dissolve, the new organization taking its place. They realize that popular elections are not the best means for getting the best men, but they thought such an election was the only fair way that men could be chosen to start the thing, for once under way the older members will elect others to succeed them according to their judgment alone, and this is to be based on a man's general ability together with his character. However, no man will be able to become a member without the approval of the Department. The committee wishes to emphasize the fact that when the society chooses its own men subject to ratification by the Department, these men shall be picked on the sole basis of ability and integrity, not upon social accomplishments.

The Course X Honor Committee has suffered a great deal of adverse criticism, and it is to overcome this obstacle, that the student chapter of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers is being organized.

The faculty members of Course X are behind the movement, and they will give Course X men as complete an honor system as they are capable of handing. To achieve this the men need a keen sense of professional pride, which the Committee hopes to attain in time by a yearly selection of a number of men from upper classes to serve as examples of what a Chemical Engineer should be.

RELIGIOUS CENSUS OF
STUDENTS COMPILED

Congregationalists Prove to Be
Most Numerous Here

For the first time a complete religious census of the students at the Institute has been compiled and the results obtained prove very interesting on comparison with similar figures from other colleges. The Congregational denomination leads the list with a total of 418 making 14.2 per cent. This is closely followed by the Catholic faith which has a total of 378, or 12.8 per cent. The Episcopalians come third with 351 or 11.9 per cent. Many will be surprised to learn that there are 12 here who profess the Quaker faith. The census shows that 6.3 per cent are Jews and 1.8 per cent Christian Scientists.

These figures were compiled by Harrison Browning '25, Director of Church Relations for the T. C. A., who used the Activities Cards filed by the men with their registration material on entering as the source of his information.

Frosh Harriers
Outclassed By
Arlington High

School Boys Take Yearling
Second Team in—
Winning 15-74

The Arlington High School harriers had things completely their own way over the Engineer frosh second team Wednesday afternoon on the Arlington course, winning 15-74. The high school runners have one of the best school boy cross country teams in this section and they romped away with the first eleven places in the order of finish, leaving to the inexperienced Beaver harriers twelfth place as their first scoring position.

The run was in the nature of a practice meet for both teams as Arlington had practically all her cross country men including those who would be ineligible for regular competition. Coach Connor sent all the runners of the freshman squad who have not been running with the first frosh team and hence most of the men have had little experience and one of them none at all.

Knowles Leads Engineers

Knowles was the first Engineer harrier to score. No great distance separated any of the runners at this point of the finish, the men were following each other, heel, pretty closely. After Knowles, Spurr and Cheney crossed the finish line in 13th and 15th place. Hunt and Sparre in 17th and 18th positions closed the list of Beaver scorers.

Walsh who is Arlington's star runner finished the race about 200 yards ahead of his nearest teammate, O'Neil, who came in second. The other high school harriers finished after the leaders in close order having wonderful scoring power because of their ability to bunch their men.

One exciting finish was furnished by the Engineer runners which offset the monotony of seeing the school boys cross the line. Sparre and Kwok ran a close and hotly contested race for 18th place, Sparre barely nosing out his team mate at the finish line.

Course Is Hilly

The run was over a three and a half mile course which was very rough and hilly and also had had stretches of macadam road which hindered the men who had spikes. Although the Engineer harriers were so outclassed, the run provided much needed experience for the members of the frosh squad. Coach Connor sent the men against the high school runners with the same purpose in mind that he scheduled the other cross country runs this week, he plans to give all the men on the cross country squads as much competition as possible.

so that this will be one of the busiest seasons in wrestling. The first meet will be with the Boston Young Men's Christian Union in Boston on January 11. After that will come meets with Yale at New Haven, January 19; Navy at Annapolis, February 2; and West Point at West Point, February 9. The next two meets will take place here and will be with Brown on February 16, and with Harvard on February 20. On February 23, the team will journey to Princeton, making three big contests in a week. On March 8, Lehigh will come here and on March 15, the team will wrestle Cornell at Ithaca. Some time after that, the New England Intercollegiate will take place and the team is again entered this year.

Of these meets, the ones with Cornell and Navy are the hardest. The midshipmen have always put out a tough brace of grapplers while the Cornell team took the Eastern Intercollegiate championship last year. There is plenty of time before these meets, however, and no time has been lost in getting practice under way. Every class, with the exception of the unlimited weights, has a sufficient number of men to warrant the selection of a crackerjack team to represent Technology.

Good Schedule Slated

Among the men that have entered this fall two particularly stand out as excellent material for a strong frosh team. A former Hill man, Art Brown and Johnson, an Hawaiian, both have brilliant previous records in track events.

A tentative schedule has been drawn up. While it is easier than that of last year still several meets have been arranged that may prove difficult for the Beavers to negotiate, such as Navy, Yale, Amherst, Wesleyan, Lowell Institute, Brown and Dartmouth will form a portion of the Frosh opponents. The team will also compete in the New England Intercollegiate which will be held at Hanover.

All candidates will have to join the Boston Y. M. C. A., where practice and home meets are held. However, a greatly reduced membership fee is obtainable by Technology men.
