Unable to go on the ice for another week, the hockey team has been getting its practice on the stretch of smooth concrete in front of the old hangar. With the schedule calling for the opening game with Boston University but a little more than two weeks from now, the team has gotten off to an unusually early start.

As a further means of conditioning the men for the hard schedule that lies before them, the aid of Doc Connor, track coach, has been enlisted. He will have charge of the members of the squad several times a week. Quite a few of the men seen pounding the cinders within the next two weeks will be prospective puck chasers instead of track men.

The soccer team had a very successful season this year. Since Dirk Luykx started soccer at the Institute in 1919 no Beaver team until this year has been able to go through the season undefeated. Four games were won and the fifth tied. Although there were only four veterans back a very speedy eleven was turned out that would be a credit to any college.

The first game was played with Amherst. Amherst had already been practicing for two weeks and had obtained a reputation by defeating the strong Harvard team, two to nothing. Technology went right out and played them off their feet on their home grounds. Santos scored a pretty goal in the first half and Ruiz shot another on in the second half. The next day the team journeyed down to Worcester and played Clark. This was rather a slow and uninteresting game due to the fact that Technology was tired out from their efforts of the day preceding. Late in the second half Young tallied the only point on a penalty kick.

Dartmouth Game a Tie
Field Day the team played Dartmouth at Hanover. Dartmouth had a very good team and succeeded in holding the Beavers to a scoreless tie. Ruiz had some bad luck in this game and deserved at least one goal. Then came the one home game, with the Chinese All-Stars. The speedy team of foreigners did their best but went down to defeat to the tune of 3-0. Ruiz scored the first goal in a mix-up in front of the Chinese goal. Marques scored the second one about 30 seconds before the whistle blew for the end of the first half. Aass got the third and last one in the second half. The last game was played with Worcester Tech at their field. Aass and Ruiz scored the goals.

Technology has a good claim to the championship of New England in soccer. The list of teams they have beaten or their victims have beaten include Amherst, Harvard, Northeastern, Cornell, Worcester Polytechnic, Clark, and Yale. Two or three of those teams are high up in the Intercollegiate League. Almost all of these teams had much more opportunity for practice than Technology did, but the Beavers came through in the long run with flying colors.

The team had an unfortunate schedule this year inasmuch as four out of

five games were played away from home. The student body did not have much chance to see the team in action. The one chance that they did get was a rare treat. The team swung into action and ran up the largest score of the season against the All-Stars. Next year the schedule will probably be arranged so that there are more home games.

Defense Strong

Much praise was heard this year of Technology's great defensive trio. The Dartmouth coach said it was one of the best in the East. All season long not a goal was scored through it. Captain Duevel at goal was admirably supported by Young and Sun. In every game played Duevel featured. His playing in the Chinese game was a good example of his scintillating work. Twice he was knocked down, the second time receiving two kicks in the stomach. Several times he threw himself on the ball in the midst of a fierce scrimmage. He made several fine stops of fast balls and got off some long kicks down the field. He was always following the game and encouraging his men on.

Young and Sun were the halfbacks. The former speedily became noted for his kicking. He sent long, low drives down the field with either foot that averaged 35 or 40 yards. The outside man that tried to get between him and the goal invariably failed. Young pulled off some very clever plays during the course of the season. Arthur Sun was a less brilliant but a very steady player. He did some fine support work and seemed to be wherever needed during the progress of the game.

Halfbacks Do Well

Technology's halfback line did not come in for much attention. The halfback line does not artfully trundle the ball through traffic so thick that a traffic cop would be of as much use as a blind beggar peddling pencils, nor does it take part in the last frenzied defense of the goal when ten feet kick as one and a casual bystander would receive the impression of a mob scene. They must do the major part of the work and not receive the credit. They must follow their own forwards and at the same time keep an eye on the opposing forwards. A good half-back line makes or breaks a team. Sheppard, Knight, and Jones did very good work in that respect this season.

COACH PLEASED
BY RESULTS OF
FIRST HANDICAP

Times Are Slow but Many
New Men Show
Promise

The handicap meet last Saturday on Tech field was a greater success than expected, according to Coach Connor. The object of the meet was not to break any records, but mostly to have the men get into branches of the sports which they have not tried before, as well as to give them an opportunity to enter into actual competition. In this respect the event was entirely successful. For example there were 46 men entered in the 660-yard run alone, and thus it gave the candidates for the various teams a chance to see for themselves what they really could do.

Keplinger Wins 1/4 Mile

McHenry won the 130-yard dash in a close finish, as well as the broad jump, in which he scored a full two feet farther than his nearest opponent. Keplinger won the mile and a quarter in the good time of 6 min. 18 sec., finishing a full quarter of a lap ahead of the field in spite of the handicaps. The 660-yard run was won by Howlett, although he was closely pressed at the finish by both Bailey and Dawson. Glantzberg won first place in the discus and hammer throws and won places in three other events, while McArdle placed in four events. In the pole vault Chen and Sanford each jumped 10 feet, but Chen was favored by a six inch handicap. McArdle and Kirch were tied up for first in the high jump at 5 ft. 8 in., while Bagby, Browning, and Knight were tied for second at one inch less. McArdle also made a good throw of 136 ft. with the javelin, although that event was won by Knight with an excessive handicap.

Boxing Prelims
Beginning Soon

Two New Coaches to Show Team
Advantages of Snappy
Footwork

The preliminary elimination bouts for the varsity boxing team will be held in the first week in December. Up until then practice will be held on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Manager P. B. Goble '25 gave out the statement yesterday that the presence of the men at these practices was a prime factor in the determination of their standing. For the past two weeks practice has not been well-attended and in view of the stiff schedule that is ahead, the varsity men have no time to lose in getting into trim.

Outside Professionals to Come

The services of two professional boxers have been secured to bolster the coaching staff. One of these is Johnny Barrett of the Institute A. C. of East Cambridge, a fast man in the 125 pound class. The name of the other man has not been made known. As a whole the team has plenty of strength behind its punches but the footwork is not what it should be.

Intercollegiate boxing bouts go only to a three round limit so that to get a decision a man must get going from the bell and keep on his toes all the time. Knockouts are few and speed is the deciding factor in the outcome. The coaching system has not pushed the footwork so far and so it has been decided to have this side of boxing brought before the men by a couple of fast featherweights.

Moll and Smith Injured

Captain Ed Moll and Bob Smith are not practicing very strenuously this week because of minor injuries. Moll hurt one of his ribs in the last meet of the past season with the Navy. It is still sore and hampers him considerably so that he will not do any heavy training until it heals completely.

Bob Smith received a bad sock on the ear during practice a short time ago in such a manner that a bad bruise and some inflammation resulted. He is wearing a headgear during practice to protect himself in some measure.

Lindsay has been permanently shifted to the 126 pound class as he will be able to make the weight. Schultz will stay in the 119 pound division and already is showing some of the speed he had last year. Bobby Dietzold, who starred in his freshman year in boxing, will put on the leather mittens again this year, probably in the 135 pound class. He did not box last year but is going strong this year.

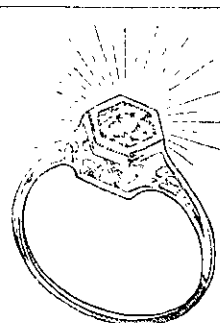
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
