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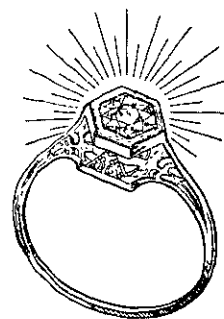

The smoker was terminated by the singing of the "Stein Song," in which students, faculty and the performers all joined.



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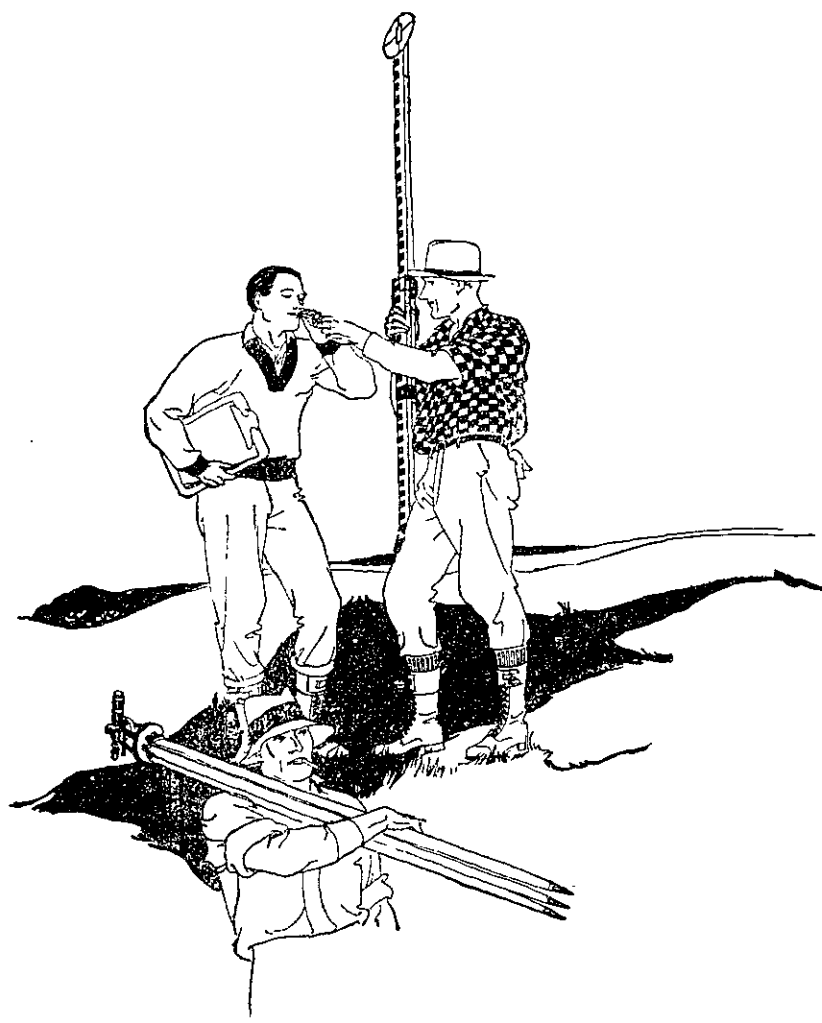
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
