Announces Decision at Mass
Meeting of Wrestlers
Monday Evening

HEREFORD AND GREER EMPHASIZE PRACTICE

The mass meeting of all wrestling candidates held Monday evening in the Hangar gym proved a great success, over 70 men appearing. Most of the regular men showed up while many new men signified their intentions of becoming wrestlers. Rock Hereford and Capt. Greer gave short talks on the brilliant aspect of the wrestling season provided everybody came out regularly and put everything they had into the work. There was much excitement and a general feeling of relief when it was announced that Cy Burns had agreed to coach the team another year and this feeling redoubled when the great mentor appeared himself before the men and told them how glad he was to be able to pilot Technology's wrestlers through another successful season.

Share Burns with Andover.
Coach Burns has been with the Technology team for several years but for the last three years he has been made practically offers by Andover Academy. This year the Academicians offered so much more than he was offered here that he decided to accept. All last week, the question of a new coach was a serious one for there is enough good material out to make a winning team if placed in the hands of a competent coach. It looked to be a serious matter to replace Burns and so it was with a feeling of anxiety that the men awaited the outcome. Coach Burns, however, reconsidered his decision and arranged matters with another man to take his place once a week at Andover so that his presence will be required only three days a week. He will coach the Technology wrestlers twice a week from now on.

Combined Practice for New Men.
Coach Burns said that he desired the freshmen and all other new men to come out at the same time so that they could practice in a bunch. Most of the new men think that practice will be a series of individual instructions from the coach but this will not be the case. For some weeks, the men will wrestle among themselves but the instruction coming from the coach will be in the

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Canadian Trip Is Feature of Hockey Season

West Point Met Away
From Home

With the plans for the Canadian trip definitely approved, the varsity hockey team looks forward to probably the best schedule that a Beaver team has ever had. From the first game with B. U. December 9th, to the last contest with West Point February 16th, the Technology puck chasers will be on the go constantly.

The Canadian trip is the outstanding feature of the schedule as the Institute teams have never gone on such an extended trip. Plans have been laid out to give the hockey men the necessary amount of preliminary training as the Canadian tour will test the men's endurance to the utmost. Probably two Universities and three athletic clubs will be met on the trip. Acadia and Dalhousie will be the universities who meet the Engineers while the Sussex Amateur Athletic Club which holds the hockey championship of the maritime provinces has been secured as one of the clubs to face the Beaver team. The team will leave December 26, and get back the day after the Institute opens.

After the northern trip the Engineers face five hard games, playing Harvard, Point. Possibly some additional games will be arranged by the area management. The fact that the Dartmouth, Yale, Cornell, and West Week will make the competition keen game takes place during the Carnival for team positions after the Canadian tour.

In spite of this, however, Captain Serrano is very optimistic. The foil welders always have had strong teams, but their leader is confident that this

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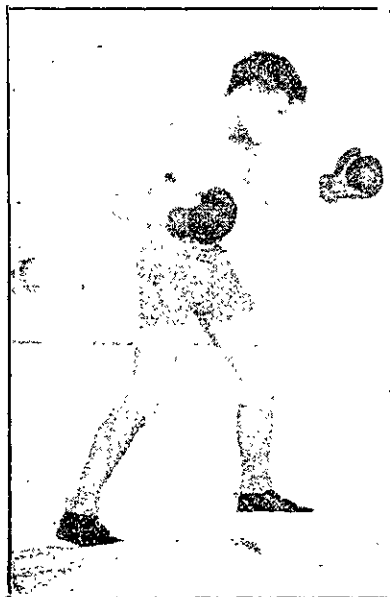
ED MOLL CHOSEN BOXING CAPTAIN FOR COMING YEAR

Good Men in Every Division

The 115 pound class will be well supported as there are three good men out for it. A. Lindsay, Del Prado, and Aurlano, Lindsay is the main standby of this class as he was on his freshman team and has been on the varsity for two years. He is going strong again this year and will be a hard man for his opponents to beat. In the 125 pound class, Schultz and Bob Smith will carry most of the work. Schultz is a new man, who gives much promise as to his boxing ability. As for Bob Smith, it is needless to mention what a scrapper he is. Smith is the prettiest combination of brains and brawn that has donned the padded gloves for a long while. He is a gritty and deceiving boxer and has already carried Technology's colors but was absent last year. This year he is back with all his speed and will be seen in many of the coming bouts.

Moll Among Lightweights
There are five men out for the 135 pound class. Coph, Lynch, Meade, Grinnell, and Nickerson. Lynch and Nickerson are the strongest men in this class as they were both on the frosh team two years ago and have a fair knowledge of boxing. In the lightweight divisions, E. Rousseau, Samaha and Ed Moll are registered. Samaha is a new man and shows good understanding of the boxing game. Captain Ed Moll is the mainstay of this class and has always been a great point-getter for the team since he has been boxing. Moll has a clever style of boxing and is hard to hit. Most of the school has already seen him in action this year as he gave an exhibition with Bob Smith at the All Technology Snicker.

The middleweights will include M. Levin, Daitz, and Jeppie. Levin is a crackerjack in his class and promises well as a boxer. Deignan and Konrisky will class among the heavyweights and these are two fine boxers, both having some experience. Deignan showed his grit on the Soph football team on Field Day while Konrisky has been boxing this summer and has already showed some good stuff.

The frosh team has not reached such a state of affairs as the varsity as the managers have been concentrating on the latter so as to get it started early for the intense season that awaits it. There is some good material among the yearlings and their practice will start soon. There is still plenty of room for candidates, especially in the huskier classes.

HOCKEY SQUAD TOLD NEED OF HARD TRAINING

Dr. Rockwell Stresses the
Necessity of Keeping
in Condition

MEN ARE ADVISED TO USE TRAINING TABLES

The fact that the hockey team must observe strict training this fall and winter was emphasized at the first meeting of the year held last Monday. Between 50 and 75 men were present to hear Dr. Rockwell drum this into the prospective members of the squad. The team is getting an early start this year and will have every chance to get in excellent condition before the first game in December.

Dr. Connor stated that he would be very glad to cooperate in any possible way to give the hockey men the necessary preliminary training. A list of the hockey candidates will be given to Dr. Connor and he will prescribe the workouts for each man. The work will start as soon as the list of names is compiled.

Much Depends on Trip

Dr. Connor in effect emphasized what Dr. Rockwell had brought out. He laid special stress on an early start and keeping eternally at it. Fight is what makes a team. That much depends upon what the hockey team is able to do on its trip to Canada was brought out by Dr. Rowe. In the past Institute teams have started with every advantage, but through failure to observe proper training have created an undesirable reputation that will be hard to live down. If the team can make good on the Canadian trip it will be to a great extent vindicated.
