day of elections except that in case of protest this announcement shall not be made until the elections have been adjudged legal.

No Electioneering Allowed

The regulations covering the actual voting include "voting shall be in a room selected by the committee in which there shall be a locked box, the key of which is in the possession of the chairman. The voter shall on entrance receive his ballot, which he shall fill out in a booth provided for the occasion. No one except those in charge of the election shall be admitted to the room unless there is an empty booth. The voter shall on exit separate the two portions of the ballot dropping the upper portion into the box and giving the lower portion containing his name to the attendant in charge."

"There shall be no counting of votes until the polls are closed. There shall be no electioneering before or during the elections. The members of the committee request the freshmen to refrain from posting inscriptions on classroom black boards and on posters, as this is not the custom at Technology. The list of nominees are—

DORM CONSTRUCTION PROGRESSING RAPIDLY

The reinforced concrete construction on the new dormitories has reached the second story, and in a statement issued by Foreman McDonnell Saturday, the concrete work is expected to be finished in three weeks if the weather is fine.

The general construction of the dormitory is the Gun-Stone type. It consists of a reinforced concrete frame with a two foot wall of stucco, outside of which is two inches of stone veneer. The outstanding advantage of this type of building is the saving in time and labor.
