

MAINE IS FAVORITE TOMORROW

HARRIER TEAMS IN NEW ENGLANDS

tomorrow's championship run. In all three races he has had a big lead at the finish over all his opponents and he is in tip-top shape to repeat the performance tomorrow. Captain Gubby Holt, Duffy and Parkinson form the main strength of the Engineers' team and should all be in close contests for scoring positions with the other runners. Fife, Howe and Hooper will have their first taste of championship competition in tomorrow's run.

Three runners will prove especially dangerous to Fricker in the race for individual honors. McGinley of Bates, Plaisted of Bowdoin, and Doherty of Tufts will cause the Engineers' star to put forth his best efforts. McGinley placed third last year, and according to the reports of his performances this season he is better than ever. He was winner in the New England Intercollegiate two-mile, and has consistently been Bates first scorer in cross country.

Plaisted took fourth place in the run last fall and has been turning in great records for the races this year. Tufts is entering the New England this season for the sole purpose of giving Doherty a chance to compete, as he is their only entry in tomorrow's race. He secured fifth place last fall.

Maine Is Favorite

The dope seems to give the University of Maine, coached by Frank Kanaly, former Technology mentor, the best chances to come off the New England champions tomorrow. For the last two years they have snatched the victory from the Engineers and are in position to make it three straight wins tomorrow, as they have lost only one of their star harriers, McKeeman who came in second behind Bob Hendrie last fall. Maine has in Captain Raymond and Hillman two runners of championship caliber. Both are veterans of two years' standing and are at the top of their career. They were the chief factors in giving Maine the victory last year as they placed sixth and seventh, which with McKeeman's second carried off the day.

Coach Kanaly's team has competed in two meets this fall, the first a triangular affair with Harvard and Dartmouth, and the second the Maine championship run. They defeated Harvard but lost to Dartmouth by three points, however they came back with a vengeance in the State meet winning with a score of 31 points to Bates' 53 for second position. Bowdoin and Colby followed in the third and fourth places with scores of 58 and 84 respectively. All three of the last named teams are entered in the run tomorrow and hence Maine seems to have quite an edge over her neighbors.

Bates a Leading Factor

Bates with an entire team of veterans who competed last fall will have one of the strongest combination of harriers. Bates nosed out the Engineers for second place last season and bids well to finish in the same position or better tomorrow. McGinley, third scoring man in last year's New England, is Captain. Besides the New England, he was winner in the Maine Intercollegiate cross-country meet last year and also victor in the Intercollegiate, two-mile run.

Ward who placed ninth in the championship race last fall will be a great running mate for Captain McGinley. He was third last year in the Maine Intercollegiate two mile. Holt, another veteran, placed 13th in last fall's New England and the other veterans, Dorr and Hurley, took 16th and 34th places.

Bowdoin has a sterling pair of runners in Plaisted and Foster. Foster is New England Intercollegiate champion for the mile, and Plaisted took fourth position in last year's New England. Bowdoin has competed in two meets this season, with Harvard and New Hampshire State, losing both of the races by a margin of six points. The team has been considerably crippled by illness and injuries throughout the season.

Many Individual Stars

A number of the teams that are entered which do not appear to have a consistently well balanced combination have some star individual performers. Cavanaugh of Boston College and Larivee of Holy Cross should be right at the top of the order of finish.

If enough men get out and play these games the sooner there will be a new gym where everybody will have room to play. There should be more class competition to develop class and school spirit.

There should be some keen competition in the inter-fraternity basketball league this year. There is a trophy for the first fraternity winning the championship three times. The cup has been sitting on the mantelpiece of the Sigma Chi house for two years. Several other fraternities have two legs on the cup. If somebody else does not get busy this year the cup will be permanently awarded this winter.

Coach Warren wants every ineligible man to come out for Basketball and practice with the squad. There are three or four ineligible already that have signified their intention of coming out for the team. If the men wish a team of eligibles will be formed to give the varsity some practice. Even if a man can not play on a team he can at least help along the team by coming out and giving the team some good practice.

SCHEDULE FIRST HANDICAP MEET FOR TOMORROW

Harriers' Activity Shrinks Entry List for Long Distance Runs

ENTRIES TO COMPETE FOR CUPS TEN TIMES

Coach Connor will hold his first handicap meet tomorrow at 2:30 on Tech Field. The regular track and field events will be divided into 12 divisions, the winner of each division being awarded a cup at the end of the year.

The first of the handicap meets tomorrow will have rather a small entry list. The field events and sprints are rather well patronized but middle distance and especially the long distance events have drawn but few men. This is probably due to cross country, as the men for the half mile up are largely recruited from the harrier squad.

To be eligible for the cups awarded at the end of the year a man must have competed in at least ten handicap meets. The cups are given to the high point winner in each division, of which there are 12, and not to the winner of each event.

Handicaps are revised after each meet, so as a man improves his handicap is cut down and the men in each meet are given as nearly as possible an equal chance of winning. The winner, then, will be the man who has shown the greatest improvement throughout the season.

METALLURGY LECTURE BY S. SKOWRONSKI '04

An illustrated lecture on the Electrolytic Refining of Copper was given in Room 8-319 yesterday by S. Skowronski '04 to the seniors of the Metallurgy Course. Mr. Skowronski is the chief research chemist of the Raritan Copper Works, Perth Amboy, N. J., one of the largest copper refineries in the United States.

The lecture was confined to the explanation of the different chemical processes in the production of pure copper from the "blister" copper of the smelting plant. There were also some slides showing the plant of the Raritan Copper Works. About 50 students were present.

C. A. A. A. meet in New York. Jutte, Beattie, Knowles, Spurr, Hunt, Cheney, and Sparre will run for the Engineer frosh tomorrow against the school boys.

Frosh Lost Both Runs

The first year harriers have been defeated in both the races they have competed in this season, losing to Harvard and Worcester by wide margins. As Gaylord did not have a chance to show what he could do in either runs the freshmen have not really had their regular line up in either of their meets this year.

Captain Jutte was the first Engineer runner to cross the line against the Worcester harriers, placing sixth. He was immediately followed by Beattie, and then the other Beaver Harriers alternated with the Worcester runners for scoring places. Smith, Knowles, and Hunt were the remaining Technology scorers.

Coach Connor is training the freshmen with the view of making the Intercollegiate at New York the big goal. All the members of the team have been worked for this purpose and the frosh should be in good shape for their final test.

Somebody ought to get busy and donate a trophy for interclass basketball. There is a trophy for crew and a cup for field day but nothing to encourage the men for basketball. Basketball is popular enough as is shown by fraternity and dormitory basketball so why not class basketball?
