THREE VARSITY RUNNERS OUT OF SATURDAY'S RACE

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Not have time to get out of the way and crashed full tilt into the post.

Bemis Lost to Team

The blow threw him to the ground where he remained in a dazed condition for some seconds. Not daunted by the hard knock, he got up and tried to continue the race, but was forced to drop out after jogging along a short distance. Bemis's absence from Saturday's championship run overthrows the balance of the whole Technology team as he has been the Engineers' second scoring man. The loss of this veteran Beaver barrier in the Princeton race showed how much his running ability was missed by Technology. If he had come through in second place which he should have done according to the comparative times, the Engineers would have been the victors by one point.

The loss of Bemis would have been hard enough for the Beaver runners, but with Rooney out of the line up too, Technology practically gives up all chances to the championship this year. Before the Princeton trip Rooney was bothered with stiffness of the legs, and the race over the Tiger course Saturday greatly increased the trouble so that an inflammation has developed. Saturday's course was up and down hill all the time and the steady pounding over a hilly road worked hardships on the Engineers who have been running only on level courses.

Rooney One of Best Runners

Rooney has been developing fast into one of Coach Connors' best barriers and if misfortune had not overtaken him Saturday, he would have been right at the top of the Engineer scoring list. He was third scoring man at Cornell and second scoring man in the Harvard run, beating out Bemis at the finish. It was expected that Fricker, Bemis, and Rooney would have a merry fight for honors at Franklin Park Saturday.

With two of the leading men on the team out of the race, Coach Connor has decided to give up any serious attempt to win the New England Championship Saturday with his first string runners. All efforts will now be directed towards the National Intercollegiate at New York with this idea in view. Coach Connor will withdraw Kepplinger from Saturday's run and place on the team Hooper who has not been in first varsity competition.

Three New Men on Team

The men who will take the place of Bemis, Rooney, and Kepplinger are Howe, Eife, and Hooper. The remaining five members of the team are: Captain Gubby Holt, Fricker, Duffy and Parkinson. This is a strong team in itself with Gubby Holt, Fricker, and Duffy to score for the Engineers, but it is very improbable that the other members of the team can make up for the loss of the three Beaver veterans.

Hence with the strength of the other colleges considered, first place seems to be a little short of the impossible, but Captain Gubby Holt and his team mates will be fighting till the end and will make a strong bid for places close to the top. Fricker ought to add the New England Championship to his long list of individual wins. In all the runs this season he has been the first to cross the finish line by a wide margin over all his competitors. Duffy has been improving steadily throughout the season, he was fourth scoring man at Harvard and second scoring man against Princeton for Technology.

Thirteen Colleges Compete

Twelve colleges will compete against

Technology at Franklin Park, Saturday, and the majority of them have veterans back from last year's teams. Maine is the leading contender again for the title, and with the Engineers out of the running, she bids fair to carry away the honors for a third time. She has two of her veterans back from last seasons team. Bates who came in ahead of Technology last year will also be among the leaders, two of her star runners will compete again Saturday. The other entries are: Brown, Tufts, Boston College, Boston University, Bowdoin, Colby, Holy Cross, M.A.C., N. H. State, and Williams.

Both he and Capt. Greer, who spoke next, emphasized the point that the only way to become any kind of a wrestler is to practice regularly. Every man is expected to be out at practice every night from now on. Interim practice is of no use for first of all a wrestler must keep in good form a condition which is obtained only by intensive practice.

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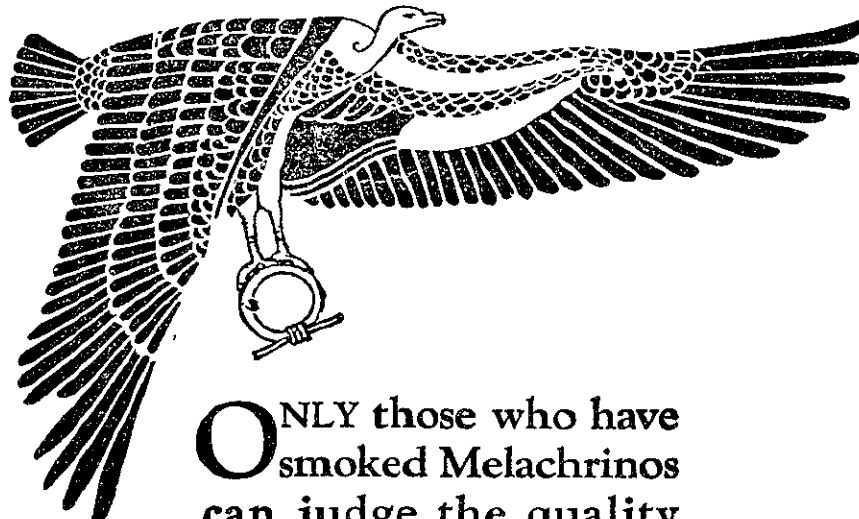
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
